Elder Profile Judy Bridgemohan

I am Judy Bridgemohan, and I was born on the tiny Caribbean Island of Trinidad and Tobago and was baptised at the Tabaquite Presbyterian Church as a baby. Growing up I worshipped at Point Fortin Presbyterian Church. I came to Canada in pursuit of my education in 1988. I did my Grade 13 education in Toronto and came out to the University of Alberta to pursue my Engineering degree. I have been a part of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church since December 2004 when my mom (Indra) and I moved from Husky Energy in St. John's NFLD to Calgary. My move to Calgary occurred because I had joined ConocoPhillips Canada to work on the



Canadian Arctic projects team. Being new and not knowing anyone I thought I would ask my colleagues for a reference to a Presbyterian church to worship, and Ian Denniss (former member of St. Andrew's) suggested St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. My brother Arnold joined us from Toronto in 2006. In 2008, Arnold and Maribeth were married by Rev. Peter Coutts at St. Andrew's. Spencer was born in 2009, and he was baptised by Rev. Peter Coutts followed by Stephen in 2012, who was baptised by Rev. Jan Hazlett. Spencer is now in Grade 12 and getting ready for university, while Stephen is in Grade 8.

As a Petroleum Engineer for three decades and working overseas for most of that time, it allowed me to serve on a part-time basis at St. Andrew's and at Grand Lakes Presbyterian Church in Katy, Texas. My job took me to several countries: Angola, USA, Trinidad and Qatar. During my time in Doha, I continued worshipping online with St. Andrew's and every Sunday Alice Post would check with me to see how I was doing, and she would offer me words of encouragement. At this point in my life, I saw the need to deepen my faith in God, and I felt the need to give back to my community which had been so good to me. So, in 2022 while I was on an assignment in Doha, Qatar, I decided it was my calling to return to Calgary and take up a more permanent role at St. Andrew's. On April 30, 2023, I was ordained as an elder to serve our congregation for six years.

I have held several roles in activities such as the Audio Visual and Sound Board, Blessing of the Animals, Stations of the Cross-Easter 2021, and a member of the Communications Team during the Covid period. In addition, I was Session liaison for the Personnel Team in 2024 where I had the opportunity to brush up on my Human Resources skills and presently I am the Session liaison for the Finance Team where I can apply some of my MBA skills. As a Care Connector, I am meeting new congregation members. All these opportunities have given me a better understanding of how a church community works, and it has made me more integrated into our church community.

If you are asked to be an elder at St. Andrew's, you may prayerfully consider taking on this role to support the church community. You will enjoy working with our ministerial staff and the members of our Session because there is always someone there to help you. There are many unexplored opportunities for you to discover as our church ministry continues to navigate complex social and theological issues like LGBTQ2S+ inclusion and reconciliation with Indigenous people.

















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Focus on St. Andrew's Youth!

As you may know, David has been a key person on the St. Andrew's Audio / Visual (AV) board for many years. We recently caught up with David and asked him to tell us a little about his background at St. Andrew's and what keeps him motivated and inspired. The following is his response:

"It has been easy serving at St. Andrew's. When I walked through the doors about a decade ago sometime around 2016, I entered looking for a church to call home. Well before the service even began, I was greeted by a handful of people, welcomed with great warmth and generosity which I felt has always been a hallmark of the church. That morning, I met Bill Judd and the following week I joined his Bible study. A few weeks later, I was invited to operate the sound board, muting and unmuting the mics for, who at that time was, the Revs. Kevin Lee, Jan Hazlett, and Jared Miller. Kevin and Jared soon invited me to their book study where Carolyn Jerrard asked if I would join her in leading the Youth Group. In all this, a verse comes to mind which reads, "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we might walk in them." (Ephesians 2:10). God is always in control, but He asks me to participate. I never sought the variety of activities that would define and bless my last decade at St. Andrew's. All I ever needed to do was say 'yes' to the opportunities God has set before me through key people at St. Andrew's Church."

Barbara and Kevin MacFarlane have worked with David for many years and wanted to share the following:

"David is being very modest about his contributions. He has developed a significant talent in the video aspect of his A/V work for St. Andrew's. During COVID, he took over Live Streaming our services from Britten Bannerjee, who left in 2021 to join Global Television and later Law School. David has also coached many others to administer the cameras and run the livestream software. He has mastered this visual technology to provide superb experiences for both those watching online and in the sanctuary. Many do not realize that there are 2 visual signals that he creates: one which goes out to the public on YouTube and another one which goes on the screen in the church! "

And from Debby Dorcas, who has worked with David since he became our AV Coordinator:

David is indeed very modest. Can you imagine having a job where, if something goes WONKY (my favorite computer term) ~ you have to figure it out in the next 5 minutes before the service starts and the Livestreaming begins? Since day 1, David has been calm, cool and collected, and you would never know when something has gone WONKY. And it HAS! He stays composed, focused, and kind, no matter what is going on. AND he is the most accommodating person, always willing to fit in a special practice or service whenever he can. He is a treasure and a blessing.

Is this my journey toward reconciliation?

I didn't really know what 'reconciliation' was. The federal government's work over the years had led to an apology for some harms done that I knew little about and now we had a Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) report that included a long list of recommendations including a few directed specifically at churches, and by extension, church people. What did I / we do?! Well, it was clear that I had done nothing in particular, but lived very much

in the 'privilege' that had grown out of exploiting the riches of this land and in the process marginalized a lot of people, the original inhabitants here, or at least the ones that were already here when the European new-comers 'discovered' the land. Some have described what happened as 'cultural genocide' and with the demeaning of a peoples' culture, a whole society and its people were threatened.

