

Nestled into my letter of call is that I am "to speak for justice on behalf of the poor and oppressed." Prophets, like Amos, Isaiah, and Jeremiah (whom we'll encounter this month in the Narrative Lectionary), always make me do some soul-searching. Some pastors understand their role as being a prophet, but I've often worried about how calling out warnings and hard truths can undermine other aspects of my call, including the slow work of nourishing faith through relationship and community building. I'm struck that prophetic work doesn't always happen in a sermon—that sometimes it is in being present in other places and other times.

Nestled into the baptismal covenant is that the baptized are to "work for justice and peace." Perhaps prophets should make us all do some soul-searching. Not that we all need to be prophets, but that as part of how we proclaim Christ in word and deed, and care for others and the world God made, we engage in prophetic work, responding to the warnings and the hard truths. Prophetic work has political ramifications, helping us live out spiritual imperatives in the day to day of the real world. Faith in action is inherently political; but it should not be partisan.

"Christ the King" Sunday (November 23) was instituted in 1925 to counter rising nationalism, fascism, and secularism—powers of this world that rebel against and draw us away from God. 100 years later, we see growing authoritarianism in our own country and policies built on hate, fear, and division. "Christ the King" reminds us of our ultimate allegiance to Christ. How do we stand up for healing the sick, feeding the hungry, and welcoming the stranger here and now? (Matthew 25:35-40) As we individually and collectively discern paths forward, I am grateful for a newly formed Mission & Justice Task Force that is working to offer parishioners the opportunity to participate in a mass action on Palm Sunday afternoon. In school, children are taught to Stop, Look, and Listen for trains before crossing railroad tracks. Wouldn't it be great if we use that same formula - Stop, Look, and Listen - as we approach life crossings? I have the gift of "ready, fire, aim." Yes, that's right. Ready, Fire, Aim. While that formula makes sense in rare instances, most of the time navigating life on the fly without stopping to consider the feelings of others, or making quick decisions without buy-in and clear direction from the key players, spells disaster. Today, our culture often demands instant decisions, perfect families, homes, and workplaces, and the ability to do it all on our own. It's kind of a "ready, fire, aim" mentality. If we stop to think about this for even one minute, it doesn't take long to see how unrealistic this all is. We are not perfect. We need people who take the time to listen and understand our stories of joy as well as our pain. We all need a reason to Stop! Look! and Listen!

For the next few weeks, several art pieces by Rocky Casillas Aguirre are being featured in the Bethel Narthex. Rocky's comics and creative efforts are inspired by personal struggles with anxiety, identity and the exploration of the mind. This partial exhibition is an attempt by the artist to break the silence on mental health. His art is especially impactful for youth. These pieces talk about the causes, science and remedies of stress. I invite you to stop and look at these works of art and then listen to your family, friends and coworkers. Ask good questions that don't require a yes or no answer. "Tell me about" is a wonderful conversation starter that works for nearly anyone.

November 2—"The Bethel Bell Petting Zoo"








I Can Make A Difference by Marian Wright Edelman

Revenue: \$623,359 <u>Expenses</u> -730,420 **Total** \$ (107,061)

In January, the congregation committed to a budget of \$1,010,760, which was the amount that the Finance Committee submitted as the amount needed to fund Bethel's 2025 ministry. We have held our expenses below budget by about \$30,000. However, the revenue has not kept pace and as of September 30, we are in a deficit of \$107,000. Please prayerfully consider how you can help clear this deficit. Thank you for all you give.
