The Advent Procession

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT, YEAR A

Sunday, November 30, 2025 4.00 p.m.





We elcome to Christ Church Cathedral. We acknowledge that we gather for this service on Lekwungen territory, and that for thousands of years the Songhees and Esquimalt peoples have walked gently on the unceded land where we now work and worship. We seek the advent of a new relationship with the first peoples here, one based in honour and respect, and we will actively work toward that reconciliation.

A note about this evening's readings and procession

Advent is a season of preparation, a type of active waiting. We wait for hope to be born anew in a world that too often seems dark and is getting darker as the days move deeper into December. As a people of faith, our response is to light candles, increasing every Sunday until Christmas. It reminds us that to actively increase the light present in our world and our own souls is holy work and prepares the way for the Christ Child.

The other thing we do is tell the stories of our faith tradition, stories of loss and lostness, stories of faith and God's continued faithfulness to us. Through this narrative we are reminded that there is an order and plan to salvation history, even when we cannot perceive it, and that often when the world seems dark and the way lost, we are, in fact, closest to God and on the precipice of love appearing from the most unexpected place. Let the beauty of this service do its work in your heart, that you might leave here strengthened for the days ahead, and longing for the coming of Christ again this Christmas season.

A note about the Antiphons

This service is based upon the ancient Advent "O Antiphons." An antiphon is a sentence of scripture or other sacred text which is sung before and then repeated after a canticle or psalm. While their authorship is unclear, from as early as the 8th century, on each of the seven days preceding Christmas, monks sang these particular antiphons at Vespers before and after the Magnificat, or "Song of Mary."

They are referred to as the "O Antiphons" because each addresses Christ with a name or ascription for the Messiah, beginning with the salutary word, "O." Each of these salutations has its roots in the prophecy of Isaiah. So entrenched is this practice, that the days preceding Christmas are often called by the name of their "O Antiphon." It will also be clear that the beloved Advent hymn, "O come, O come, Emmanuel" is based upon the O Antiphons.
