Remembrance Sunday 2025

The Liberation of Holland

"As we commemorate the 80th anniversary of the liberation of the Netherlands, we honour the courage and sacrifice of Canadian soldiers who stood shoulder to shoulder with our Dutch allies. Their unwavering commitment to freedom and peace transformed the lives of millions and forged an enduring bond between our countries."

Canada brought liberty and life to the Netherlands at the end of the Second World War. Between October 1944 and May 1945, with fierce fighting and heavy loss of life, the First Canadian Army opened the Scheldt estuary and the port of Antwerp to Allied supplies, cleared much of the country of the enemy, and fed a Dutch people left starving by the Nazis. An estimated 301,000 Dutch people died including at least 280,000 civilians of which 104,000 were Holocaust victims and another 20,000 died of famine related causes. The Canadians were greeted as heroes as they liberated small towns and major cities. Millions of Dutch had suffered terribly during the harsh 1945 "hunger winter" and Canadian troops facilitated the arrival of food, fuel and other aid supplies to a population amid starvation. After liberation, 1,886 Dutch women married Canadian soldiers and became war brides.

More than 7,600 Canadian soldiers, sailors and airmen died fighting in the Netherlands. They are buried in official war cemeteries across the country.

The largest, Groesbeek Canadian War Cemetery holds the graves of more than 2300 Canadians. Nearly 1400 soldiers are buried at the Canadian War Cemetery at Holten. This year, Father Chris had the honour of participating in remembrance services at these two cemeteries and marching through Wageningen on Liberation Day (May 5) where the Germans surrendered in 1945.

Every year, on May 4, The Dutch honour our Canadian fallen by placing a tulip on each grave and on December 24, in the evening, they place a wind protected candle on each grave. (You Tube has very moving videos of this event)

Canadians are fondly remembered by the Dutch as both liberators and saviours who rescued millions from sickness and starvation. The joyous "Canadian summer" that followed forged deep and long-lasting bonds of friendship between the two countries. Every year since the war, the Netherlands has sent thousands of tulip bulbs to Ottawa in appreciation for Canada's sacrifice and for providing safe harbour to the Dutch Royal Family who lived in exile in Canada during the war.

There was a formidable bond formed and each year many Dutch families open their doors to Canadians who come to visit the graves. These cemeteries are very well cared for by the Dutch people especially children who are tasked with tending the graves, bringing flowers and so on. This dedication and love continue to this day as these acts of remembrance are passed from one generation to another.

In Flanders Fields By LCol John McCrae

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky



The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie,
In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

John McCrae was a Canadian physician, poet and soldier who wrote *In Flanders Fields*. He wrote the poem in 1915 after witnessing the horrors of the Second Battle of Ypres and the death of a friend, Lieutenant Alexis Helmer. The poem has since become one of the most famous poems of World War I and has made the poppy an international symbol of remembrance.
