Good Gracious Gracious

October 2025

Called

Take off your sandals, for the place where you are standing is holy ground. – Exodus 3:5

One day, God shows up at the office and calls Moses by name. Moses is not expecting this. He isn't seeking a new assignment. It's not one of his life goals.

And what an assignment! Waltz into Pharaoh's palace, tell him to release his slave labour force, then lead that band of hard-pressed, sceptical people on a circuitous detour until they become the community God wants them to be.

Understandably, Moses demurs. But God insists. Not that Moses has special super-powers. The key to this endeavour, God says, is this: "I have seen my people..., I have heard my people..., I have come..., I am sending you," and the kicker: I will be with you!

That's God's refrain through the whole Bible narrative. God sees us, he hears us, he has come, he calls us into his work, and *he is with us!*

Here's what our Church says about eldership¹:

- Election to the eldership is the call of God, through the congregation.... Since the eldership is a spiritual office concerned with the rule and pastoral oversight of the congregation, only suitable men and women should be considered. They should be committed Christians, in regular attendance at public worship, persons of sound judgment and upright character....
- An elder must be a professing member of the congregation and must be "an example to the believers in speech, conduct, love, faith and purity" (1 Timothy 4:12).

From the earliest days of Jesus' church, believers have appointed elders to help them live-out their shared calling. Over time, we've sometimes forgotten that the call is to *all-of-us-together*. Instead, we've relied on professional pastors to represent God for us. But that was never the plan. God's mission is way too broad to leave to professionals.

"It is a spiritual tragedy of incalculable proportions that we... restrict 'ministry' to what 'the minister' does. Lay people are not there to help the minister run the church; the minister is there to help the lay people be the church." ²

Elders help us hear again the call of God who says: *I will be with you*. Elders pray for us, care for us when we're in trouble, and seek God's direction for us as a community. Most will tell you they are unequal to the task.

Which, of course, is normal. Just ask Moses. It turns out good leadership qualities are not really skills or techniques, they are gifts from God. Gifts God gives as we trust him.

And God's awesome promise is true: He equips the people he calls. He is with us.

This month we're asking God to call elders to lead us. So pray! Listen for God's leading. And take off your sandals... we're on holy ground.

InterVarsity Christian Fellowship

Since 1928, IVCF has been committed to inspiring youth, students and graduates to follow Jesus. Whether at their summer camps, in high schools or on college and university campuses, they introduce students to Jesus, encouraging them to follow him in every part of their lives. There is a longing to see young people emerge into adulthood with growing faith and the confidence to take on their next steps in life.

It all began with one student!

At 25, Howard Guinness followed God's call to put his medical studies on hold, leave his home and friends in Oxford and sail across turbulent waters for the sake of reaching out to university students in Canada.

It would have been easier for Howard to say no, to stay where he was comfortable. But he said yes. And with the help of a few friends, he raised funds for a one-way ticket to Canada.

He spent the next year travelling the country, urging students to see the campus as a place where God would capture the attention—even the very lives—of their friends. Broadening their strategy beyond the university, Howard and a group of student leaders organized the first InterVarsity camp for high school students. Going further, they took part in forming the International Fellowship of Evangelical Students, a mission determined to introduce Jesus to students all over the world.

Through it all, they pursued Jesus with unwavering conviction. And because of the risky obedience that Howard and countless others have shown through the years, their work continues today, helping thousands of students across Canada hear God's call. Over 90 years later, they're still saying yes.

"By students for students" has always been the theme of the ministry of InterVarsity. They are committed to one thing: sharing the message of Jesus Christ with student-aged Canadians. The mission of InterVarsity is to radically change the globe with that message, carried by young people to every corner of Canada and the world.

Funding is provided to IVCF through our Presbytery dues each year. Grace Church has provided additional financial and prayer support for the work of InterVarsity for many years. Last year we enjoyed having 3 of the IVCF leaders come to preach.

Students from all 3 campuses have retreats together and attend Scripture Camp in May together. On all 3 campuses there are prayer meetings, Bible studies, faith discussions and fellowship meals to support and grow the community. There are many opportunities for churches to provide meals for the different groups. We receive regular prayer updates and requests. Hazelwood – Are we ready for the Harvest? - by Donald Corbett (Living Faith)

⁶⁷ Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows. ⁸ Whoever sows to please their flesh, from the flesh will reap destruction; whoever sows to please the Spirit, from the Spirit will reap eternal life. ⁹ Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. ¹⁰ Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers." Galatians 6: 7-10 (NIV)

The title of this passage is "Doing Good to All" and if you have been watching the news lately, you may be of the opinion that this is not what is happening around the world. I suggest you'd be pretty safe in saying it is very much the opposite.

Every day there seems to be a new threat to our way of life and the principles upon which our country was founded – Peace, Order and Good Government. Putting aside the political aspect, we need to focus on what is truly important and then get busy doing something about it. The passage provides some pretty sage advice on how we might plant the seeds and prepare for the harvest – the harvest that we will one day experience in Christ.

In his letter to the Galatians, Paul challenges us to think about this issue from the standpoint of sowing and reaping. It reminds us that choices have consequences and that God cannot be fooled. Even though we may fool ourselves, and we may think we are fooling God, he cannot be deceived. "God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows." Whatever seeds we sow through the choices we make, that is what we will reap.

I love to garden, I love the smell and texture of rich damp earth and I prepare it for planting. In the early part of this year we had a wonderful display of flowers, and shrubs; and our vegetable garden was setting up for a bountiful harvest. As the summer became hotter and drier, we had to work even harder. Then we went away for an extended vacation; sadly the heat and drought did not — we came home to a lot of brown. It only took a couple of weeks without daily care to lose a fair bit of our harvest.

It is much the same with our spiritual disciplines of prayer and bible study. It does not take long for them to whither either. On the other hand if we invest our time and energy in our spiritual garden, the soil of our hearts will be enriched, and we will reap God's gifts as we invest (plant seeds) in the lives of others. Our garden's seeds are planted long before the harvest. Similarly the spiritual seeds we plant in the lives of others may take years to show. We simply must persevere and the harvest will come in God's time.

When we think of sowing the seeds of the Gospel, we tend to think of doing so amongst those who do not know Jesus. However, while this is important, Paul is telling us to pay just as much attention to the needs of the church as well. There are many hurting people who come through our doors every Sunday morning. They may be smiling; they may be among our best volunteers. They may also be dealing with difficult and painful issues. Take it from me; people who know and love lesus need us to love and care for them just as much as those who have yet to meet their Saviour.

"Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers."