Wait ... what? So, I read up on the TRC recommendations to the churches at least and found that even our Presbyterian Church in Canada had been involved in some of this, specifically with the Residential School system. Rev. Peter Coutts helped me to understand some of this history. It was real and its effects are still felt by those people / communities even today.

A few of the people I knew at St. Andrew's seemed to know more about this stuff and were concerned about it. Jim Hope-Ross had been deeply involved with helping businesses and government negotiate deals with Indigenous groups and had helped our national church develop its policy. Conversations with Jim were very enlightening. By now, I was noticing more of a public discourse on 'reconciliation', but still not sure where I fit in. Surely, I / we had to do something.

That search for 'something' lead to a series of information events, including what was called 'The Blanket Exercise', as well as presentations on issues at the time (e.g. individual residential school experiences, update on the murdered and missing Indigenous women and girls issue, short video on 'the Pass' system, a talking circle where we could ask questions and share our own growing dismay at what we were learning, etc.)

St. Andrew's decided to put its shoulder into this and at least try to make a difference. Brian Hawco stepped up to help us organize a full-day Indigenous awareness and friendship day (May 2019). It turns out Brian was already on his own reconciliation journey - I think there is another story there. Anyway, I got to meet Ernie Poundmaker, our Elder and guide for planning and presenting our special day. There was Indigenous ceremony, culture, regalia, teachings, food, dance, handicrafts, art and just a good time - a nice mix of St. A folk, nearby neighbours and interested Indigenous folk from the surrounding area.





Ernie made himself available for a number of meetings, including a fun golf game with myself and Jim Hope-Ross. It made such a difference to have ... well ... a budding friendship with Ernie - a real person, with real trauma in his history and still a strong and good spirit aimed at building respectful connections amongst all of us. He called our friendship day a Pow-Wow - a true community celebration - and applauded us for being the first that he had ever heard of to host a Pow-Wow on church property. It seemed very significant to him and I was encouraged that there was something I could do ... and keep doing ... that might make a difference.

More recently we have been joined by Rev. Laurie who adds her own stories about reconciliation to our growing mix. And there was our extra-ordinary Indigenous Neighbouring Day, just last year in September, when we had another wonderful day of Indigenous teaching and culture sharing. Peter Coutts led this one and helped many more of St. Andrew's folk become acquainted with the fun side of Indigenous ceremony and culture. A definite highlight of the day was presentations from Bruce Starlight a chief and Elder from the Tsuut' Ina Nation, Carmen Lasante, the captain of Métis Region 3 and the apology from the Presbyterian Church shared by Rev. Dr. Patricia Dutcher Walls, our Church's Moderator. And thankfully the weather co-operated and we were able to be even more noticeable to the surrounding neighbourhood. I think it made a real difference.

In addition to the event itself, was a growing, on-going set of connections / relationships - e.g. Krista White and the folks at the Aboriginal Friendship Centre in downtown Calgary where St. Andrew's people now contribute monthly support with a big batch of soup for lunches at the centre.

Since then, I've noticed, and been encouraged by, a growing interest and concern with this issue among my friends, especially my friends at St. Andrew's. A small group of us support a friendship time over coffee and breakfast at Claire House where we have met a number of Indigenous people and families. They all have stories they are learning to live with and working to find their way in this modern world, while rebuilding their own knowledge and respect for a culture they have mostly lost. I think we are all touched by the humanity of their respective quests. Also, you know those land acknowledgement briefs we've been hearing as we gather for worship? - I really appreciate the many new perspectives I am getting there.









Most recently, I've joined with Linda Humphreys, Margaret Bruhjell-Homes and Rev. Laurie to help 'stir the pot' at St. Andrew's with respect to what else we can be doing at St. Andrew's to help make a difference. They've taught me about an on-line course called 'Indigenous 101'; they've brought in 'Hearts Exchange' program with Rev. Layne Kilbreath and Alphonse Nepoose (a Cree Elder and new friend for us from Claire House); Margaret has built-up a connection with Anita Crowshoe at Heritage Park that lead to St. Andrew's participating in the recent Truth and Reconciliation Day activities at Heritage Park, where Rev. Laurie made a presentation about our fledgling reconciliation efforts as a congregation; we worked with Rev. Layne and Alphonse to support a Reconciliation Journey walk; Rev. Layne introduced us to Kate and Willy who operate Neechi-Mart, a food and spiritual support program that now operates most Wednesdays out of St. Andrew's Trinity Hall - these two are teaching us what real mission work is about ... feeding the hungry, clothing the needy, comforting the forlorn ... they are tireless workers and wonderful examples of humility and grace.

And now, I really feel I am indeed on a journey toward reconciliation. I have no idea what the next steps will look like or how long it will take. What it feels like, so far, is that God, our creator, is with us and I should keep going. I think there is room for all of us on this journey.







Update on Sudanese Congregation

A small group from St. Andrew's has recently reached out to our friends from the Sudanese congregation to connect and explore how we can continue to support one another. Did you know that the Sudanese congregation has been worshiping at St. Andrew's since 1998 when Rev. Robert Breitwieser first welcomed them into our church home? They have now been part of our St. Andrew's family for 27 years!

On September 28, 2025, Lorna Andronikou, Tom McIntyre, and Rev. Peter Coutts joined Rev. Laurie McKay in attending the Sudanese worship service. During the service, Rev. Laurie had the joy of ordaining several new elders and youth group leaders who will help guide their growing community.

The Sudanese congregation worships with enthusiasm, particularly through their singing. We were blessed to share in prayer and to share the experience of the vibrant music offered by both the children's and adult choirs. We also enjoyed a delicious meal together in Trinity Hall.


We are truly grateful for the faith, warmth, and fellowship the Sudanese congregation brings to our shared life at St. Andrew's as we continue
