Understanding Our Conversations with Calgary Unity Lutheran Mission

As Hope Lutheran continues our conversations with the leaders and members of Unity Lutheran, we want to ensure everyone has a clear understanding of what is, and what is **not**, being discussed. These conversations are grounded in our mission, our values, and our commitment to welcoming those who wish to join our community. The chart below offers a simple overview to help all of us stay informed and aligned as we discern the path ahead together. If you have additional questions or concerns you'd like to make sure we address in these conversations, please reach out to a task force member: Pastor Greg, Anne Harding, Steve Medhurst, Kyle Bakx or Nathan Gingrich.

Having one pastor serve the people of Hope Lutheran — including current members of Unity — and that pastor is Pastor Greg Smith. Intentionally welcoming a group of new members (20 to 40) who we know speak Cantonese. Continuing to budget as we always have, receiving financial gifts from all members in support of one shared mission. Creating separate or parallel financial accounts dedicated to a "Unity mission" within or connected to Hope's financial structure.
Strengthening our governance structure for Hope Lutheran — which will likely include updating our bylaws to add staggered terms for council members, ensuring continuity and stability.	Inviting one or two members of Unity's current management committee (their version of a council) to join Hope's church council, helping ensure informed and representative decision-making as we welcome new members.	Allowing any particular group's interests to override Hope's established governance or to determine decisions in ways that do not align with Hope Lutheran's mission and shared direction.

Congregational Visioning: What Are Our Key Values?

Key values tell us who we are as a congregation, and also tell us who we want to be. After we decide as a congregation on 3-4 key values, we will use them to do value-based budgeting as well as to plan future initiatives and activities.

The values identified by the congregation in October are: Belonging, Compassion, Creativity, Collaboration, Curiosity, Faithfulness, Generosity, Grace, Hope, and Joy. Council has also suggested Love and Supportiveness.

Ideally, our discussion will involve the whole congregation in considering these values to determine which ones are central to our vision for the coming years.

Each week starting in Advent (with a hiatus over Christmas), we will focus on 1 or 2 of the values and delve deeply into them to consider what each one means, how we express it as a congregation, and how that value might shape our future. I will use a variety of discussion techniques to keep conversations varied and to encourage different members to participate. For example, visual images will serve as the starting point for some discussion. For others, we will use Biblical stories and characters. Others will start with songs and hymns. All of these serve as ways to invite people to think deeply about the values.

The goal is to involve all groups in the congregation that meet weekly. I will prepare the discussion activities for them, and I am also willing to lead discussions if requested. Gathering Table discussions during Advent will center on the values. Pastor Greg will focus his sermons on the values, and several discussions after church will be held for those who are interested.

By early February, responses will be collected, collated, and returned to the visioning committee and council for further consideration. Perhaps a consensus will already have emerged??

Finally, but most importantly, the children will participate in age-appropriate children's talks about the values in worship services. These talks will open up each week's discussion. Children are a valuable part of our congregation and deserve to be involved, but they also can unsettle in good ways adult thinking (as experience has taught me).

YEAR END OFFERING CUTOFF AND TAX RECEIPTS

Please be aware that the church office will close at noon on **December 23rd**. Any offering sent by mail that is not received by that time might not be eligible for the 2025 tax receipt. Offering donations made by email transfer will be credited to the next banking day, so the EMAIL cutoff is December 30th (banks often close early on December 31). Envelopes collected at the Christmas Worship Services will be counted in 2025 as well.

In summary these are the deadlines to allow for inclusion in 2025 tax year:

Envelopes collected at Worship services until December 28

Email transfers until December 30

Mailed items received before December 23 - which depends on the mail system.

Tax receipts will be available as soon as possible in the new year. With reduced office staff, we request your patience in this regard and we do not anticipate any issue meeting the end of February CRA deadline. A bulletin notice will let you know when they are in your church mailbox.

2026 ENVELOPES

In order to reduce waste and control costs, Hope will be going to MONTHLY offering envelopes in 2026. In the past few years, only about 20% of the envelopes were used. However, we recognize that some people like the routine of weekly giving and we will supply additional un-numbered and undated envelopes anyone who requests this -- please contact the office and we can set you up with extras for 2026.







Also a note of thanks to the Hope Stitchers who donated some beautiful afghans for the auction.

