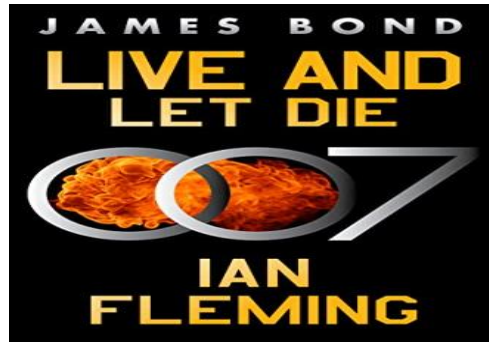

Die and Let Live

Live and Let Die is, by far, one of my favorite Ian Fleming books and James Bond movies. And noted as one of the greatest Bond songs by Paul McCartney and Wings.

The story of this Bond film begins when several British agents are mysteriously killed and James Bond is sent to investigate. His mission takes him to New York, New Orleans, and the Caribbean Island of San Monique. There, Bond uncovers a sinister plot orchestrated by Dr. Kananga, the island's prime minister, who secretly operates as the drug lord, Mr. Big, in the U.S. Kananga's plan is to flood the American market with free heroin to drive out competitors, creating a massive drug empire under his control. Bond allies with Solitaire, a beautiful tarot reader played by Jane Seymour, who possesses psychic powers but becomes disillusioned with Kananga after falling for Bond. Through a mix of espionage, action, and daring escapes—including a famous speedboat chase through the Louisiana bayous—Bond dismantles Kananga's operation. In the climax, Bond kills Kananga in his underground lair and rescues Solitaire.

Live and Let Die is a play on the phrase, live and let live. An idiom that means a person should live as he or she chooses and let others do the same. I must note that, like most James Bond movies (and Ian Fleming novels as a whole), some of the themes don't age well (i.e. -sexism). I, however, want to look at the phrase "live and let die" as a pattern of our faith life. Maybe, better yet, reverse it and say: Die and Let Live! I don't think it is a coincidence that during November, the church year follows this pattern.

We enter November with All Saint's Sunday, and conclude with Christ the King followed by Advent... Death to life. As nature displays this pattern while Autumn takes hold and Winter stares us in the face, we are confronted with the reality of death. We are, however, reminded in the middle of the darkness, a light arrives (Advent), emanating from Bethlehem. Our journey follows this same pattern. We live and let live in this life. We march toward the grave. Nevertheless, we who are people of Hope, know that death is not the end of our journey. Our story continues... And just as the sun transforms the dead of Winter into the new life of Spring, we are transformed into the glories of everlasting life.

The same can be said for the organization of the church. Like creation, the church has seasons. Not just liturgical. Seasons that usher in deaths. Patterns and ways of being sometimes die in order to give birth to what might be. Just like the liturgical calendar, before we embrace the newness of what is to come (Advent), we honour those of the past whose lives and sacrifices have carried us forward (All Saints). As we stand on the shoulders of the great cloud of witnesses who have gone on before us (Hebrews 12:1); we are propelled by their witness to reach for tomorrow. A tomorrow that is filled with possibilities and HOPE!

MESSAGE FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

Dear Hope family,

This fall has been a season full of activity and momentum at Hope! From worship and music to building projects, visioning conversations, and children's ministry, we are so grateful for the many people who have come together with energy, creativity, and grace to make it all happen. Council has a few important updates to share as we continue listening, discerning, and organizing for the future.

Organizational Review

Impact8 consultants are helping us look at how work gets done at Hope — both volunteer and paid. They're reviewing documents and speaking with key leaders to understand current roles and needs. Their recommendations, expected later this month, will guide us toward an organizational structure that fits who we are today and where we're going. Council and the Personnel Committee hope to make decisions in early December.

