October 5, 2025 "Makoce kin Mitakuye: The Land is my Relative" with Teresa Peterson

Teresa Peterson is a Sisseton Wahpeton Dakota and a citizen of the Upper Sioux Community. The themes of her talk will include gardening is ceremony, the land is a relative, and nature is a source of healing. Teresa is the author of three books. Her most recent book, Perennial Ceremony: Lessons and Gifts from a Dakota Garden, was the winner of the 2024 Sigurd Olson Nature Writing Award.


October 26, 2025 "Queer Muslim Solidarity and Liberation" Special Guest Speaker: Ameera Sultana Khan

Registration closes **October 13th** and groups start in late October. Please note that registration is limited.



Singing Through the Generations: Worship Wars, Musical Heresies, & Sound Innovations

If you're interested in Unitarian Universalism, music, theology, congregational life, history, and/or religious drama, you're invited to attend "Singing Through the Generations: Worship Wars, Musical Heresies, & Sound Innovations" on October 11 from 9-11:30 am at UUFN.

Our history as Unitarian Universalists is full of innovations, controversies, and sometimes missed opportunities for community singing. We'll journey from Puritan call-and-response, to the earliest hymns, to the controversial formation of choirs, and the heretical introduction of instruments. Together, we'll sing our way through centuries of change, connection, and creativity, considering these questions and more:

Why were hymns so controversial? How did our church choirs first form and why? Who introduced the heresy of instruments in worship? What happened to our songleading roots?

There will be singing, there will be plot-twists, and there will be historical gossip.

This is a live online workshop. No musical ability required. Taylor Wesseln and Rev. Sara will be hosting a watch party and discussion at UUFN. Preregistration here is encouraged but not required. Registrants will be emailed copies of the handouts and resources.

A Summer Festival

Four members of UUFN attended the Mid-Summer Festival at Zani Otunwe, one of three villages of Makoce Ikikcupi (Land Recovery). Zani Otunwe means Village of Wellness. It is on 21 acres located in Granite Falls MN, overlooking the beautiful Minnesota River Valley. Two of the parcels of land have been funded by many "settlers," that is, non-Natives. The third property was a donation of 20 acres near Mountain Lake MN. The day was lovely, and we all enjoyed it very much. We were welcomed into one of the lodges - an amazing structure. From the outside they look like a grassy hill but the inside is spacious and fascinating.

A highlight was when Waziyatawin, the remarkable woman who founded the project, told stories of how it all began. We participated in a dance/give away while moving to the rhythm of Dakota drums. Some took a guided walk to learn the uses of local plants. A woman did a presentation inside the lodge about the conservation and protection of water. Food was available, including freshly roasted sweet corn. Dakota vendors were selling art and other items. It was fun to
