Hold On To Your Hope

Matthew 11:2-6

John the Baptist was born to Zacharius and Elizabeth in their old age, and because of his disbelief at the angel's announcement of his forthcoming birth, he was silenced for nine months.

It was prophesied that John would be the forerunner for Jesus, coming in the same spirit and power as the prophet Elijah.

John was the prophet crying in the wilderness, "Repent for the kingdom of God is at hand." John baptised with water, but Jesus would baptise with the Holy Spirit and fire. After baptizing Jesus, John saw the Holy Spirit descending upon him as a dove.