Exploring Shared Ministry with Unity Lutheran

Leaders from Unity Lutheran (the congregation serving newcomers from Hong Kong) have expressed interest in exploring shared ministry with Hope. Bishop Trish joined leaders from both congregations recently to discuss hopes, risks, and possibilities. These conversations are just beginning, and we're approaching them with curiosity and care.

Rooted in Hope Visioning

As we explore structure and partnership, we're also asking, Who are we called to be? Through the Rooted in Hope process, please share your reflections by:

- Writing on the Nurturing Connections board
- Completing the online survey (or ask the office for a written copy)
- Attending a Cottage Meeting with Pastor Greg

So far, we're hearing that Hope members value connection, belonging, helping one another, music, and fellowship. We're now moving toward identifying specific directions for our future—if you feel the Spirit nudging you, share your ideas with Pastor Greg or any Council member!

Getting Our House in Order

Council has updated key building contracts (custodial, recycling, electrical, snow removal—thank you Frank Mueller and Marianne Astle!) and engaged a commercial realtor to evaluate options for the preschool space, should the tenant not renew at the end of this year. This will help us consider how the space might serve our broader mission.

Children, Youth, and Shared Ministry in Action

Hope families joined Advent Lutheran in October for "Kids Camp Sunday," and on November 16, Hope will host the next Kids Camp, welcoming children and youth from Advent and Unity congregations. Extra hands for lunch and activities are welcome—contact Kim Harding or Zena to help.

Congregational Life Event – May This Church Be Like a Tree

On October 25, Zena Kuziej, Marianne Astle, and Gretchen Albers travelled to Red Deer to attend a congregational life event called **May This Church Be Like a Tree**, put on by the Synod of Alberta & The Territories.

This event, led by Katja Brittain, offered a chance for congregations from across the province to learn from each other about how to creatively re-approach some of the common building-related issues we face. These challenging trends, as outlined by Brittain, include the soaring costs of insurance, upkeep, and repairs, a declining volunteer base, and shrinking congregations who inhabit spaces that can now seem cavernously large. For far too many congregations, their physical spaces have become downright burdensome. What are we, as Lutherans, to do?!

Katja is a theologian who has walked many congregations through a process of creatively reframing how they view their church properties. She asks us to consider how our so-called “burdens” might instead become opportunities. We can use our imaginations to make sure our buildings function as tools rather than roadblocks for new ministries. The first half of the day featured a talk with many practical tips from Katja. She encouraged us all to closely analyze the use of space—for each hour of the week, room by room—in our church buildings, and to identify gaps and opportunities. She offered many examples of how congregations have found that increasing the level of mission-aligned usage of their buildings has fed into their congregational vitality. Growth and decline, she pointed out, travel both ways. We need to look for ways that our buildings and ministry can support, rather than strain, each other.

Many times, Katja said, a building’s potential can outpace the imagination and energy of its congregation. In that case, she recommended, it might be time to look for partners who can breathe more life into our spaces. She urged us not to give our spaces away for free, or cheap, and she gave many practical tips, such as making sure our church’s diverse user groups are aligned with our values; looking with an eye towards what our renters experience within our building (i.e., can they tell that we are a worshipping community? How does being within our building “feel” to an outsider?); and making sure that we are visible to our local community (perhaps by doubling up our Facebook presence by posting our events not just on our own Facebook page, but also on the local community groups, which Katja called the modern-day equivalent of the supermarket bulletin board).

After a lunch worship led by Kristian Wold, the second half of the day featured break-out sessions on diverse topics like the practicalities of church amalgamations, a how-to session on increasing building usage, and an exploratory discussion about hybrid/online church. I personally sat in on the latter session, which offered a theological lens on online worship experiences. Katja’s toolkit for reviewing and further developing online or hybrid churches asks intriguing questions, such as how can digital spaces and tools connect with the in-person life and building use? How can we bridge the gap between online and in-person experiences? How do we engage with and minister to online worshippers more directly? How can we make hybrid worship more participatory and relational?

