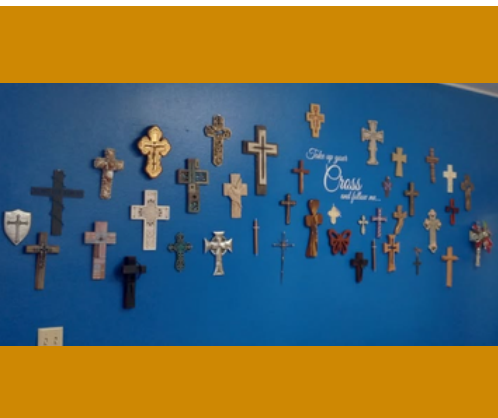

A Message from the Pastor

A Season of Renewal: Sabbatical 2026

This coming summer, from May 18 through August 17, 2026, I will be entering a season of sabbatical—a time set apart for rest, renewal, and reconnection with God’s calling. In Scripture, sabbath and sabbatical time are sacred rhythms woven into the life of God’s people. They remind us that God’s work does not depend on our constant activity, but on God’s ongoing grace.



A sabbatical is not simply time off; it is a time of spiritual restoration. It allows space to listen more deeply, to be refreshed in body and spirit, and to return renewed with vision and energy for ministry. It is a counterintuitive practice—doing less so that more of God’s renewing Spirit can do its work. In that sacred rest, the fruits of sabbatical begin to grow: new energy, fresh perspective, rekindled passion, and deepened faith.

Our congregation received a grant from the Lilly Foundation which specializes in sabbaticals and investing in spiritual renewal for the church. This unexpected gift will fund the activities for both me and the congregation. Out of the thousands of applicants every year, this organization validates the sabbatical proposal is a solid enough investment.

While I am away, our congregation will continue to thrive and grow. Our leadership teams have been prayerfully preparing for this season so that our ministry remains vibrant and connected:

- Our Worship Team is shaping meaningful summer worship themes and ensuring strong pastoral leadership in the pulpit each week. They are preparing creative and inspiring ways for us to stay connected as a worshipping community.
- Our Compassion Team is coordinating care within the congregation, ensuring that no one walks alone. They will continue to offer support, prayer, and accompaniment for those in need, reminding us that we are always the body of Christ together.

This season will be an opportunity not only for me but for our entire congregation to reflect on who we are and how God is calling us to grow. Sabbatical time invites all of us to practice trust—to remember that the church’s life and mission are sustained by God’s Spirit, not by any one person.

My hope is that when this sabbatical concludes in August, we will all be renewed: strengthened in faith, refreshed in spirit, and ready to embrace the next season of ministry with fresh energy, vision, and joy. Furthermore, the sabbatical is not meant to end, rather that is only the beginning. In the fall of 2026 our congregation will explore the fruits of that time and ask for God’s Spirit to revitalize our mission.

Thank you for your prayers, support, and partnership as we prepare for this special season of renewal. May this time remind us that rest is not idleness—it is the soil where new life begins to bloom.

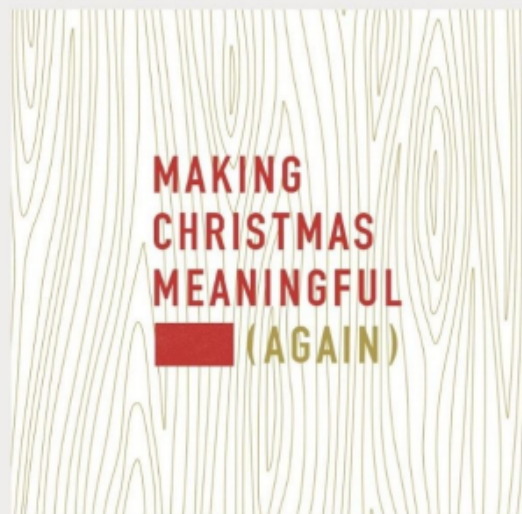

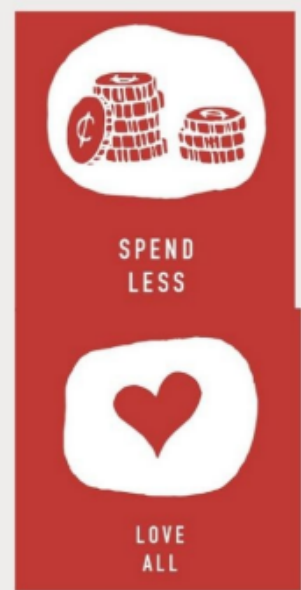

Council Corner - Report from October 2025

Council Corner – October 2025

Here are a few of the issues the Council discussed in September.

- **Leadership Retreat** – A leadership retreat was held on October 18. Our Ministry Team leaders, Governance Team leaders, and others will come together to work on defining a clear and simplified structure for how ministries are carried out at Peace. The work of the church will focus on four key areas:
 - o Stewardship – Through Baptism, everything belongs to God. Stewardship focuses on how we manage what God has provided and invest in growing His kingdom.
 - o Worship – Worship is how we love God, through praise, music, prayer, and communion.
 - o Discipleship – Jesus calls us to discipleship. This area focuses on how we nurture spiritual health and develop servants.
 - o Community – Community is how we love people, both inside and outside of the church. Developing community focuses on connections, compassion, partnerships, and service.
- **Sabbatical** – Peace has received a Clergy Renewal Program Grant from the Lilly Endowment for \$50,500 to support a sabbatical in 2026. The sabbatical is intended to support pastoral and congregational renewal. Please check the newsletter or eblast for a link to a video with more information about the sabbatical, and we will continue to share more information over the coming months.
