Funeral/Memorial Service Customary Pohick Church, Lorton, Virginia

"I am the resurrection and the life, saith the Lord..." - BCP, p. 469

The death of a loved one is a solemn and painful occasion with a myriad of emotions and details to navigate. This customary is intended to help ease the burden on those who must plan a funeral or memorial service by describing the liturgical practices of Pohick Church. This customary also enables our clergy and staff to assist your family in planning the service.

When a baptized Christian dies, it is proper that the person is buried from the Church. It is also helpful to schedule a service at a time when community members have the opportunity to be present.

It is generally advisable to work with a licensed funeral director, and when possible, to make prearrangements with the funeral home and the Church.

Notification

Families often have some warning that death is imminent. In these cases, parish clergy should be contacted, to provide pastoral care for the dying, the family, and all others who are in need of such care.

When such notification is impossible, <u>The Book of Common Prayer</u> (BCP) states: "The death of a member of the Church should be reported as soon as possible to, and arrangements for the funeral should be made in consultation with, the Minister of the Congregation." BCP, p.490

Timely notification not only helps in making the arrangements; it also allows the community to care for the bereaved through prayer and presence as appropriate. The clergy and staff can also provide support for the initial arrangements, from contacting family members to meeting with funeral directors.

At no time should any arrangement be made that involves Pohick Church facilities or staff before consultation with the Rector or the Rector's designee. This is particularly crucial when preparing obituary listings, as service times and locations rely upon the availability of facilities and clergy. In most cases accommodations can be made for funerals and memorial service times as requested. Funerals are not held on Mondays because of the Church's prearranged schedule of maintenance on the grounds.

Arrangements

Once the Church has been contacted and the initial time and day of the service are planned, there are a number of details to be organized.

Location: Where will the service take place? We will need to know if the service will take

place at Pohick Church, a funeral home, a cemetery/memorial garden, etc. It is appropriate that baptized Christians be buried from the church. When services are provided at Pohick Church, the family will be hosted in the Vestry House

immediately before the service.

Music: Will there be music at the service? Will there be Hymns, solos, vocalists, special

musicians?

All arrangements for music are made through the Organist/Choirmaster in consultation with the officiant. A listing of suggested hymns may be found in

Appendix B. All music must be sacred in nature.

Service Type: Will the service be memorial only, or will there be a local burial/interment?

Will the Holy Eucharist, or Communion, be a part of the service? A service bulletin will be prepared in consultation with the Rector. The family is invited to provide an obituary and photograph. Ushers are required if the service

includes a Eucharist.

Flowers: Will there be flowers for the service?

The family makes arrangements for flowers with the flower guild director. If you use a florist other than the Pohick Church Flower Guild, please have the florist contact the Church office to ensure they have the correct dimensions of the flower urns. Note: only two arrangements are permitted in the church. One on each of the pedestals flanking the altar. Flowers typically remain on the altar for weekend services. Other arrangements and memorial flowers may be

placed in the parish hall or at the grave.

Reception: Will there be a reception after the service? Will it be at Pohick Church,

someone's home, or a public venue?

Receptions for members of Pohick Church are arranged through the Martha's

Guild.

Non-members may rent the parish hall and cater a reception at their own expense. This should be coordinated through the Cemetery Warden and Parish Administrator.

A Video presentation monitor is available for slide show or PowerPoint presentations at the reception.

Photography Videography

Will there be a photographer or videographer?

Pohick Church offers livestreaming services for a fee of \$150. Outside photographers and videographers may be used upon approval of the clergy. Photographers/videographers must remain stationary on the balcony or in the back of the church during the liturgy. No flash photography is permitted.

Planning the Service

The service for the Burial of the Dead is found on pages 469 (Rite I) and 491 (Rite II) of *BCP 1979*. While most of the service is just as it is lined out in the prayer book, there are several options for families to consider. Once decisions have been made about whether there will be a Eucharist or music, the next consideration is normally the readings.

Readings

The prayer book offers suggested readings from the Old and New Testaments, Psalms, and Gospels readings. Other reading from the canonized scriptures may be substituted upon request.

