

Our Advent Liturgy

We open with an adaptation of the traditional **O Antiphons**. These are a set of seven short prayers traditionally sung or recited during Evening Prayer in the final days of Advent.

Together they trace a movement from creation's deep wisdom to the intimate promise of "God-with-us," gathering up the hopes of prophets and poets across Scripture.

Prayed in sequence, the O Antiphons invite a slow, attentive waiting. They give language to yearning—for justice, for healing, for light—and help the church lean toward Christmas not with sentimentality but with a grounded hope for God's presence taking flesh in a troubled world.

Advent carries a quiet penitential edge, inviting the church to face what's broken in us and around us so we can welcome Christ's coming with clearer eyes and a readier heart. We've moved confession to the beginning of the service to highlight this theme.


The Gathering of the Community

You comforted your people with the promise of the Redeemer,


through whom you will also make all things new

for the goodness and love


you have made known to us in creation;

and we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.


