Today we gather to honor and remember the life of Woody Woods—a beloved husband, uncle, friend, and faithful servant. Woody passed away on June 13, 2025, in Gilbert, Arizona, at the age of 86, after a brief illness. Though his passing brings us sorrow, we also gather with gratitude for the life he lived and the joy he brought to so many.

Woody was born on April 7, 1939, in Hastings, Nebraska. He spent his early years between Nebraska and Colorado, attending public schools and participating in high school sports. He especially loved track and field, and he took great pride in running the final leg of the relay race—an image that, in many ways, reflects the perseverance, strength, and reliability he demonstrated throughout his life.

Woody served his country with honor in the United States Army from 1961 to 1963, attaining the rank of Specialist 4 as an Infantryman. In the final phase of his service, he was entrusted with training new

recruits who would be deployed to Vietnam, a serious and sacred responsibility that he carried with pride.

For over 60 years, Woody shared a loving and devoted marriage with his wife, Sharon. Together, they built a life rich in adventure, community, and love. They spent five unforgettable years traveling full-time in their motorhome, exploring the beauty of the open road. After many winters in Arizona, they eventually made it their permanent home 10 years

Woody was a man of daily discipline and quiet joy. He worked out regularly at the fitness center in Florence and was known to enjoy life's simple pleasures, especially a good cup of coffee and a pastry. He was steady, dependable, and kind. His calm spirit and easy smile made others feel comfortable and welcome, whether they had known him for decades or had just met him.

He is survived by his beloved Sharon, and by many nieces and nephews—Brian and Jeff Woods, Bret and Paul Coleman, Dawn Vezie, Rebecca DePenning, Jeanna Coleman, and Deborah Dunn—each of whom holds special memories of Uncle Woody and the ways he touched their lives.

Though Woody has completed his final lap on this side of eternity, we give thanks that his race was one well run—with strength, with purpose, and with love. We entrust him now to the care of his Savior, and we carry forward his legacy of steadfastness, faith, and quiet joy.
