



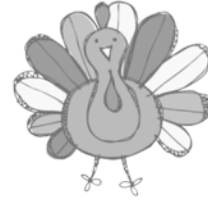

From the Pastor's Desk:

All Saints Day: Remembering the Communion of Saints

Each year on **November 1st**, Christians around the world pause to celebrate **All Saints Day**—a festival of remembrance, thanksgiving, and hope. In most churches this day is celebrated on the first Sunday in November as All Saints Sunday. In the Lutheran tradition, this day holds deep meaning as we give thanks for all those who have gone before us in faith, who now rest from their labors and live eternally with God.

The word *saint* in Scripture does not refer only to the especially holy or heroic. St. Paul wrote to the “saints in Corinth” and the “saints in Ephesus,” meaning all believers who had been made holy through baptism and faith in Christ. We, too, are numbered among the saints—not because of our own deeds or moral perfection, but because Christ has claimed us as his own, washed us clean, and called us into his holy people. As Luther reminds us, ‘We are at the same time saint and sinner (*simul justus et peccator*)’—forgiven and freed, yet still in need of grace each day.

All Saints Day invites us to look both backward and forward. We look back with gratitude for those who have shaped our faith: parents who prayed for us, teachers who opened the Scriptures, friends who encouraged us in hard times, and all those who have witnessed to Christ’s love in word and deed. We also look forward with hope to that great day when we will join them in the company of heaven, gathered around the throne of the Lamb, where death and mourning will be no more.

During All Saints Sunday, we will name those who have died in the past year, light candles in memory of people who were instrumental in our faith journey, and to hear once more the promise of resurrection. These acts are not just gestures of nostalgia—they are confessions of faith. In lighting a candle, we proclaim that the light of Christ shines even in the darkness of death. In reading the names of those we love, we affirm that they are still part of the body of Christ, joined with us in what Luther called the ‘communion of saints,’ the fellowship that unites the church on earth with the church in heaven.

For those who grieve, All Saints Day can bring both tears and comfort. It reminds us that grief is not a sign of weak faith—it is the cost of love. But even as we mourn, we hear again Jesus’ promise: ‘Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.’ (Matthew 5:4)

This year, as we gather for All Saints Sunday, let us give thanks for the cloud of witnesses who have gone before us and for the grace that makes us part of that same communion. And let us live as saints today—imperfect, forgiven, and shining with the light of Christ in our world.

Throughout many generations as the celebration and festivities continue, Oktoberfest today carries on a spirit of warmth, friendliness, belonging, and good cheer among those who celebrate. Many have also tied the festival into a harvest thanksgiving blending gratitude to God with community celebration.

As I walked the streets smelling the food from various vendors and churches, watched children and adults gather to share meals and stories in the chaos of it all, strolled the crafts that showcased unique talents and gifts of the community, experienced the fascination and excitement of watching the hot air balloons, and gathered to celebrate the community in the parade, I felt Seymour embodying a spirit of belonging, warmth, and good cheer. As we celebrate times together in this community God remains at work through and among us, Oktoberfest was a time when we gathered in fellowship, gratitude, and unity. As we enter into seasons of gathering with family, friends, and community, let us be intentional about finding joy in the community to break bread together and praise God for all the warmth, friendliness, belonging, and good cheer in our lives.

UPCOMING WORSHIP

Below are the lessons and some thoughts about the upcoming Sundays. Please

November 2nd:

Text— Luke 6:20-31 (All Saints Sunday)

In holy baptism God makes saints out of sinners. In holy communion God forgives the sins of all the saints. In the assembly today we give thanks for all the saints “who from their labors rest,” who have fought the good fight, who have gained the crown. In the same breath we petition our God for the strength to hear and to heed the admonitions of the Lord Jesus in today’s gospel. Recalling that we have been sealed by the Spirit and sustained by the Savior’s body and blood, we keep on keeping on as God gives us breath, to the praise of God’s glory.

November 9th:

Text --Luke 20:27-38

We worship on the first day of the week because our Savior was raised on that day. Every Sunday is a little Easter. This Sunday feels more like Easter than many as the appointed texts celebrate the reality of the resurrection. Live it up this Lord’s day. Our God is the God of the living.

November 16th:

Text—Luke 21:5-19

The end is near. There is no doubt about it. The warnings are dire. The tone of today’s texts is ominous. But the baptized know how to live in the ‘meantime.’ The baptized are strengthened for the living of these days in word and sacrament. The baptized rally around the invitation of the apostle: ‘Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.’

November 23rd:

Text—Luke 23:33-43 (Christ the King Sunday)

Jeremiah’s promise of the execution of “justice and righteousness in the land” finds ironic fulfillment in the execution of Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews. It appears so utterly contradictory that the king should be crucified with the criminal. This victory appears for all the world as ignominious defeat. Yet through the gate of death our Lord opens the door to paradise.

November 30th:

Text— Matthew 24:36-44 (Advent 1)

The new church year begins with a wake-up call: Christ is coming soon! In today’s readings both Paul and Jesus challenge us to wake from sleep, for we know neither the day nor hour of the Lord’s coming. Isaiah proclaims the day when God will gather all people on the holy mountain and there will be no more war or suffering. Though we vigilantly watch for the promised day of salvation, we wait for what we already have: Christ comes along us this day as the word and meal that strengthens our faith in the promises of God.

Bible Study Series: Words We Use, Words We Need to Understand

If you have ever sat in a worship service and thought, *'I've heard that word a hundred times... but what does it really mean?'*—you're not alone. Church life is full of words that roll off our tongues easily, yet their depth and richness can sometimes escape us. Words like *grace*, *forgiveness*, and *repentance* are at the heart of the Christian faith, but familiarity can sometimes lead us to overlook their true meaning and power.

This fall, our congregation will begin a special series of Bible studies exploring **common church words**—words we use often but may not fully grasp.

In November, we study Repentance. Repentance is not just 'feeling sorry' for our sins. The Bible describes it as a turning—turning away from sin and toward God. In Acts 3:19, Peter proclaims, *'Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord.'* Repentance is both an inward change of heart and an outward change in the way we live. It is a gift of God's Spirit, leading us back into His embrace.
