BEFRIENDERS by Marci Groenewold

The holidays are upon us, and with them come the mix of joy, grief, and tension that can make this season hard. Recently I subscribed to ColossianForum.org, an organization that works with people "to cultivate connection across difference." As Christians, we know we should love our enemies, but at times we wonder just how to do it. There are ways to find peace and love for others without abandoning our convictions. Difficult conversations do not need to divide and polarize us. For example, following a painful argument with his adult son, a father went to bed anxious and discouraged, unsure how they would move forward. The next morning, he remembered a simple phrase from The Colossian Forum: "Go toward him. Get curious." With this thought in mind, the father reached out, apologized, and said, "Help me understand why you see things this way." They didn't agree on everything, but the conversation softened both of them. What began in tension ended in humility, listening, and deeper love.

Before a BeFriender makes a visit, they pause to take a moment to set aside anything that might prevent them from really hearing what the other person is trying to say. The "Palms up, Palms down" prayer is one way to do that. With palms down and using a releasing posture, we let go asking God "What do I need to let go of or what are you inviting me to let go of?" With palms together we pray "what am I thankful for or what am I going to be thankful for." Finally with palms up we ask "What gift do you want to give me?"

Although the temptation is to rush ahead and fix what's broken, it's important for us to slow down long enough to know what God's been forming in us all along.


