

The Revs. Kara and Nelson Mejia are no longer ministering in Honduras. They have moved to Michigan, USA. I'm not going to get into details here, but you can read all about their new ministry online at *NB Anglican*.

Their new ministry is helping a church's mission program by getting material translated into Spanish to help the Spanish churches with whom this church is connected.

They are hoping that this will help open doors for their own Spanish ministry in the future. They are still in need of financial assistance and will appreciate anything ACW branches can send along.

Again, the Diocese no longer funds Kara and Nelson, so if you still want to support them, send your donations to the ACW Diocese of Fredericton account and send it to me. I have an address to forward the money to them that Kara has given me.

If you were to support the Flooring Fund for Farraline Place, please send that donation as well to the ACW account to me. The board wants me to save the money for them. If the money is sent to the home, its just gets put into the general fund and not saved for the flooring.

I am going to remind you all of the following: I have been warned by the bank that it will not accept any cheques that are not filled out properly. They would not allow me to deposit a cheque that didn't have "Fredericton" on the cheque a few weeks ago.

Please make the cheque out to "ACW Diocese of Fredericton." I will be returning cheques to the senders to have them filled out properly.

Peggy and I enjoyed our time with the Woodstock Deanery as they held their Annual and also with the Shediac Deanery in Aulac as they held Quiet Day.

Unfortunately, because of my injury, we could not attend the annual meeting in Miramichi/Chaleur or even our own Deanery, Fredericton/York. I'm so sorry to have disappointed so many.

Can we imagine a new way to be the ACW?

(When the Son of Man comes, will He find faith on the earth?" (Luke 18:8b)

I was looking forward to the Fredericton/York Deanery Annual meeting on Oct. 16.

Two of us from the Parish of Stanley drove to Minto and ducked raindrops to enter the church for registration.

We were 10 minutes shy of 10 o'clock, so we expected to see a bevy of ladies mingling, drinking

coffee and enjoying muffins.

We walked in the door and saw about five people. Assuming that everyone else was later than us, we asked who else was coming, and we were told, "You're it."

It was an annual meeting, with a date set months before, and less than 10 people were present.

The ladies of Minto and Chipman had spent many hours preparing for this event, printing booklets and bulletins, arranging music and a service of Holy Communion.

They had cooked a lovely luncheon of turkey pot pie, gingerbread and whipped cream, tea, coffee, as well as mountains of muffins.

They had also invited a guest speaker who gave us a terrific presentation which was truly inspiring.

We had driven from Fredericton and could have transported anyone who needed a ride, but no one reached out asking for one.

The business meeting was shorter than usual because none of the executive were present with the necessary documents. It felt very awkward.

Apparently the organizers were not informed until the day before that this would happen.

Given that so much work had gone into preparing this meeting, I think the hosts should have been treated with more consideration.

But, all that being said, I was impressed by the faithfulness of the ladies who hosted, and who have been showing up over the years to ensure that the work of ACW continues throughout this diocese.

I commend the ladies of Minto, Chipman, and Stanley who continue to show up and participate in this ministry.

Sadly, of the eight ACWs that attended the Fredericton/York meeting last year, all but three have disbanded.

Perhaps that's the sort of ministry we need to be concentrating on. Some of our hospitals have invited churches to lead worship services, and we all know that nursing homes welcome as many volunteers as they can get.

Should we be less about business and more about spiritual care?

It's easy to complain, but a lot harder to come up with positive suggestions.

I'm an optimist by inclination, so I certainly think we should be open to the possibility of change.

Can we imagine a new way of being ACW? Can we open ourselves up to see where our Lord is leading us?

Is our shepherd leading us into new pastures?

The Rev. Harley Clowater, presiding at Holy Communion for our meeting, had us read the 23rd Psalm in the King James Version. I think these timeless words might inspire us:

"He makes me to lie down in green pastures: he leads me beside the still waters. He restores my soul; he leads me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake . . ."

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever. But we aren't.
