
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## 1 Corinthians 15:12-19:

Now there was about this time Jesus, a wise man, if it be lawful to call him a man; for he was a doer of wonderful works, a teacher of such men as receive the truth with pleasure. He drew over to him both many of the Jews and many of the Gentlles. He was [the] Christ. And when Pliate, at the suggestion of the principal men amongst us, had condemned him to the cross, those that loved him at the first did not forsake him; for he appeared to them alive again the third day; as the divine prophets had foretold these and ten thousand other wonderful things concerning him. And the tribe of Christians, so named from him, are not extinct at this day (18.3.3)

But all human efforts, all the lavish gifts of the emperor, and the propitiations of the gods, did not banish the sunster belief that the conflagration was the result of an order. Consequently,	
to get rid of the report, Nero fastened the gulltand inflicted the most exquisite tortures on a class hated for their abominations, called Christians by the populace, Christias, from whom	
the name had its origin, suffered the extreme penalty during the reign of Tiberius at the hands of one of our procurators, Pontius Pilatus, and a most mischievous superstition, divis checked for the moment, again broke out not only in Judæa, the first source of the evil, but	
even in Rome, where all things hideous and shameful from every part of the world find their centre and become popular. Accordingly, an arrest was first made of all who pleaded guilty:	
then, upon their information, an immense multitude was convicted, not so much of the crime of firing the city, as of hatred against markind.

Mockery of every sort was added to their deaths. Covered with the skins of	
beasts, they were torn by dogs and perished, or were nailed to crosses, or were doomed to the flames and burnt, to serve as a nightly illumination, when	
daylight had expired. Nero offered his gardens for the spectacle, and was	
exhibiting a show in the circus, while he mingled with the people in the dress of a charioteer or stood aloft on a car. Hence, even for criminals who deserved	
extreme and exemplary punishment, there arose a feeling of compassion; for it was not, as it seemed, for the public good, but to glut one man's cruelty, that	0
they were being destroyed.
