INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.

GATHERING

*CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

P: In the name if the Father, and of the +Son, and of the Holy Spirit. A: Amen.

P: If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. But if we confess our sins, God who is faithful and just will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

P: Holy God,

we confess that we are caught in snares of sin and cannot break free. We hoard resources while our neighbors are hungry and cold. We speak in ways that silence others. We are silent when we should speak up. We keep score in our hearts. We let hurts grow into hatred. For all these things and for sins only you know, forgive us, Lord. Amen.

P: God, who is rich in mercy, loved us even when we were dead in sin, and made us alive together with Christ. By grace you have been saved. In the name of + Jesus Christ, your sins are forgiven. Almighty God strengthen you with power through the Holy Spirit, that Christ may live in your hearts through faith. **A: Amen.**

*PRAYER OF THE DAY

P: The Lord be with you. A: And also with you.

P: Let us pray, Holy God, heavenly Father, in the waters of the flood you saved the chosen, and in the wilderness of temptation you protected your Son from sin. Renew us in the gift of baptism. May your holy angels be with us, that the wicked foe may have no power over us, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **A: Amen.**

WORD

FIRST READING: GENESIS 9:8-17

The first readings for Lent this year focus on the succession of covenants God has made. This week's is that with the whole creation through Noah, whom God used to preserve land animals (including humanity) from the flood. The flood and the ark has also been commonly seen as a foreshadowing of the cleansing and preserving waters of baptism.


⁸God said to Noah and to his sons with him, ⁹"As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, ¹⁰and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. ¹¹I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth." ¹²God said, "This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: ¹³I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. ¹⁴When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, ¹⁵I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. ¹⁶When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth." ¹⁷God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth."

R: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

PSALM 25: 1-10

(Sung to the tune Azmon ELW 886)

This psalm could well be the prayer of the newly baptized, praying in confidence for forgiveness and guidance.



Certain it is that none are shamed whose hope is in Your name; Deeds of those who are treacherous shall all be put to shame.

Ever I want to know Your ways; teach me Your paths, O LORD. For You I wait the whole day long—You are my Savior God.

Guide me and teach me in Your truth; recall Your mercy, LORD—How from of old Your steadfast love has been my sole reward.

I know transgressions of my youth are ever known to Thee; Judge not my sins; recall them not; in love, remember me.

Kind, good, and upright is the LORD; He teaches those astray; Leading the humble in what's right, and teaching them His way.

Moreover, all of the LORD's ways are faithfulness and love; Neglecting not all those who keep His cov'nant from above.

SECOND READING: 1 PETER 3:18-22

1 Peter is a sermon addressed to the newly baptized. This section not only connects the first reading with baptism, but also is the source of the affirmation in the creed that Jesus "descended to the dead."

¹⁸Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, ¹⁹in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, ²⁰who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. ²¹And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, ²²who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

R: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

*GOSPEL ACCLAMATION



*GOSPEL READING: MARK 1:9-15

The Gospel reading for the First Sunday in Lent is always a description of the temptation of Jesus in the wilderness. Mark, however, describes the Temptation in a single sentence, so that this year's reading has the luxury of including the two great events which surround and explain it: Jesus's baptism and his preaching.

P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark, the first chapter. **A: Glory to you, O Lord.**

⁹In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. ¹⁰And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. ¹¹And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."


¹²And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. ¹³He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him.

¹⁴Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, ¹⁵and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

P: The gospel of the Lord. **A: Praise to you, O Christ.**

*APOSTLES CREED

*PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

Trusting in God's promise to reconcile all things, let us pray for the church, the well-being of creation, and a world in need.

A brief silence.

L: God our truth, the ark of your church has room for many expressions of faith. We give thanks for voices that challenge and awaken your people, especially that of Martin Luther, renewer of the church, whom we commemorate today. Hear us, O God.

A: Your mercy is great.

L: God our maker, you remember your covenant with the earth and its inhabitants. Rescue communities and creatures hurting from natural disasters. Preserve species and habitats endangered by human carelessness and disregard. Hear us, O God.

A: Your mercy is great.

L: God our light, you know our weakness. Free all who govern from the temptations of power. Sustain all who work for human rights in every nation (*organizations may be named*). Hear us, O God. **A: Your mercy is great.**

L: God our help, you care for your beloved children. Comfort all who are grieving, ill, afraid, in pain, or in despair. Feed hungry people living in food deserts. Protect any at risk from exploitation and abuse. Hear us, O God. **A: Your mercy is great.**

L: God our home, you gather your people. Grant us health and safety as we assemble. Keep us mindful of any who are homebound, hospitalized, convalescing, or traveling (*especially*). Hear us, O God. **A: Your mercy is great.**

Here other intercessions may be offered.

L: God our hope, you promise eternal life to your beloved children. We remember with gratitude those who have lived and died in faith including our siblings in Christ who have gone before us, today we especially remember Ken Showers. Grant that we may also dwell with you in everlasting peace. Hear us, O God. **A: Your mercy is great.**

L: Accompany us on our journey, God of grace, and receive the prayers of our hearts, through Jesus Christ, our Savior. **A: Amen.**

P: The peace of Christ be with you always. **A: And also, with you.**







P: Lord, remember us in your kingdom and teach us to pray:


Our Father, who art in heaven,

P: Bread for the journey. A feast for hungry hearts. Come!




