THIS WEEK'S SERVICES

Warden Liz Williams will preside at the 8:00 a.m. service, while Dean Ansley Tucker will preach at the 10:00 a.m. service.

SUNDAY ANNOUNCEMENTS The verdict is in! 70% of respondents to our recent survey indicated that they would like the Sunday announcements to take place in the church rather than the hall. 81% indicated that if the announcements were returned to the church, the preferred time for them would be after the blessing and before the final hymn. Accordingly, parish council decided this past week that beginning June 1, we would return to "the way we were." Other comments included a desire that we find ways to respect the transition from prayer to business, which can feel quite abrupt. One person suggested that we provide a monthly opportunity to discuss the sermon over coffee. And some observed that having announcements in the hall automatically excludes those who attend the service by livestream. Finally, those who mentioned birthdays and anniversaries stated that they preferred celebrating them in the hall – which will continue.

RED FOR PENTECOST!

The Feast of Pentecost is Sunday, June 8, and marks the end of the 50 days of Easter with a celebration of the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the first Christians. Even though it is one of our three most important feasts (some would say it ranks above Christmas!), this would be hard to tell in most Anglican Churches. Most Anglicans don't know the classic hymns of the Spirit by heart, let alone hear them on the radio in the run-up to Pentecost; we don't have a classic Pentecost meal, or holiday; and most parishes are hard pressed to imagine how they might decorate their churches to make the point. We are going to do our best to make Pentecost an occasion. One practice which is gaining currency, is for people to wear red on Pentecost, if they possibly can. Mark the date, June 8, and let's see if we can create a sea of red in the pews!

A WORD ABOUT RINGING OF THE BELL

From Dean Ansley: As Deacon Norah has made clear, beginning on Pentecost, St. Peter's bell will once again ring on Sundays. We are grateful for her careful consultation with indigenous elders to ensure that this will not be perceived as a reminder to residential school survivors of the forcible imposition of colonial religious practices – which was the concern which gave rise to the silencing of the bell several years ago.

This invites us to consider the place of bells in our own history and practice. The first thing to note is that the original purpose of steeple bells was more secular than religious (if you could even make such a distinction in those days). Think back to a time before there were newspapers, before there were telephones, radio, or television, before there were air raid sirens, and certainly before there were Amber alerts and social media. Indeed, even fire engines, as recently as the early 60s, were equipped with bells, not sirens! All of which is to say that before all this, there were church bells.

Of course, church bells announced Sunday worship. But they also pealed for weddings and tolled for funerals. They announced war. And peace. They announced the start of the day, lunch, and quitting time. They warned people of bad weather, and called all hands to deck in a crisis. Bells have been at the center of community for centuries. Even in our own time, with all the technology we have at our disposal, there is nothing quite so powerful as a single, primitive bell ringing to making a statement.

In re-voicing our own church bell, we take our place in this long tradition of service to the whole community. We will start to ring our bell on Pentecost Sunday, June 8!

CALLING ALL INJURED HYMNBOOKS!

On Sunday, if you see a copy of Common Praise in your pew that needs mending, please leave it on the table at the church door when you leave the service. We have purchased some proper library tape, and will begin the work of repair this week. Hymn books cost about \$28 each, so anything we can do to keep our current collection in good shape is worth the effort!