Some families choose one of each, while others choose only one. There must be a reading from the Gospel if there is to be Communion. If a family wishes to use a passage that holds particular importance for the deceased or other family members, it should be coordinated with the officiant.

On pages 494-495 in the prayer book, there are suggestions for readings from the BCP. The full text of the readings may be found in Appendix A.

Family and friends are invited to read passages from the Psalms, and the Old and New Testaments, and those invitations are made by the family and coordinated with the Rector. If persons prepare ahead of time for reading at a service, Pohick Church typically uses the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) of the bible. Readings form the King James Version (KJV) may also be used upon request.

Eulogies

As a rule, lengthy eulogies are not a part of Anglican Burial services. It is, however, not uncommon, and often helpful, for a member of the family or a friend to say a few words about the deceased. This can happen immediately before the presider's homily. When comments are made, it is strongly recommended that they be written down and limited to the equivalent of one typed page.

Other Things to Keep in Mind

Burial liturgies range in time from 25 minutes for the most basic service to one hour when music and Communion are included. Please feel free to discuss the particulars of the service you are planning with the officiant to estimate the availability of receptions, interments, or other temporal considerations.

When coffins and urns are brought into the Church for the service, floral arrangements are removed and draped with a pall. This is to ensure that as each of us leaves this world, we do so as equals. There are no distinctions to be made in the Church through the choice of a casket or urn. The pall replaces even the American flag when it is draped on a casket, although the flag is replaced immediately after the service. Viewings are not offered in the church.

The use of color guards and the inclusion of military honors are always welcome. Arrangements can be made with most funeral directors for such honors, and when they take place at the Church, they are coordinated with the presiding minister and should take place at the conclusion of the liturgy or at the end of the graveside portion of the service.

Ask your funeral director whether they provide ushers for the service or whether you need to find your own ushers. Sometimes family and friends of the deceased can serve in this role, and there is also the possibility of asking members of the parish to serve this role.

Fees and Memorial Gifts

There are no fees for a standard burial service for active members of Pohick Church. Some, however, choose to make gifts to the Church in honor of their loved one and in thanksgiving for the ministry of the community. Families may also indicate that in lieu of flowers, memorial gifts may be made to Pohick Church.

The list of fees below is for nonmembers of Pohick Church, and can be used as a model for members who also wish to make gifts. All fees are paid to Pohick Church, Lorton, VA unless otherwise indicated. Accommodations can be made for pastoral and/or financial hardships through discussion with the rector.

Appendix A - Readings

Old Testament Readings

Isaiah 25:6-9

On this mountain the Lord of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well matured wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-matured wines strained clear. And he will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that is spread over all nations; he will swallow up death forever. Then the Lord God will wipe away the tears from all faces, and the disgrace of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the Lord has spoken. It will be said on that day, Lo, this is our God; we have waited for him, so that he might save us. This is the Lord for whom we have waited; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation.

Isaiah 61:1-3

The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; to provide for those who mourn in Zion—to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit. The nations make much ado, and the kingdoms are shaken; * God has spoken, and the earth shall melt away. The LORD of hosts is with us; * the God of Jacob is our stronghold.

As soon as thou scatterest them they are even as a sleep, * and fade away suddenly like the grass. In the morning it is green, and groweth up; * but in the evening it is cut down, dried up, and withered. For we consume away in thy displeasure, * and are afraid at thy wrathful indignation. Thou hast set our misdeeds before thee, * our secret sins in the light of thy countenance. For when thou art angry all our days are gone; * we bring our years to an end, as it were a tale that is told. The days of our age are threescore years and ten; and though men be so strong that they come to yet is their strength then but labor and fourscore years, * so soon passeth it away, and we are gone. So teach sorrow, us to number our days, * that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom.

Psalm 90:1-12 – Rite II Domine, refugium

Lord, you have been our refuge * from one generation to another. Before the mountains were brought forth, or the land and the earth were born, * from age to age you are God. You turn us back to the dust and say, *

"Go back, O child of earth."

For a thousand years in your sight are like yesterday when it is past *

and like a watch in the night.

