MUSIC NOTES

Benjamin Britten is probably the most important 20th century English composer-his output spans art song, opera, choral, symphonic and chamber music, all of which he addressed with mastery and originality. His harmonic language is distinctive, and combines the austere quartal sonorities of the Neo-Classical revival, the colourful harmonic third-relationships of the French Impressionists, the love of folk song and ancient church melody of Vaughan Williams, and the strict formal discipline of the German-trained English Victorian Stanford. Freed from the Victorians' obligation to regular metres, Britten's freewheeling time signatures follow the natural rhythms of the English language with a perfection matched only by plain chant intonation. Rejoice in the Lamb is a 17-minute mini-cantata for four-part chorus and organ, enriched by soprano, alto, tenor, and bass solos. The poetry is by Christopher Smart, an English prodigy who had mastered the Classical languages by age 10, and was named professor at Oxford at age 21. For reasons that remain somewhat unclear, Smart was confined to St Luke's Hospital in London as a psychiatric patient for four years; in the midst of that terrible suffering, he composed the epic lyric poem Jubilate Agno (over 1,200 lines long). The poem celebrates nature as the voice of God, with passing references to the scientific work of Locke and Newton (Enlightenment influence); in the parallel line structures it evokes Hebrew poetry (think of the psalms); Biblical and mythological characters are paired with animals who appear in their stories; alliteration and onomatopoeia are abundant; and the depiction of Smart's internal spiritual and psychiatric struggle is heartbreakingly real. The marriage of Britten's music with Smart's poetry is one of the most vivid, affecting and memorable works in the English choral canon.

In 2017, our Minister of Music Emerita Dr Patricia Wright was granted an honorary fellowship by the Summer Institute of Church Music. In celebration of this occasion, SICM commissioned Canadian composer and conductor **Patrick Murray** to set a poem by our own Met poet **Patricia Orr**. *Morning Hymn* celebrates music as a divine gift that binds all things unto God. An apt work for the day following the November 22 Feast of St Cecilia, patron of music - and also the birthday of Benjamin Britten!
