Dear Beloved of God.

#### COUNCIL UPDATE



The Sufis have a saying that "each man opines in accordance with his own hidden prejudices," and this seems to be true in my case. I have some Engineering training, and all my notes seem to start with physical infrastructure. On that note, I'm a little concerned that we seem to have some experimentation going on with the sound and lighting systems in the church. No damage has been done, but we've had a few things that cause consternation on Sunday mornings: one of the buttons on the Preset Ten had its programming cleared, and part of our normal setup sequence - all lights on full - just turned off all the lights in the Sanctuary; this past Sunday, someone swapped circuits on the microphones for the cantor and the piano, causing a brief flurry of activity during sound checks; and we recently found that the piano had been moved after being carefully positioned to accommodate the choir. As I said, no damage has occurred so far, but these tweaks cause quite a bit of pressure for Catherine and the Tech Team who only have a limited time to prepare for Service.

By now, everyone has seen that we did get the TV mounted by the south entrance to the Sanctuary, and are using it as an electronic bulletin board, to rebroadcast the Sunday morning announcements, And, although it's less noticeable, you may have noticed the blinds that Hilary Gray and Glen Schultz have installed in the Fellowship Hall to help with Trudy Hooge's monthly Movie Night.

Everyone will also have noticed from the wall thermometer that the Furnace Replacement Fund continues to increase. We still have all the usual expenses: personnel costs, utilities, grounds maintenance, office supplies and so on to address so we are asking that you consider directing your gifts to the end of the year to our general budget. It's important we avoid a deficit in 2026. With this in mind, council held a meeting on October 25th to start planning the 2026 budget. Pleases come join us as we share about our budget planning process and councils hopes for 2026 following service on November 9, 2025.

With that, we're still looking ahead to the Annual General Meeting. Once again, we encourage all members of the congregation to ask themselves whether they feel the call to serve on Council. I remember one time when a stranger came to the church to see the gingerbread model we had of the Hallsgrimkirkja in Iceland. As we were chatting, she casually asked me "So are you one of the Elders of the Church?" I was about to correct her (we call them the Council, not the Elders), when I realized with a slight shock that that phrase described me quite accurately. Time had snuck up on me, and indeed I had become one of the elders. So will you all some day, and if Council needs the wisdom and knowledge of its elders, it also needs the strength and courage of those still in their prime. So think of joining the Council now - before you become an actual Elder - and know that you would be received with joy and gratitude. Thanks as always to Pastor Lindsey, the Council and all the members of the congregation who are contributing their time and talents to making the church a place where all are welcome

# WELCOMING ALL TO OUR COMMUNITY IS A GIFT



No church is automatically friendly - especially to those visiting for the first time. It can feel like a huge risk to put yourself out there and attend a new church. Most studies show today that people usually visit a church because of a personal invite, close proximity, viewing an online service, or aligning values / theology. However, when they choose to stay it's because they've made meaningful connections there.

Genuine friendships are so pivotal with in a community of faith - but we don't develop relationships without being intentional about it. If we want people to feel at home and welcomed within our congregation, we need to intentionally focus on connecting with them as they come to visit us.

One of the simple ways a church can become more intentional about welcoming is through the GIFT Model: Greeting, Introducing, Following-up, and Thanking. We know how to do all these so well at Church of the Cross - but when we intentionally put these steps together it can make all the difference in forming a foundational connections with those we have just met.

#### **Four Steps of GIFT:**

- **1. Greet someone you've never met before:** Get out of your comfort zone. Find someone whose name you don't know and learn it. Welcome them if they're new or offer to sit with them if they come to church alone. Share how you came to this congregation and what keeps you coming back. Ask them what brought them to church today? Or how they found out about Church of the Cross. Discover something about them. Get to know them if they've been around for a while, but you just haven't met them yet.
- **2.** Introduce people to each other: After meeting someone, make sure they meet others, too. Connect people who have something in common. Introduce a first-time guest to someone with a shared interest. If you are able, ask the visitor to sign our guest book so that Pastor Lindsey can connect with them.
- **3. Follow up on someone you met recently:** Find that person you met a week or two ago and say "hi" again. Call them by name. Engage in further conversation. Invite them to an upcoming church event, small group, or community gathering (hint: check the newsletter or Thursdays Thoughts for the latest events).
- **4. Thank someone who did something you appreciate:** Every church has people who volunteer their time and efforts with very little, if any appreciation shown to them. Sometimes it's a simple "thank you" to our ushers, tech team, or worship leaders. If some one has done something to inspire you or help you in your journey of faith let them know. Encouragement costs nothing, but it's worth a great deal.

Our congregation is already such a friendly and welcoming place - but imagine if wre each tried to greet, introduce, followed up, or thank someone every week. It would truly be a gift to our guests and our church family.

