Elizabeth Kent has spearheaded Walk for the Centre for the past 10 years. Each year Elizabeth organized a team that met once a month from April to November to plan the Walk for the Centre. Elizabeth wrote to the different churches in the catchment area to let them know about a Walk for the Centre, prepared bulletin announcements for church representatives to distribute, liaised with a poster designer and organized the printing and distribution of same, prepared agendas for the team meetings, wrote thank you letters after the walk as well as soliciting business sponsors. If there was a job that needed doing and no one abl to do it, Elizabeth took it on.

Even as the Centretown Community Food Centre has been reconfigured, relocated, and renamed with a new shopping model, Elizabeth has been its faithful supporter. Her vision was inspired by the financial burden on the Food Centre as the number of clients increased year over year. With this in mind, the Walkathon goals increased each year, even during the pandemic, from \$15,000 in the first year to \$50,000 this year.

The Food Centre manager, Dennis Hansen, leads 40 - 50 volunteers who work tirelessly to reach beyond their doors into the community to our marginalized citizens, that single mother, that new Canadian, the rooming house borders, the father who lost his job! They are open four days a week and have four to five bags of groceries for each client. That is amazing!

A long time member of Centretown Churches Social Action Committee, Patricia Marsden-Dole, better known as Paddy, died on August 26, 2025. She was the representative for St. Theresa's Parish on CCSAC. Paddy's husband, Paul Dole (deceased 2015), was also involved with CCSAC as its long-serving chairperson.

Paddy had an accomplished career: she was the first female Trade Commissioner with the Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce, Canada's Deputy High Commissioner to India, High Commissioner to Tanzania, Ambassador to Portugal, Director General of the International Markets Bureau of Agriculture Canada and Director General of the South and South East Asia Bureau of the Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade.

Even in her retirement she was a busy lady. She completed a Masters and Doctorate at St. Paul's University and founded the Centre for Aging and Community at the University. As the Coordinator of Social Justice for the Ottawa Archdiocese, she focused her efforts on making a difference in the Ottawa community. A very down-to-earth person, Paddy was a mother and grandmother and a joy to both friends and family.
