INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

Forerunners and messengers advance the advent of our God. While John the baptizer's voice in the wilderness may be the principal focus of the day, Malachi's prophecy could as easily herald the coming Christ as forerunner of the Lord of hosts. Finally all the baptized are called to participate in the sharing of the gospel. In so doing we prepare the way for the coming of Jesus and assist all people in capturing a vision of the "salvation of God."

GATHERING

*CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

P: Blessed be the holy Trinity, + one God, alive in the world, reviving creation, arriving soon. **A: Amen.**

P: Let us confess our sin, in the presence of God and of one another.

P: God of mercy, we confess that we have sinned. We trust earthly powers and human authority alone. We grow fearful. We cling to false comforts.


P: God of might, we confess that we have sinned. We have turned away from our neighbors. We have trusted false promises.


P: God in our midst, we confess that we have sinned. We plead: come to us. Bring your mercy to birth in us.






WORD

FIRST READING: MALACHI 3:1-4

The book of Malachi was written after the return of Israel from exile in Babylon. Although the exiles were home and the temple was being rebuilt, times were still difficult for the weak, impoverished Israelites. Malachi attributed those difficulties to their continuing faithlessness, and in particular to the priests' laxity in their duties to sacrifice and to teach. Christians connect this passage to the ministry of John the Baptist, described in the Gospel reading.

¹ See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. ² But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

For he is like a refiner's fire and like washers' soap; ³ he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. ⁴Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD, as in the days of old and as in former years.

L: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

CANTICLE: LUKE 1:68-79 "Blessed Be the God of Israel"

(ELW 250)

Usually the response to the first reading is a psalm, but occasionally (especially during Advent), it is another song from Scripture. Today's is the song sung by John the Baptist's father at his birth. This canticle, known as the Benedictus, is traditionally the featured canticle of the Morning Prayer office.

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SECOND READING: PHILIPPIANS 1:3-11

Philippians is perhaps Paul's happiest letter, delighting in the support and faithfulness of the community. Ironically, it is written from one of Paul's unhappiest situations, as he is imprisoned. As always, however, Paul is confident that present sufferings will not compare to the joy at the return of Christ in justice and glory.

³ I thank my God for every remembrance of you, ⁴ always in every one of my prayers for all of you, praying with joy ⁵ for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶ I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Jesus Christ. ⁷ It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because I hold you in my heart, for all of you are my partners in God's grace, both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel. ⁸ For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the tender affection of Christ Jesus. ⁹ And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight ¹⁰ to help you to determine what really matters, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, ¹¹ having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God.

L: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

*GOSPEL ACCLAMATION



*GOSPEL READING: LUKE 3:1-6

Luke did not set the births of John the Baptist and Jesus in some mythological never-never land, but took care to place them in a specific historical period (during the reigns of Augustus Caesar and Herod the Great). Here, thirty years later, as their ministries begin, he describes the historical situation at length. Perhaps he is not only making sure that the Word of God comes into particular places and times, but that it does not always come through the means (like priests and kings) we would expect.

P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint Luke, the third chapter. **A: Glory to you, O Lord.**

¹ In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, ² during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. ³ He went into

all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, ⁴ as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord;

make his paths straight.

⁵ Every valley shall be filled,

and every mountain and hill shall be made low,

and the crooked shall be made straight,


and the rough ways made smooth,

⁶ and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.' "

L: Reforming God, fill this congregation with your presence. Enrich our seasonal preparations, and bless the efforts by worship committees, music ensembles, staff, clergy, and lay leaders as they work in the weeks ahead. Lord, in your mercy,

A: receive our prayer.

Here other intercessions may be offered.

L: Reassuring God, we remember those who have died and rest in you, especially John Kessinger. Guide us in deep gratitude for their life, and allow us to learn from their faithful witness. Lord, in your mercy,

A: receive our prayer.

L: Savior of the nations, come, and receive these prayers and the pleas of our hearts, in the name of Jesus Christ.










*PREFACE

Give us this day our daily bread;


and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

A NOTE ON COMMUNION WAFERS



To topple barriers that prevent participation in worship, we want to make it possible for individuals with Celiac Disease or gluten intolerant to be able to eat the Body of our Lord. Our default wafers are made by Parish Crossroads and are known as "Low Gluten Wafers" because they contain trace amounts of gluten. However, the wafers are tested at least once a year for how much gluten is in them. Since 2020, the wafers have routinely tested to contain 15ppm gluten or less (The

US FDA defines most food products with 20ppm or less as "gluten free"). Use the QR Code and look for the link that gives the most recent test results.

If you still have concerns, we have some truly gluten-free wafers available upon request.


