INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

The Sundays after Epiphany began with Jesus' baptism and end with three disciples' vision of his transfiguration. In Mark's story of Jesus' baptism, apparently only Jesus sees the Spirit descending and hears the words from heaven. But now Jesus' three closest friends hear the same words naming him God's Beloved. As believers, Paul writes, we are enabled to see the God-light in Jesus' face, because the same God who created light in the first place has shone in our hearts to give us that vision. The light of God's glory in Jesus has enlightened us through baptism and shines in us also for others to see.

*CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS


P: In the name if the Father, and of the +Son, and of the Holy Spirit. A: Amen.



Word

FIRST READING: 2 KINGS 2:1-12

Elijah was the first and, in many ways, the greatest of Israel's prophets. God spoke to him while he was hiding from the rulers of Israel, who he expected to kill him. Among other tasks God assigned him, he was to return and make Elisha his successor. Elijah is one of the few figures in Scripture who do not seem to have died, but rather been taken up and hidden. Tradition had it that he would return to usher in the Day of the Lord (an extra place is always set for him at Passover meals).

¹Now when the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. ²Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. ³The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent."


⁴Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the LORD has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. ⁵The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent."

⁶Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. ⁷Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. ⁸Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.

⁹When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." ¹⁰He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." ¹¹As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. ¹²Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

R: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

This psalm, like the story of the Transfiguration, describes the pyrotechnics which accompany an appearance by God.



He summons heav'n above and earth that He might judge with right:

"Come, gather those who cov'nant made with Me by sacrifice."

The heav'ns proclaim His righteousness; He is the judge alone.

And this is what the Lord does speak to those who are His own:

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 4:3-6

Throughout the season of Epiphany, we have been reading from Paul's letters to the Corinthians. This segment not only continues that, but mirrors the dazzling glory of God which surrounds Jesus in the Transfiguration.

³Even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. ⁴In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. ⁵For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. ⁶For it is the God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

R: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

*Gospel Reading: Mark 9:2-9

This story immediately follows that of Peter's confession of Jesus as the Messiah, and Jesus' first prediction of his crucifixion and death. The "mountain" may be Mount Tabor, which dominates the landscape around Galilee. Since it is not named, however, its location is less important than its function: mountains have been places where humans and gods interact – including God's self-revelations to Moses and Elijah at Mount Sinai.


P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark, the first chapter. A: Glory to you, O Lord.

²Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, ³and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. ⁴And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. ⁵Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." ⁶He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. ⁷Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" ⁸Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them anymore, but only Jesus.

⁹As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.










*PREFACE

as we forgive those who trespass against us;


