For all the people were weeping as they heard the words of the law. Then he said to them, "Go and eat what is rich, drink what is sweet, and send portions to those who have nothing prepared, since today is holy to our Lord. Do not grieve, because the joy of the Lord is your strength." (Nehemiah 8:9–10, CSB)

"Then all the people began to eat and drink, send portions, and have a great celebration, because they had understood the words that were explained to them." (Nehemiah 8:12, CSB)

Principle: God's Word exposes sin but also restores hope and joy.

IV. We Should God's Word (vv. 13-18)

They found written in the law how the Lord had commanded through Moses that the Israelites should dwell in shelters during the festival of the seventh month. So they proclaimed and spread this news throughout their towns and in Jerusalem, saying, "Go out to the hill country and bring back branches of olive, wild olive, myrtle, palm, and other leafy trees to make shelters, just as it is written." (Nehemiah 8:14–15, CSB)

"Ezra read out of the book of the law of God every day, from the first day to the last. The Israelites celebrated the festival for seven days, and on the eighth day there was a solemn assembly, according to the ordinance." (Nehemiah 8:18, CSB)

Principle: Revival takes root when obedience follows revelation.

- 1. Read Nehemiah 8:1–3. What does the eagerness of the people teach us about how we should approach Scripture today?
- 2. In verses 7–8, the leaders helped explain the Word so people could understand. Why is understanding the Bible just as important as hearing it?
- 3. The people wept when they heard the Law (v. 9). Why does God's Word sometimes cut us deeply?
- 4. Ezra and Nehemiah encouraged the people to rejoice (v. 10). How do conviction and joy work together in spiritual growth?
- 5. The people celebrated the Feast of Booths for the first time in generations (vv. 13–18). What does this show us about the connection between God's Word and obedience?

- 6 Do you feel more conviction, joy, or both when you read the Bible? Why?
- What is one step you can take this week to give God's Word a greater place in your daily life?

- Pray for a renewed hunger for God's Word in *The Gate*.