Church buildings, like the trees in the hymn, are living things. They live through seasons. As Bishop Trish remarked in her closing comments, though we “own” them, they ultimately belong to God, as do all our gifts! The Synod promised that on their new website (apparently coming soon) some of Katja’s toolkits filled with practical tips and exercises will be available for download.

Zena will be away November 27 – December 5th.

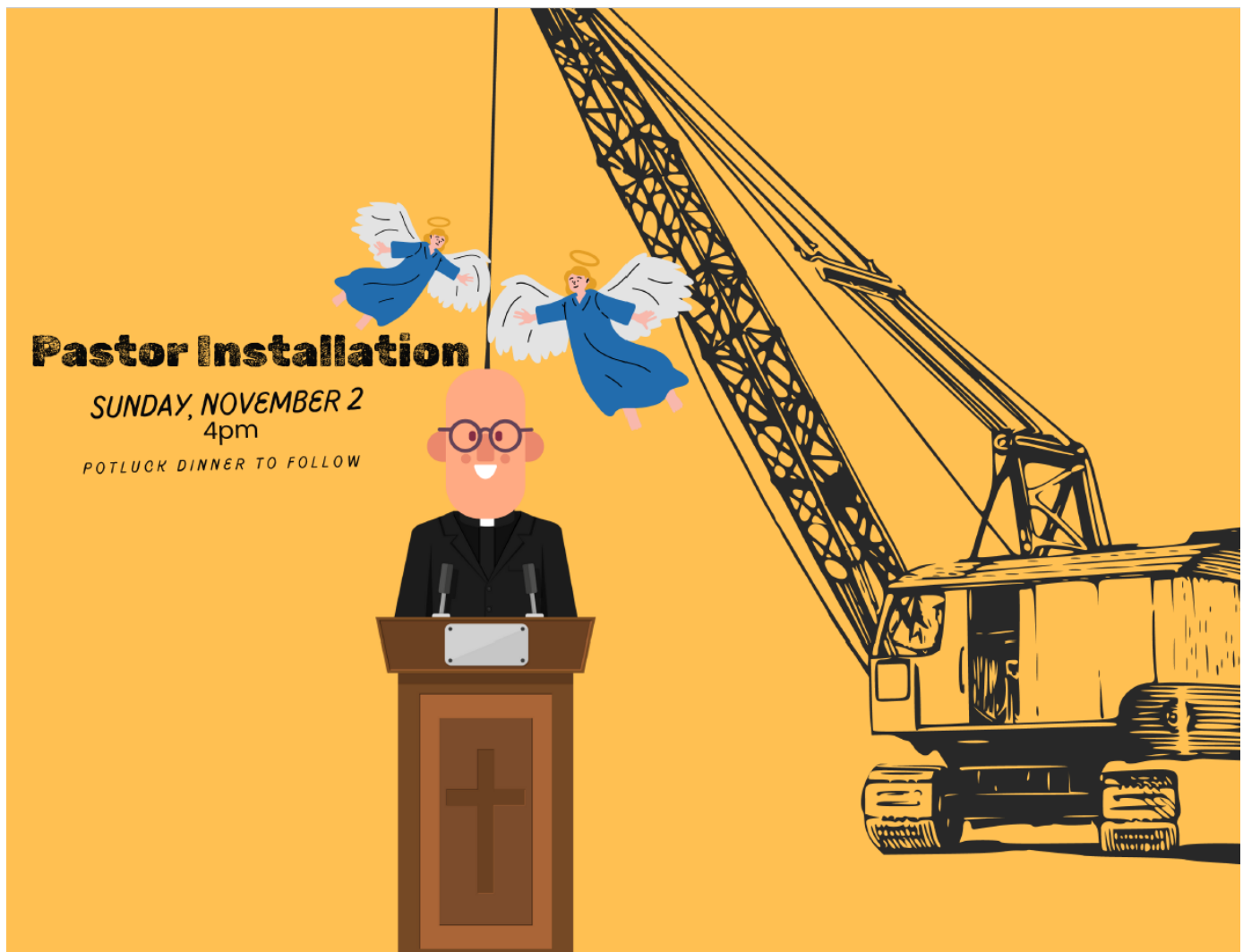

CHARITY OF CHOICE

Thank you for donating non-perishable food items and monetary donations to the Calgary Food Bank throughout October.

