Holy Land Accompaniment



October 15, 2025

Dear Pastor Rasmussen:

In March 2026, Bishop Paul Erickson will lead a Holy Land Accompaniment and Solidarity delegation to Palestine. We are writing in the hope that your congregation and/or individual congregants will help make it possible for 4-5 young adults to participate in the delegation. To make this happen, we need to raise \$14,000 as supplement to their share of the cost.

In May, the Greater Milwaukee Synod Assembly (GMS) passed a "Resolution of Partnership with Sumud: For Justice in Palestine and Israel." The resolution called for the Synod Council "to designate a Sumud Ministry Team to expand the justice, advocacy, awareness-raising, and service ministries of Sumud...". The emerging Sumud Ministry Team is being led by two young adults, Michael Novotny and Dustin Spears who were ratified by the Synod Council to serve as our Synod Ambassadors to Sumud ELCA (see https://www.elca.org/our-work/publicly-engaged-church/sumud).

In his Easter Message 2025, the Rev. Dr. Sani Azar, Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL), compared the heavy stone blocking entrance to the tomb of Jesus to the deadly stones endured daily by those in Palestine looking for the hope of the resurrection. "Is Palestinians, we face the stones of military occupation, forced displacement, and the inability to move freely. As Palestinian Christians, we face the stones of discrimination, erasure, and, as many of our brothers and sisters leave this land, the risk of extinction as a community." This is the painful and urgent context in which Bishop Paul will lead the GMS delegation in March.

The GMS delegation to Palestine is a critical opportunity for Michael, Dustin, and other young adult leaders in the Synod's Sumud Ministry Team to experience the struggles and faithful vitality of the Church in Palestine, to develop significant relationships, and to discern how the Sumud Ministry Team can best live out the commitment of the GMS to be in solidarity and accompaniment with our ELCJHL brothers and sisters. Participants in the delegation will be available to share their learnings with congregations upon their return.

Luther and Tolkien?

Would Martin Luther have been a fan of Tolkien's The Lord of The Rings?

There was once a humble man living in a small backwater town. Then one day they acquired something of great importance that set them on a mission...quest...thing. And though he wished he hadn't found himself in the situation he was in, he knew its importance; this mission was his burden. No one else could bear this for him.

Maybe Martin Luther would have seen himself reflected in the hobbit, Frodo, from The Lord of the Rings. After posting his 95 theses, Luther suddenly had a big undertaking trying to reform the church and was just one monk compared to the sprawling catholic church. Thankfully, he didn't go alone. Through it all he had Katie, his wife, just as Frodo had his gardener, Sam. Katie shared the load with Luther through thick and thin, making it possible for him to further share the good news of the Gospel.



Part of his good news was *sola fide*. People believed they had to perform acts of service or penance in order to earn God's grace. Yet, Martin Luther tells us that "By faith alone" we receive God's grace. We don't have to do anything but believe. We can't earn God's grace for it is freely given and when we are given grace, we are then free to do acts of love for others in return. I think Luther would like the line in the book when Arwen tries to help Frodo by saying, "What Grace has given me, let it pass to him."

Would Luther have liked Bilbo's tongue-twisting jab at his neighbors or Gandalf's cutting insults toward enemies? Or would Luther have found them too mild-mannered? Luther was known for his many crude insults. You can read through them on the insult generator at ergofabulous.org/luther

Perhaps Luther would have enjoyed Merry's excitement that beer came in full pints in Bree, instead of half-pints he was used to back home. Like hobbits and dwarves, Luther certainly drank his fill of beer, preferring Katie's home brew to all other pints. And, he even sparked a change in how beers were produced between Catholics and Protestants!

What Luther may have liked the most about the book is that, at its heart, the Lord of the Rings is about love, community, the greater good, and fairness. Luther was disgusted at the amount of opulence and gold wealth in Rome while people in the streets starved and begged for food. So, it is not difficult to imagine Luther cheering on Frodo when the hobbit casts the one gold ring into the fires of Mordor to destroy it to break the corrupt hold it has over others for the sake of all Middle Earth.

Asking if I believe Martin Luther would like The Lord of the Rings is like asking if Hobbits eat second breakfast. Yes.



Steve's Science Tidbits

Curing Sickle Cell Anemia

Red blood cells are critical for transporting oxygen throughout the body via the hemoglobin molecule. Anemia is a condition caused by a deficiency, or abnormality, of red blood cells that causes oxygen deprivation in tissues. Symptoms often include fatigue, weakness and shortness



of breath. A particularly potent type, sickle cell disease, is an inherited disorder disproportionately present in African Americans and is characterized by abnormal hemoglobin molecules within collapsed, sickle-shaped red blood cells.

These sickle cells are unable to deform while transiting blood capillaries, which causes serious vessel blockages. Problems usually develop within the first half-year of life and lead to severe bouts of joint pain, swelling in hands and feet, bacterial infections, dizziness and stroke, and the problems intensify with age. All major organs are affected by the disease, and life expectancy is decreased. Symptoms can be touched off by anything that causes blood vessels to constrict, including physical and mental stress, cold, dehydration and high altitude.

In the past, all that has been available are drug palliatives that provide modest relief from attacks or transfusion of healthy hemoglobin from blood donors. However, a recent report on NPR recently detailed a near miracle reversal of the condition using a gene-editing technique called CRISPR.

Victoria Gray is a 37-year-old mother and sickle cell patient who was suffering from unpredictable attacks of intense pain. She was often rushed to the hospital to receive pain meds and blood transfusions. It was so bad she often couldn't get out of bed and was unable to finish school or hold a job.

CRISPR is a recent advancement in molecular biology editing that can remove mutated, faulty genes and/or add normal functioning genes in a cell's genome. Victoria was a guinea pig for the first attempt in treating sickle cell disease using CRISPR technology. In the case of Victoria Gray, bone marrow stem cells were removed and genetically modified using CRISPR and billions of these treated cells were then infused back into her body. This modification was designed to direct fetal hemoglobin production in the infused cells in the hopes that it would compensate for Victoria's defective hemoglobin.

Thus far, it seems as if her symptoms have been reversed. When Victoria was later invited to speak at a conference on gene editing, she told the audience of gathered scientists, "The life that I once felt like I was only existing in, I am now thriving in. I stand here before you today as proof that miracles still happen — and that God and science can coexist."

Since her treatment, 75 additional patients have been similarly treated for sickle cell disease or the closely related beta thalassemia. Of 44 beta thalassemia patients, 42 no longer require transfusions, while all 31 sickle cells patients are free of symptoms.

Two concerns: (1) It is not known if the turnaround will prove to be permanent or only temporary; and (2) the treatment is extremely expensive (perhaps costing millions), alas not yet ready for prime time. **Steve Downs**
