FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Siblings,

"But those who wait for the LORD shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint." – Isaiah 40:31

Grace and peace be with you all. Welcome to November and the season of Advent. This month, traditionally, especially in Europe, has been referred to as the month of death. This is because at this time of year leaves wither and fall, crops are harvested, livestock is butchered for winter food, and trees are cut for firewood. As we have already noticed in our part of the world, the sun is sinking lower in the sky, daylight is shortened, and darkness is lengthened. As we go through all these climatic and environmental changes, there is hope that the sun will return, leaves and grass will regrow, and that the world around us will be beautiful again. But none of these will happen now; they will happen later in the Spring. So, we have to wait. Unfortunately, waiting of any kind is not easy and it requires patience and much more. And that is what our Advent season is about.

Advent is about waiting in anticipation for the coming of Christ. Unlike the spring season, in which we must wait passively for the leaves and everything else to return, Advent is not pointless waiting. It is a waiting that requires faith, trust, and hope in God's abiding presence. So, the question is, *how can we wait, and what does Advent Waiting involve?* Advent waiting requires active preparation. But what does this mean? It means that we wait while staying engaged in prayer and in the word of God rather than passively hoping for the coming of Christ. I would therefore like to share two suggestions to help you engage during this Advent season.

Text or talk to a family member and friends about a weekly Advent theme (hope, peace, love, and joy). Engage a family member or a friend during the weeks in Advent with a simple question like, "What is something you are hoping for?" "How have you felt God's peace this week?" or "Where do you need God's peace in your life right now?" How have you received or shown love this week? What brings joy to you, your friend, or your family nowadays?

As you wait, engage the Lord through his word. Reading the Christmas story is one way to wait for the coming of Christ during Advent. By reading, especially, the nativity stories found in the gospels of Luke (chapters 1-2) and Matthew (chapters 1 and 2), or in Isaiah 9:1-7, we experience what we have experienced anew, even as we prepare to hear it again. By reading these biblical stories in preparation for the coming of Christ, we open our hearts for Christ to be born into us.

People of God, faithful waiting during Advent is a mark of discipleship, and it requires faith, humility, patience, courage, and prayer. As we await and prepare for the second coming of the Lord during this Advent season, let us slow down and make room in our hearts for Christ.

COUNCIL NEWS

Church Council met Monday, October 13, 2025.

The meeting was called to order and Concerns and Thanksgivings were shared. Thanksgivings were expressed for the wonderful Bell Choir concert presented by the choirs of Middle Spring Presbyterian Church and Memorial Lutheran ringers. A reception followed the concert for a time of fellowship. Thanksgiving was given for Jessi Alspaugh's *Welcome to Memorial* bulletin board design for fall. The announcement of Pastor Richard Jorgensen's transition from his role as Director for Evangelical Mission for synod to Intentional Interim Pastor at Camp Hill Presbyterian Church was shared. Thanksgiving was given for his assistance to MLC. Mary Beth Fishel noted that we should make a point of welcoming visitors to Memorial on Reformation Sunday, October 26th for our "Homecoming" celebration event.

Devotions were led by Tasha Koenig. Tasha shared a reading from the devotional booklet *Word and Seasons*, followed by prayer.

The names of those nominated for the 2026 Church Council election at the November 16th congregational meeting were approved as follows: Elder, Susan Lyons; Trustee, Ryan Leach; Deacon, Vicki (Gimmi) Connor, Ron Luffy, Jacob McCole, and Cindy Pimental. Chairman Bill Drake thanked his fellow committee members Sue Lyons and Edie Wright for serving on this committee. The Finance Ministry presented the proposed 2026 Budget to Council; Council approved it without changes. Treasurer Bob Snyder and the committee were thanked for their hard work on this and all the financial duties they oversee. The real estate property tax that MLC has been assessed for on the upper parking lot on South Penn Street, across from the church, has been removed. Thanks to Ed Straley for his diligence and hard work getting this resolved.

Church Property reported that the boilers have been checked and are ready to go and the kitchen stove has been serviced. Estimates are being sought for the retaining wall project. The Safety and Security Task Force is checking with Lehman's about a handicap entrance for the Orange & Penn Street location. Dan Mast is preparing a proposal for lighting in the Archives Room. Galen Piper is handling the property maintenance for the winter season's ice and snow conditions.

Worship & Music Ministry reported that as we return to a fall worship routine some changes will be made to the order of the service. Special music by the choirs will be offered, introits, benedictions, as well as communion hymns, on selected Sundays. Invitations will be sent out by the Outreach Ministry to former members for the *Homecoming* Celebration event for Reformation Sunday, October 26th with a reception to follow. Pastor Godfred shared a questionnaire, Church Council's Fall Considerations for thought and discussion. He was unable to be at the meeting as he was attending the Lead Pastors Development Program seminar at Camp Lutherlyn.

Women of the ELCA will hold its monthly meeting Wednesday, October 15th. Linda Eves attended the district board meeting. She shared that the group is looking at new programs; more information to follow. Archives will have the assistance of our Boy Scout Troop #120 for moving their collection to their new 2nd floor Archives Room on Tuesday, October 21st.

Reminders: Church Council Workshop meeting for the MLC Ministry & Organizations Handbook Saturday, October 18th and the Pork & Sauerkraut community dinner Saturday, November 8th (dinner cost is by donation).

With no further business to be brought to the table, the meeting was adjourned with the praying of the Lord's Prayer. The next meeting of the Church Council will be Monday, November 10, 2025.

NURTURING A CULTURE OF GENEROSITY

As you consider your giving to the church next year, please consider how you can grow in your generosity.