Our Charity of Choice for November and December is Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR).



"Inspired by God's love for the world, CLWR challenges and responds to the injustice which causes human suffering and poverty. We are committed to working alongside our partners to build resilience through a continual shared learning approach. As an international relief and development agency of the Lutheran communities, CLWR provides opportunities for Canadians to respond to national and international needs."

By March 2025, CLWR has provided the following advances toward these programs:

- Gender Responsive and Inclusive TVET project, Palestine \$1.1M
- Nature Based Solutions project in Chad & Cameroon \$1.9M
- Humanitarian Assistance project in Amhara, Ethiopia \$1M
- Humanitarian Assistance project in Ethiopia, Somalia and South Sudan \$2.2M
- Humanitarian Assistance project in Colombia and Haiti \$1.6M

Some more specifics of a couple of their programs:

Sudan

- Supporting families who have crossed the border into Chad to escape the violence from the Rapid Support Forces fighting the Sudanese army (began mid- April 2023). At least 30,000 people fled to Chad seeking refuge in the first month.
- CLWR provided emergency assistance to nearly 3,000 people, constructed emergency latrines, handwashing facilities and showers, and rehabilitated damaged community water sources which benefited over 11,000 people

- Vulnerable populations are prioritized and 588 families received cash support for shelter and critical household supplies.

Ukraine

- As of February 2024, more than 8 million refugees fled Ukraine and 6 million were internally displaced
- CLWR has delivered 1,631 metric tons of food & non-food items, \$9.8 million worth of medical equipment

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FROM THE WIDER CHURCH

Bishop Trish's October Message



"If another member of the church sins against you..." Matthew 18

Matthew 18 feels like Jesus is sitting us down and saying, "Let's talk about what it really means to live together." This whole chapter is about community, and at the center of it is reconciliation—how we deal with hurt, conflict, and forgiveness when things go wrong. And let's be honest: in any community, things do go wrong.

Right in the middle of the chapter is the parable of the lost sheep. This is one of those stories we never get tired of hearing: a shepherd leaves ninety-nine sheep to search for the one that wandered off. Why? Because every single person matters. God doesn't write people off, and that's the same spirit we're supposed to carry into reconciliation.

Jesus then gets super practical: "If someone sins against you, go talk to them directly." (He probably shouldn't have said "if" but "when!") No gossip. No threats. No social media. No letters. Just you and them, face to face. If that doesn't work, bring a couple of others. If that still doesn't work, bring it before the community. It takes a lot of trust when we feel vulnerable or hurt. It's a slow, thoughtful process, and the goal is both accountability and restoration—not shaming, not punishing, not winning an argument.

Reconciliation, according to Matthew 18, isn't optional. It's the heartbeat of Christian community. It means starting with humility, pursuing one another like God pursues the lost, having honest conversations, and practicing forgiveness over and over again.

When Peter asked the question everyone was thinking, "Okay, but how many times do I have to forgive? Seven times?" (He probably thought that was generous.) Jesus replies, "Not seven—seventy times seven." In other words, stop counting. Forgiveness isn't a math problem; it's a way of life.

Our world is quick to cancel, quick to divide, quick to walk away. Jesus calls us to be different. He calls us to do the hard work of mending, forgiving, and restoring. That's what reconciliation looks like, and it's the way God's kin-dom comes alive right here among us.

Time was when most kids had a hobby of collecting something, whether it be stamps, coins, sticks or stones. My cousin, Shirley, collected paper napkins, or serviettes (her preferred term.)