You sweep us away like a dream; * we fade away suddenly like the grass. In the morning it is green and flourishes; * in the evening it is dried up and withered. For we consume away in your displeasure; * we are afraid because of your wrathful indignation. Our iniquities you have set before you, * and our secret sins in the light of your countenance. When you are angry, all our days are gone; * we bring our years to an end like a sigh. The span of our life is seventy years, perhaps in strength even eighty; * yet the sum of them is but labor and sorrow, for they pass away quickly and we are gone. Who regards the power of your wrath? * who rightly fears your indignation?

So teach us to number our days * that we may apply our hearts to wisdom.

Psalm 106:1-5 Confitemini Domino

Hallelujah!

Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, * for his mercy endures for ever. Who can declare the mighty acts of the LORD * or show forth all his praise? Happy are those who act with justice * and always do what is right!

Remember me, O LORD, with the favor you have for your people, *

and visit me with your saving help; That I may see the prosperity of your elect and be glad with the gladness of your people, * that I may glory with your inheritance.

Psalm 116 – Rite I *Dilexi,* quoniam

My delight is in the LORD, *

because he hath heard the voice of my prayer;
Because he hath inclined his ear unto me, *
therefore will I call upon him as long as I live. The
snares of death compassed me round about, *
and the pains of hell gat hold upon me. I found
trouble and heaviness; then called I upon the
Name of the LORD; * O LORD, I beseech thee,
deliver my soul. Gracious is the LORD, and
righteous; * yea, our God is merciful.
The LORD preserveth the simple; *

I was in misery, and he helped me. Turn again then unto thy rest, O my soul, * for the LORD hath rewarded thee.

And why? thou hast delivered my soul from death, *
mine eyes from tears, and my feet from falling. I will
walk before the LORD * in the land of the living.
I will pay my vows now in the presence of all his people; *
right dear in the sight of the LORD is the death of his saints.

Psalm 116 – Rite II Dilexi, quoniam

I love the LORD, because he has heard the voice of my supplication, *

because he has inclined his ear to me whenever I called upon him.

The cords of death entangled me; the grip of the grave took hold of me; * I came to grief and sorrow.

Then I called upon the Name of the LORD: *

"O LORD, I pray you, save my life." Gracious is the LORD and righteous; * our God is full of compassion.

The LORD watches over the innocent; *

I was brought very low, and he helped me. Turn again to your rest, O my soul. * for the LORD has treated you well. For you have rescued my life from death, * my eyes from tears, and my feet from stumbling. I will walk in the presence of the LORD * in the land of the living. I will fulfill my vows to the LORD * in the presence of all his people. Precious in the sight of the LORD * is the death of his servants.

Psalm 121 – Rite I Levavi oculos

I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills; *
from whence cometh my help? My help
cometh even from the LORD, * who hath
made heaven and earth. He will not suffer thy
foot to be moved, * and he that keepeth thee
will not sleep. Behold, he that keepeth Israel *

shall neither slumber nor sleep. The LORD himself is thy keeper; * the LORD is thy defence upon thy right hand; So that the sun shall not burn thee by day, * neither the moon by night.

The LORD shall preserve thee from all evil; * yea, it is even he that shall keep thy soul. The LORD shall preserve thy going out, and thy coming in, * from this time forth for evermore.

Psalm 121 – Rite II Levavi oculos

I lift up my eyes to the hills; * from where is my help to come? My help comes from the LORD, * the maker of heaven and earth. He will not let your foot be moved * and he who watches over you will not fall asleep. Behold, he who keeps watch over Israel * shall neither slumber nor sleep; The LORD himself watches over you; * the LORD is your shade at your right hand, So that the sun shall not strike you by day, * nor the moon by night. The LORD shall preserve you from all evil; * it is he who shall keep you safe.

The LORD shall watch over your going out and

your coming in, * from this time forth for evermore.

Psalm 130 – Rite I De profundis

Out of the deep have I called unto thee, O LORD; * Lord, hear my voice.

O let thine ears consider well *

the voice of my complaint.

If thou, LORD, wilt be extreme to mark what is done amiss, *
O Lord, who may abide it? For there is mercy with
thee, * therefore shalt thou be feared. I look for the
LORD; my soul doth wait for him; * in his word is my trust.
My soul fleeth unto the Lord before the morning watch; *

I say, before the morning watch. O Israel, trust in the LORD, for with the LORD there is mercy, \ast and with him is plenteous redemption.