#### Season of Creation: 7 Sacred Teachings



This year we celebrated the season of Creation through an exploration of the Seven Sacred Teachings. The teachings originate from the Seven Grandfather Teachings from the Anishinaabe people and have been adopted by many (but not all) First Nations, Metis, and Inuit Peoples. Each week we explored a teachings and its themes. The Seven sacred teachings include love, respect, honesty, courage, wisdom, humility, and truth - with each teaching represented by an animal. #### **ELCIC UPDATES**



Urgent call to prayer as peace nears in Gaza

Dear Beloved Members of God's Family in the ELCIC, Just two days ago, we wrote in commemoration of the second anniversary of the war between Israel and Hamas. Today, our hearts are filled with hope at the news that the beginnings of a peace deal have been reached. We implore you to pray with us now that this fragile window for peace will hold and become the foundation for a lasting, just peace for all Israelis and Palestinians.

Since Hamas' mass killing and kidnapping of Israeli citizens on October 7, 2023, tens of thousands of Palestinians have been killed through imposed starvation and indiscriminate attacks, including on hospitals, schools, shelters and places of worship. Prior to the October 7 attack, decades of violence and oppression have shaped the lives of all Palestinians — who have been denied basic rights, including self-determination — and of all Israelis.

Our prayer today, as it has been for many years, is for all Palestinians and Israelis to experience the fulness of peace, safety and dignity that we believe God desires for them.

Please join us in prayer that peace would take effect immediately, with all captives released, and that humanitarian access would be immediate and unhindered so the mercy of Christ can reach all those in critical need.

#### Please pray with us:

God of peace, We can barely comprehend the pain and sorrow experienced by so many in Israel and Palestine these last two years. We receive this news of potential peace with broken and hopeful hearts, and we turn to you, source of hope and comfort. Strengthen the resolve of world leaders to make peace and end violence. Comfort all who grieve and answer the prayers of those longing for the sound of bombs to stop. Make straight the way for life-saving aid and healing from trauma to reach all those whose lives have been shattered by this war. Bring compassion and understanding to all, and stir in hearts a commitment to lasting peace. Amen.

#### **LWF UPDATES**



#### Christians must make God's unity and reconciliation visible

The Lutheran World Federation General Secretary Rev. Dr Anne Burghardt said the task of Christians is to make visible God's unity and reconciliation, "taking the risk of being transformed" by our neighbors. Her reflections came at the conclusion of the Sixth World Conference on Faith and Order which has been taking place in Wadi El-Natrun in Egypt.

The Lutheran leader spoke about "shalom, salam, God's all-encompassing peace, that is God's will for the people of God." But she contrasted that peace with conflicts that continue to rage in countries around the world today, from the wars in Gaza, Ukraine and elsewhere, to the socio-ethical questions that continue to deeply divide families and societies. "Politicians too often only fuel these disagreements and increase polarization," she noted. Churches are challenged to offer an alternative reaction, Burghardt said, showing "respect for each other's dignity as for the dignity of God's beloved children." She asked: "Are we able to remain respectful towards each other while disagreeing on a number of issues? Or will we follow the countless examples of digging trenches on opposite sides of the road, when the road between us could lead us forward?"

We cannot create unity ourselves; God is the source of unity.

"From the way we relate to one another, the world should know we are disciples of Christ," Burghardt continued, reflecting on the nature of human relationships with God, with each other and with the whole of creation. The Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed, which has been a central focus of the conference, offers a perfect example of the three persons of the Trinity "fully existing in relation to one another," she said. "We cannot create unity ourselves; God is the source of unity," she concluded. "Our task is to make this unity, this reconciliation visible [....] taking the risk of being transformed by the other, by our neighbor, who also follows Christ, who is with us on the journey."

The 24 to 28 October gathering was the first World Conference since 1993 organized by the World Council of Churches (WCC) Faith and Order Commission. LWF Assistant General Secretary for Ecumenical Relations, Prof. Dirk Lange also attended the meeting, noting the importance of holding this Faith and Order Conference to mark the 1,700th anniversary of the First Ecumenical Council of Nicaea. The Council, called by the Roman Emperor Constantine, began the work of drawing up the Creed as a unifying statement of faith, to which all Christians of that era could adhere. "The Council of Nicaea sought to find new language to address misleading theologies," Lange said, "and in so doing confessed the Gospel of Jesus Christ in its day. It set the precedence for the Lutheran Confessional writings.

The Faith and Order conference was hosted by the Coptic Orthodox Church and focused its discussions on the theme 'Where now for visible unity?' It brought together theologians from different parts of the world and marked the first time that such a historic gathering has been held in the global south. Through lectures, panel discussions and small group workshops, participants "worked together to discern a way forward for Christian unity and perhaps begin answering the guestion: Where now?"
