Sunday School Lesson Plan - Nineteenth Sunday after Pentecost

Here's a Sunday School Lesson Plan for young children (ages 4–8) using the Revised Common Lectionary readings – Nineteenth Sunday After Pentecost, Proper 29 (Year C), Bible Verses Jer 31:27-34; Ps 119:97-104; 2 Tim 3:14—4:5; Lk 18:1-8

Sunday School Lesson Plan

Theme:

"Keep Praying and Trust God"

We learn that God hears our prayers, and we should keep trusting Him, even when things seem hard.

Bible Verses:

- **Jeremiah 31:27-34** God promises a new covenant, writing His law on our hearts.
- **Psalm 119:97-104** Loving God's teaching and learning from Him.
- 2 Timothy 3:14—4:5 Stay faithful to God's Word and keep teaching it.
- Luke 18:1-8 Parable of the Persistent Widow: Always pray and don't give up.

Learning Objectives:

By the end of the lesson, children will:

- 1. Understand that God wants us to keep praying.
- 2. Learn that God hears our prayers.
- 3. Recognize that the Bible teaches us how to live faithfully.
- 4. Practice simple ways to pray every day.

Materials Needed:

• Bible (children's version if available)

- Whiteboard or large paper for drawing
- Crayons, markers, or colored pencils
- Paper for drawing/prayer activity
- Optional: small bell or chime for "prayer time"

Notes for Teachers:

- Keep explanations simple and relatable.
- Reinforce persistence in prayer using examples from the children's daily life.
- Encourage respect and listening during prayer and story time.

Lesson Outline (Approx. 45-60 minutes):

1. Welcome and Gathering (5 min)

- Greet the children warmly.
- Briefly talk about what prayer is: "Prayer is talking to God."
- Optional: Ring a bell or chime to signal the start of prayer time.

2. Opening Prayer (2-3 min)

Suggested prayer:

"Dear God, thank You for always hearing us when we pray. Help us to trust You and keep talking to You every day. Amen."

3. Bible Story / Reading (10-15 min)

Luke 18:1-8 – Parable of the Persistent Widow

- Read the story in simple words.
- Discuss the story with questions like:
 - Who keeps asking for help in the story?
 - o Did God ignore the widow?
 - o What can we learn about praying every day?

Optional: Act out the story with the children. One child can be the widow, another the judge.

4. Discussion / Connection (5-10 min)

- Talk about Jeremiah 31: God writes His law on our hearts—He wants us to remember Him and love Him.
- Talk about Psalm 119: Loving God's Word is like loving a special treasure.
- Talk about 2 Timothy 3: God's Word helps us know how to live.
- Reinforce: "God wants us to pray and read His Word, even when it seems hard."

Questions for the children:

- What is something you can pray for today?
- How can we remember to pray every day?

5. Activity / Craft (10-15 min)

Option 1: Prayer Chains

- Children write or draw things they want to pray for on strips of paper.
- Link them into a paper chain to remind them to pray each day.

Option 2: "Prayer Heart" Coloring Page

- Children color a heart and write/draw inside it a prayer for someone they love.
- Optional: Add the words "God hears my prayers" on the page.

6. Song / Music (5-10 min)

- Suggested Songs:
 - o "This Little Light of Mine" emphasizing trusting God
 - o "I've Got the Joy, Joy, Joy, Joy" celebrating God's love
 - o Simple "Thank You, God" or "God Hears Me" song

7. Closing Prayer (2-3 min)

Suggested prayer:

"Dear God, thank You for hearing our prayers. Help us to keep praying every day and trusting You. Amen."

• Optional: Children can say one short prayer aloud.

8. Snack / Fellowship (Optional)

- Something simple like fruit or crackers.
- Encourage children to talk about what they will pray for this week.

9. Take-Home Activity:

- Encourage children to pray once in the morning and once at night.
- Draw a picture of their prayer or write one sentence about it.

The 5 Finger Prayer

Thumb: Those closest to you, your family.

Pointer: Those that point you in the right direction (teachers, doctors, priests) ask for wisdom & support.

Index: (tallest) Those that lead us, (Government) ask for guidance & wisdom.

Ring: (weakest) Those

that are weak, in trouble, or in pain. We cannot pray too much for them.

Pinkie: (smallest) Our prayers for ourselves & our own needs.
