Bill and I returned about a week ago from three weeks in Ireland, a trip that Bill had been planning for a year. We were delighted to be able to report on our return that we truly had a wonderful trip. For me, that meant that no one in our party had been sick enough or hurt badly enough to have to seek medical care in a foreign country. (That had been my biggest worry, with four folks in their fast-fleeting 70s.) Beyond that, we saw quite a lot of Ireland, cities and countryside, castles and churches, and met some interesting, often amusing folks. We got a feel for Ireland and the Irish, and they did not disappoint.

Our daughter Molly was with us for ten days and, in fact, drove a rental car across the country, a country about the size of South Carolina, on the left side of the road from a steering wheel on the right. None of us septuagenarians wanted to try it. There was a flat tire and a couple of anxious moments, but we went across country and back, and on a week's worth of day trips, five adults tightly packed, without serious incident.

As we age, these kinds of trips seem riskier, yet more compelling. We take our achy joints, or our titanium joints, our pacemakers, our rather hefty stash of prescription and over-the-counter meds,

ointments, and sleep aids. We have friends in our bridge club in their 90s who still travel, one who travels to Hawaii and to Europe at least once a year. I am impressed and inspired.

One of the highlights of our trip was that our friend Nancy connected with a first cousin that she had recently discovered through Ancestry, and we all shared a meal with him and his wife. He walked us around his small town and told us about the town we were headed to. It was special!

We have not traveled a lot, but some. And while I'm always happy to come home, this is not a "there's no place like home" story. This is about how travel makes the world seem – well, not smaller exactly, but closer, more personal. It helps us find common connection with people we never would have met otherwise, people with far different back stories and perspectives, all of us random passengers on the same spinning planet, each of us a child of God.

Special Session Reduces Districts, Staff (from advocatesc.org, October 27, 2025)

COLUMBIA—South Carolina United Methodists have approved two changes that impact how the denomination is structured in this state.

During an online called special session of Annual Conference Oct. 18, more than 700 lay and clergy delegates approved reducing the number of districts from 12 to 10 in South Carolina. They also approved eliminating a Cabinet-level position in creating the new Office of Congregational Excellence, which will oversee the work of the Office of Congregational Development and the continuing work of the Office of Connectional Ministries.

Both changes were submitted by the South Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church's Jeremiah Teams, created by Bishop Leonard Fairley last year to assess and transform how the conference is structured, how it operates and how it aligns with its priorities.

Two of the four Jeremiah Teams submitted recommendations for a vote at the called special session.

The District Alignment Team moved that the conference reduce the number of districts from 12 to 10 by July 1, 2026, with further assessment to be overseen by the bishop. Lay and clergy delegates voted 582-39 in favor of the motion.

The Conference Staff Alignment Team moved that the responsibilities of the Office of Congregational Development (currently a Cabinet-level position) be merged with the continuing work of Connectional Ministries, creating the new Office of Congregational Excellence, and that the current full-time Extended Cabinet position of Director of Congregational Development become a non-Extended Cabinet, part-time clergy appointment with the title of Director of Innovation and Strategy supervised by the Director of Congregational Excellence, which is formerly known as the Director of Connectional Ministries. Lay and clergy delegates voted 563-39 in favor of the motion.