And he shall redeem Israel * from all his sins.

Psalm 130 – Rite I De profundis

Out of the depths have I called to you, O LORD; LORD, hear my voice; * let your ears consider well the voice of my supplication. If you, LORD, were to note what is done amiss, * O LORD, who could stand? For there is forgiveness with you; * therefore you shall be feared. I wait for the LORD; my soul waits for him; * in his word is my hope. My soul waits for the LORD, more than watchmen for the morning, * more than watchmen for the morning. O Israel, wait for the LORD, * for with the LORD there is mercy; With him there is plenteous redemption, * and he shall redeem Israel from all their sins.

Psalm 139:1-11 – Rite I Domine, probasti

O Lord, thou hast searched me out, and known me. *
Thou knowest my down-sitting and mine uprising; thou understandest my thoughts long before.
Thou art about my path, and about my bed, *
and art acquainted with all my ways. For lo,

there is not a word in my tongue, * but thou, O LORD, knowest it altogether. Thou hast beset me behind and before, * and laid thine hand upon me.

Such knowledge is too wonderful and excellent for me; *

I cannot attain unto it. Whither shall I go then from thy Spirit? * or whither shall I go then from thy presence? If I climb up into heaven, thou art there; *

if I go down to hell, thou art there also. If I take the wings of the morning, * and remain in the uttermost parts of the sea; Even there also shall thy hand lead me, * and thy right hand shall hold me. If I say, Peradventure the darkness shall cover me, * then shall my night be turned to day. Yea, the darkness is no darkness with thee, but the night is as clear as day; * the darkness and light to thee are both alike.

Psalm 139:1-11 – Rite II Domine, probasti

LORD, you have searched me out and known me; * you know my sitting down and my rising up; discern my thoughts from afar. You trace my journeys and my resting-places * acquainted with all my ways. Indeed, there is not a word on my lips, * but you, O LORD, know it altogether. You press upon me behind and before and lay your hand upon me. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; * it is so high that I cannot attain to it. Where can I go then from your Spirit? * where can I flee from your presence? If I climb up to heaven, you are there; * if I make the grave my bed, you are there also. If I take the wings of the morning * and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea, Even there your hand will lead me * and your right hand hold me fast. If I say, "Surely the darkness will cover me, * and the light around me turn to night," Darkness is not dark to you; the night is as bright as the day; * darkness and light to you are both alike.

New Testament Readings

Romans 8:14-19,34-35,37-39

For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him. I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

1 Corinthians 15:20-26,35-38,42-44,53-58

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death. But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body. So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. For this perishable body must put on imperishability, and this mortal body must put on immortality. When this perishable body puts on imperishability, and this mortal body puts on immortality, then the saying that is written will be fulfilled: "Death has been swallowed up in victory." "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my beloved, be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labor is not in vain.

2 Corinthians 4:16-5:9

So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal. For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. For in this tent we groan, longing to be clothed with

our heavenly dwelling— if indeed, when we have taken it off we will not be found naked. For while we are still in this tent, we groan under our burden, because we wish not to be unclothed but to be further clothed, so that what is mortal may be swallowed up by life. He who has prepared us for this very thing is God, who has given us the Spirit as a guarantee. So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord— for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yes, we do have confidence, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him.

1 John 3:1-2

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is.

Revelation 7:9-17

After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying, "Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!" And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, singing, "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen." 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Appendix C

Procedures for Casket Burials: The Family must contact the Pohick Church Cemetery Warden, to determine if the family plot is available for a casket burial.

The Cemetery Warden will check the Pontem Database and/or Burial Rights Certificate for ownership of the burial plot. Once determined that the family does infact have rights for burial. Cemetery Warden will check with Clery to verify the date and time of Burial. Cemetery Warden will then also check with the Pohick Church grave digger on his availability to dig the grave, the funeral home handling the body and the headstone/memorial company if the grave currently has a headstone. Once all parties have been contacted the scheduled burial is arranged and the burial fees will be determined and shared with the family. (see