Soup Making

In order to feed students at both MRU and UofC every week with a hot soup supper followed by some intentional conversation through our Simple Supper programming, we need to make soup! In partnership with the church, we were able to receive a license to cook commercially at Hope's kitchen. This means for every semester- we are cooking soup to serve over 40 bowls a week for every week of the academic semester. That's a lot of soup...... many thanks to volunteers from Hope who came out for the afternoon to help students cut, chop, stir, measure and wash. We are so grateful. This winter, we had over **170 onions** to chop- in case you were wondering why the church smelt like onions?!?

Bishop Trish's November Message



We are called!

Churches will be decked out in red at the end of October as we celebrate our Reformation roots and then in white as we remember the saints, the beloved family of God that has come before us and continues today through us!

As I have travelled to visit congregations across our Synod – I see you! I see the diverse and faithful ways you are being hope in this world. Tiny Sunday School classes, clothing and nutritious meals for people in need, people caring for one another, lay leaders providing word and worship, so much diversity and creativity is your gift! This work, this ministry, is so important – you are living your call!

Rev Kevin Vandiver of Lutheran Church of the Reformation in Washington, D.C. in his recent sermon at the installation of the new ELCA Presiding Bishop, Rev. Yehiel Curry, preached into this time of the world. From Luke 4:16-30 he led us joyfully to understand Jesus' "mission statement" (The Spirit of the Lord is upon me...), but then Vandiver pointed out that the response to this great news was the people driving Jesus out to a cliff! That edge of the cliff, the precipice, Vandiver explained, is the crisis all Christians face as we meet the world with the too-good news of Jesus. The life of God's people is not easy.

And so, the call remains – to each of us to continue in our baptismal covenant (or to anticipate our baptism!) sharing God's purpose in a world that seems to be edging closer to the precipice. O CHRISTMAS TREE

Back in the days on the farm we always had a Douglas fir Christmas tree. Sometimes the tree my dad brought home was a rather pathetic specimen, small and spare of branches. But, as in Charlie Brown's Christmas, once it was decorated it looked beautiful. Mom was too busy with Christmas preparations at home and at church to have time to decorate a tree so my sister and I did the decorating on the last day of school which sometimes was as late as December 23. I can't remember if our dad put the lights on the tree, or if we managed to do that ourselves. My sister was quite proficient when it came to things like that so that may have been the case. In any event, once the lights were secured, we got down to the serious business of hanging the ornaments and the tinsel icicles. The icicles were made of aluminum foil, not plastic like they are nowadays, and so they hung beautifully and stayed in place, not hitching a ride on someone's clothes due to static electricity.

During the Christmas season there was much visiting and entertaining going on. We accepted invitations for coffee from relatives and friends. Sometimes we were out both in the afternoon and the evening. Without fail, the first thing Elaine and I did after we'd taken off our coats, was to check out the tree in each house. We wanted to see how it measured up in comparison to ours. Sadly, ours didn't usually make the grade, especially when the tree was bedecked with fancy bubble lights or "indent baubles." Elaine determined that we should have some ornaments like that, so she took it upon herself to order some from the Eaton's catalogue. When they arrived, we were thrilled. Oh, they looked so nice hung on the tree! Afterwards, even without bubble lights, we were satisfied that our tree compared with the best of them. Believe it or not, I still have a couple of those ornaments my sister ordered so long ago and they are given pride of place on our tree every year. They are at least seventy years old.

It used to be a much-anticipated outing to choose a tree but after we learned that our son-in-law was allergic to live trees we switched to artificial ones. One of the last real trees we had was a Scotch pine. It was beautiful, but hard to decorate with its long needles. And taking it down was a nightmare because it was shedding like mad. To make matters worse, the living room had shag carpeting (already in place when we bought the house) – and not just run- of- the -mill shag carpeting, but carpeting with really, really long fibres. I tried vacuuming up the needles, but it wasn't long before the hose got jammed with needles lying crosswise. Ack! I spent the better part of the morning on hands and knees picking out every last needle out of the rug. No more Scotch pines! No long after, we got rid of that shag carpeting. (It was white. Can you imagine, with four kids and a dog?)

One last memory is of the two years we spent in Westport, CT. The church we attended, St. Paul Lutheran, had a live tree, roots intact, which was later planted in the grounds surrounding the church. There were several trees in different stages of growth dotting the landscape so the practice had been going on for quite a number of years. What wonderful stewardship of God's creation!
