#### MINISTER'S MESSAGE-REV. BOB

#### Gratitude and Hope

Nine years ago, I wrote my first Thanksgiving newsletter piece here in Prince George. I'd just moved here and, perhaps more fitting than anyone realized at the time, our first worship experience together was World Wide Communion Sunday. It was a time when we grounded ourselves in the Holy and looked towards the future with hope and, if we're honest, a little trepidation. That first fall had its challenges. After 25+



vears with one minister it was hard to figure out this new guy. Things were different and evolving, maybe a little too fast at times. Yet by Easter, we'd found our stride and what a stride it has been!

When I look back to that first Sunday in October and compare it to this one so much has changed. Do you remember the low-resolution projector on the ceiling that projected onto the wall? Or the cardboard table top we used for an AV booth? Or the sound system? Or the vacant lots out back? Or how easy it was to reserve space in the building? Or how people didn't know where St. Andrew's then Trinity United were located?

Fast-forward nine years. We merged two congregations and formed a new vibrant and thriving community that was acknowledged in Broadview (the former UC Observer). We took a leap of faith and leased those empty lots to BC Housing for 50 years at the total cost of \$10 so that Harmony House could be built. We embraced the challenge of a fire downtown and turned it into The Knox Performance Centre creating a safer space for live performances and the building of community. Between September and December of 2024 over 6000 people attended an event at The Knox. We started letting the community that we are here and what our core values are. We discerned becoming an Affirming Ministry broadcasting and sharing Queer Worship services with our siblings around the world. We shifted from a landlord/charity model to a partnership model where we work with people and groups. We've gone from 10-15 to over 50. We nurtured our involvement in the wider community to the point where it's hard to attend an event that has volunteers and not see Trinity people helping make it happen. We didn't just survive CoVid19, we thrived! Our digital ministries grew in leaps and bounds crashing servers and peaking at over 1500 viewers. Our extended Trinity family reaches from the Philippines, across Canada and the US, and all the way to Europe. Our technology has...grown! To say it's state of the art is an understatement with livestreaming, multiple cameras, multiple screens, and the only Bluetooth hearing assist system in PG. We survived another fire, this time at the main building when the pulpit was set ablaze. Again, we adapted and shifted downtown while we were cleaning up without missing a beat. We've embraced new people and different ways of doing things. We've helped support sibling congregations around northern BC and you even sent me to Terrace one Sunday a month for 18 months when they needed support the most. We balanced budgets. Built surpluses. Reinvested in ministry. Expanded our staff team. Developed skills and capacity. Nurtured worship assistants (something that is still very unique and rare across the denomination) and worship leaders to the point where during my sabbatical we were able to cover almost 5 months of worship ourselves. We've built a thriving partnership with the arts community in PG, northern BC, and the province. We've expanded financial support for our ministries in ways even I didn't see coming. We hosted the 42nd Moderator and pulled off what is still talked about one of the best Regional Annual Meetings. Through it all we cultivated a rich worship life that inspired people to live out their discipleship, to embrace what it means to be a neighbour, to be the hands, voice, and feet of Jesus in the world. (I'm sure I've missed something!)

I use the term 'evolved into' these kinds of ministry because I don't think we became something we weren't. We changed what we did and how we did it, yet the core of who we are as a community of faith has never waivered. The values we've articulated as inclusive fellowship, evolving faith, joyful service, being anti-racist, and affirming all have guided, shaped, challenged and encouraged us. It is who we are. My role has simply been to help us live into and out of them as fully as possible. That's the space you provided me. We've grown to trust one another, take risks together, ponder where the Spirit is calling us next, and embrace the future with hope and determination. To say I am grateful for Trinity UCPG and each of the people who are part of it is a vast understatement. I have so many 'highlights' of my time in ministry with you that I honestly don't know where to start. We've laughed together. Pondered together. Been angry and frustrated together. Cried together. Sat in silence together. Prayed together.

Sung together. Sat at bedsides together. And stood at rallies together. You have been a huge part of my life and I'll never forget my time in PG. I've often said that Trinity was the first ministry where I've been able to use all my skills and passions all the time. I still believe that to be true.

There are so many people that have been influential on our ministry together over the last nine years. It's always dangerous to list folks, yet there are some that shaped my time here in ways both profound and lasting. Gary Dean, Marion Bartlett, Maria Brouwer, Les Waldie, Alan Reid, Gabriele Slatter, Shannon Carson, Trish Appleton, Glen Schmidt, Diane Kjorven, John and Joy Warner, Geraldine and Emery Causey, Megan and Don Homan, Wendy and Bill Hudyma, Gerry McKinnon, Marilyn and Jack Blair, Betty Belado, Judy Adie, and Karen Hynd. All I can say is thank you. I hope you understand how gracious and how faithful you've been. I am deeply grateful for the time our journeys intersected and the ability to walk beside you, even if only for a while.

To the staff team as it has grown and evolved overtime. I am so grateful for each of you. As much as people often compliment what I've done, I'm deeply aware that I couldn't have done it without you. It has been an honour to share in leadership with you.

While leaving is always a source of grief for me, leaving Trinity UCPG, is also filled with hope. I look forward to hearing about the great things you do next. The new people you welcome into community. The difference you are able to make in PG and beyond. The ways the Knox Performance Centre will continue to grow and change. How you will continue to cultivate and encourage leaders as they live into their discipleship. I believe you have all the tools you need to continue as a thriving expression of Christian ministry, yet even more than that, I also believe you have the deep faith needed to face whatever challenges lie ahead. The same deep faith that I've come to know, love and respect during my time here.

I leave you with these words from a song I've grown to love. As a Newfoundlander, I can say without hesitation, "we've had some time!". In many ways, it has been the time of my life.

We also provide coffee & tea and assist with serving at Memorial Services as required.



#### OUTREACH COMMITTEE—VICKIE BROWN AND JUDY ADDIE

As Thanksgiving approaches, we think of the members of our community who are unhoused or living in shelters. We think of families who have difficulty with all the extra expenses needed to start the school year. With rising food prices, we think of those who have difficulty putting food on the table. With your help, the Outreach Team at Trinity United strives to fill some of those gaps.

#### Soup Kitchen at St. Vincent's:

The Outreach Committee serves a soup and sandwich lunch to guests at St. Vincent's on the second Sunday of the month. We usually serve more than 100 bag lunches each time. The lunches include soup, 2 sandwiches, a banana, an orange, and a treat. We wish to thank the sandwich makers, the shoppers, the soup maker, and those who serve downtown. In addition to the bag lunches, other items are available for those in need. In the winter months, guests will be offered socks, toques, gloves, tissues, and hand warmers. In the spring and summer, we offered rain gear, socks, ball caps, and water bottles.

#### A.C.E. Food Pantry:

The Activity Centre for Empowerment (A.C.E.) provides a drop-in centre and activities for its members. Food items and household supplies are available for those who are on a limited income and need a little extra to stretch their food budget. The A.C.E. bins are in the main entrance on the first Sunday of each month.

#### **School Supplies:**

School supplies and backpacks were dropped off at four elementary schools and Harmony House. Thank you for your donations.

#### Drop the Gloves and Sock it to Me:

We will be collecting NEW mitts, gloves, and socks for men and women in October. They will be included in shoebox gifts and gift bags for St. Vincent's, Harmony House, and The Way. Please leave the tags ON your items.

#### Hallowe'en Goodies:

If you have extra Hallowe'en candy or chips, please bring them to the church in early November. The treats will be added to the lunch bags at St. Vincent's.
