INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

The second covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the one made with Abraham and Sarah: God's promise to make them the ancestors of many, with whom God will remain in everlasting covenant. Paul says this promise comes to all who share Abraham's faith in the God who brings life into being where there was no life. We receive this baptismal promise of resurrection life in faith. Sarah and Abraham receive new names as a sign of the covenant, and we too get new identities in baptism, as we put on Christ.

GATHERING

*CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

P: In the name if the Father, and of the +Son, and of the Holy Spirit. A: Amen.

P: Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you and worthily magnify your holy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **A: Amen.**

WORD

FIRST READING: GENESIS 17:1-7, 15-16

The first readings for Lent this year focus on the succession of covenants God has made. This week's is that with Abraham, Sarah and their descendants. While this promise is made several times in Genesis, this story accompanies it with name changes. For Israel and its neighbors (and many other cultures) a person's name and that person's very being are intimately connected; to change the name indicates a fundamental change in the person – one of the reasons baptism is seen as (among many other things) a naming ceremony.

¹When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the LORD appeared to Abram, and said to him, "I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. ²And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous." ³Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, ⁴"As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁵No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁶I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. ⁷I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you."


¹⁵God said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. ¹⁶I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her."

PSALM 22:23-31

(Sung to the tune Consolation ELW 260)

Almost every week the psalm is chosen to serve as a response to the first reading. This week's particularly echoes Sarah's situation: childless and wandering, she is promised not only descendants but descendants who would be royalty.



For He did not despise nor scorn th'afflicted's suffering; Nor hid His face from him, but heard the cry which he did bring. Within the congregation great, my praise shall be of Thee; Before all those who fear You, I'll fulfill my vows to Thee.

The poor shall eat, and shall be filled; those seeking God will give praise to the LORD; all you who seek—may your hearts ever live!

And all the ends of earth shall turn, remembering the LORD; All fam'lies of the nations will bow down and praise accord.

For all dominion far and near belongs to Him alone. The LORD rules over nations all, from His almighty throne.

The rich of earth will worship Him, all who to dust descend; And all shall kneel—none of them can their soul from death defend.

Descendants, then, will all serve Him—the children yet to be; They will be told about the Lord, future posterity.

For they shall come, and shall declare His truth and righteousness unto a people yet unborn, for He has done all this.

SECOND READING: ROMANS 4:13-25

The second reading is Paul's interpretation of the first reading. Aware that Gentile Christians were tempted to see themselves as less securely in the household of God than Jews, Paul assures them that their faith makes them legitimate descendants of Abraham and Sarah and inheritors of God's promise to them.


¹³The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." ¹⁹He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave

glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." ²³Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

*GOSPEL ACCLAMATION



*GOSPEL READING: MARK 8:31-38

As Lent points us toward Holy Week, the Gospel readings this year collect Jesus' predictions of his own suffering and death. Today's reading immediately follows Peter's confession that Jesus is the Messiah. Peter's conception of what a Messiah is and does is one of earthly power and glory.

P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark, the eighth chapter. A: Glory to you, O Lord.

³¹[Jesus] began to teach them that the Son of Humanity must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. ³²He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

³⁴He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ³⁵For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. ³⁶For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? ³⁷Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? ³⁸Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Humanity will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

P: The gospel of the Lord. **A: Praise to you, O Christ**.

We honor the saints who lived in service to others especially our siblings who have gone before us like Leona Olenik, Anne Harpster, Anne Kline Corl, and Sister Elizabeth Fedde, whom the greater Church commemorates today.
