A NOTE ON COMMUNION WAFERS



To topple barriers that prevent participation in worship, we want to make it possible for individuals with Celiac Disease or gluten intolerant to be able to eat the Body of our Lord. Our default wafers are made by Parish Crossroads and are known as "Low Gluten Wafers" because they contain trace amounts of gluten. However, the wafers are tested at least once a year for how much gluten is in them. Since 2020, the wafers have routinely tested to contain

15ppm gluten or less (The US FDA defines most food products with 20ppm or less as "gluten free"). Use the QR Code and look for the link that gives the most recent test results. If you still have concerns, we have some truly gluten-free wafers available upon request.

WORD

FIRST READING: JEREMIAH 29:1, 4-7

Because Luke often presents Jesus as carrying on the ministry of the Old Testament prophets, our first readings during these weeks is from several of those figures, now from Jeremiah. In this reading, the disaster foreseen by Jeremiah has come to pass: Jerusalem is sacked, the temple is destroyed, and the people taken into exile in Babylon. Other prophets are promising that the exile will end soon. Jeremiah, while promising it will eventually end (it took 70 years), urges them to settle in for the long haul.

¹ These are the words of the letter that the prophet Jeremiah sent from Jerusalem to the remaining elders among the exiles and to the priests, the prophets, and all the people whom Nebuchadnezzar had taken into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon. ⁴ Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: ⁵ Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat what they produce. ⁶ Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. ⁷ But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

L: The word of the Lord. **A: Thanks be to God**.

PSALM 66:1-12

The people of Israel saw the eventual return from their Babylonian exile as a second Exodus. As had happened at the Red Sea, God miraculously liberated them when they had all but given up hope. This is a song of all those who are redeemed and set free by God.



SECOND READING: 2 TIMOTHY 2:8-15

Today we continue reading through the letters addressed to Timothy. While this letter is probably not from Paul's hand, this passage certainly represents his circumstances and his teaching. It reminds the readers that Paul was imprisoned for his teaching, and that that teaching included the fact that baptism establishes so complete a connection with Christ that we die and rise with him in that act. (Romans 6:3-11)

⁸ Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, ⁹ for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal.

But the word of God is not chained. ¹⁰ Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. ¹¹ The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him;

¹² if we endure, we will also reign with him;


if we deny him, he will also deny us;

¹³ if we are faithless, he remains faithful—he cannot deny himself.

¹⁴Remind them of this, and warn them before the Lord that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. ¹⁵ Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

L: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

*GOSPEL READING: LUKE 17:11-19

At this time people with leprosy were feared and shunned. Not only were people afraid of catching the disease, but those suffering from it were considered ritually unclean; simply coming into contact with them would require extensive rites of purification. And if the disease seemed to be cured, the sufferers had to have their health certified by a priest.

L: The Holy Gospel according to Saint Luke, the seventeenth chapter.

A: Glory to you, O Lord.

¹¹On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. ¹² As he entered a village, ten men with a skin disease approached him. Keeping their distance, ¹³ they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" ¹⁴ When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were made clean. ¹⁵ Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. ¹⁶ He prostrated himself at Jesus's feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. ¹⁷ Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? So where are the other nine? ¹⁸ Did none of them return to give glory to God except this foreigner?" ¹⁹ Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well "





Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.