An idea for someone whose income has gone down in the last year:

Even if the total dollars given decreases, people can still grow in generosity. Consider this: if before your income decreased you were giving away 2% of your income, with income being less, can you find a way to grow the percentage of giving to 3 or 4%. There are people in our congregation who will need to decrease the total dollars given because of loss of work or other reasons.



Other ideas:

- 1. Systematic giving leads to generosity: For most people, we can grow significantly in our giving just by making our gift on a regular basis. Sign up for automatic giving by contacting Amy in our church office or just add an amount each week or month. Growing giving by \$1 per day equates to significant growth over the course of the year.
- 2. An extra gift or two during the year: A story was shared from a congregation that participated in this program last year about someone who said, "I'm not sure what the future holds for me, but for now I am doing okay, so I will double my giving in the month of April". Well, what if we decided to double our giving one month or even two months next year?
- 3. Grow by a percentage each year: For some, the idea of a tithe is unachievable in a single year, but something people would like to reach someday. By growing giving by percentage each year, it is achievable over the long-term. If you currently give away 3% of income, perhaps you can reach 4% next year and 5% the year after. This takes discipline, but over the long-term is effective for some.

You may have your own ideas for growing in generosity. As a church family, growing in generosity together will have a tremendous overall impact.

ADVENT SEASON



Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from the Latin "ad-venire," meaning "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to Christmas.

The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ's second coming at the end of time, even as we commemorate Our Lord's birth on Christmas. From the earliest days of the Church, people have been fascinated by Jesus' promise to come back. But the scripture readings during Advent tell us not to waste our time with predictions. Advent is not about speculation.

Advent is a time of hopeful preparation for the coming of the Lord. During Advent, the mother church invites us to enter more deeply into the prayerful nature of the season. Our Advent readings call us to be alert and ready, not weighted down and distracted by the cares of this world (Luke 21:34-36). The four weeks of Advent always offer us the opportunity for congregational discernment and individual examination or assessment of our faith journey as we prepare to commemorate the birth of Christ with our eyes firmly fixed on his second coming in glory. Our theme for this coming Advent season is "Journeying the way of love through the voices of Advent".

SUNDAYS IN ADVENT: SERMON SERIES

We shall have a sermon series during the four Sundays in Advent on the theme "Journeying the way of Love". This series will offer us the opportunity to explore how biblical figures demonstrated love to God's call as we bring our Year of Prayer to an end. We will also learn that saying yes to journey with the Lord involves not just the individual but our family and friends, our community, and the world.

ADVENT MIDWEEK SERVICES - VOICES OF ADVENT

During our Advent Wednesday night services, we will be listening to the voices of faithful people who anticipated with great joy the magnificence of Jesus's birth and praised God when Christmas dawned. By hearing the hopeful messages in their voices, we will be invited and challenged to contemplate not just the historic celebration of Christmas but, most importantly, the second coming of Christ, asking ourselves what we must do to prepare for it. Through our Advent Wednesday night services, we will be hearing the voices of:



Mary, the baby leaped in her womb.

John the Baptist: Preparing the way of the Lord.

The Virgin Mary: Proclaiming hope and justice

Zechariah and Elizabeth: Clarifying new discoveries with old insights

Although we continue to serve over 400 families every week, we celebrate the blessings that have come our way – a new full-time staff member, awesome volunteers, grants, donations, partners, supporters, and prayers.

As a reminder, the Thanksgiving distribution will be held November 18^{th,} and we are planning for 600 families. On that date we will distribute a box of traditional Thanksgiving food plus food for the week. Our families will also receive a gift card to a Weis to select the meat or alternative of their choice. Traffic will be very heavy from 2:00 pm to 6:00 pm, so we encourage everyone to avoid the area during this time. OR – come help us. Join the Greyhound, Shippo the Hippo, Big Red, the Chick-fil-A cow, a dairy princess, and some surprises. No live animals will be included this year.

SPO again will be offering our Blessing Basket during this holiday season. Your contribution will help to fill a family's basket with eggs, grains, dairy, fruits, vegetables, or protein in prices ranging from \$5 to \$150. Look for the bright green forms and the descriptions of the items which can be found in our church bulletin or in the church office.

As we head into the holidays, this has been a hectic time for us as we have had over 80 new families registered since the beginning of September, prepared for Thanksgiving distribution, worked with SU on a documentary about SPO, and onboarded our new director.

In ordinary life we hardly realize that we receive a great deal more than we give, and that it is only with gratitude that life becomes rich.

ARCHIVES UPDATE

We have moved!

It has been a year since we have outgrown our small Archive office. Bob Gimmi, Susan Lyons, Karin Vargo, and Jan Nichols (Archivists) have had the daunting job of moving 250 years worth of documents housed on the first floor to a room on the second floor.

We selected a large room with a beautiful stained glass window. Much had to be done to bring the room up to archival standards. This was a costly operation. Next, we had to outfit the new office with archival shelving, equipment, supplies as well as setting up



the goal of digitizing documents. At the back of the room we have set up a small museum to showcase artifacts and interesting documents of the 250 years of our church history.

At the end, it has cost \$19,000 to complete the project. We must thank all the people who have helped us along the way. Most importantly we are fervently thankful for all our donors who have generously gifted us with \$19,514.

A special thanks to the 6 Boy Scouts that helped us moved our artifacts from the old Archives room to the new Archives room. They were fun, full of energy and amazing helpers. We couldn't have done it without them.

We remember and thank God as He has guided us along the way. We feel BLESSED!

PS. We hope to have an Open House as soon as we are more settled.
