Get to Know: BARBARA KARLIN

First a little history! I'm Barbara Karlin and have been an FBC Salina member since the late 1970's. Music has always been a part of my life, starting with singing Sunday School songs, then piano lessons as a young girl and organ lessons in high school. I was organist at my home church (FBC, Barnard KS) for a couple of years and I sang and played in high school groups. Then came college where I sang in choir at FBC, Hays KS. I moved to Salina in 1976 and began attending FBC Salina, singing in the choir. John and I were married here in June 1978. When organist/pianist Joy Patrick found out I could play organ, I became her substitute. Then Joy

went to be with Jesus in 2013, but I was still teaching and didn't need another thing on my plate. Deb Moravec served as organist until her husband, Randy, finished his preacher schooling and became pastor at Gypsum, leaving in July 2015. I took over after that. God's timing was perfect since I had retired from teaching May 2014! Joan Grover served as music minister and pianist until moving away in 2019 so I "inherited" the music minister and choir accompanist roles. Amy Brandt (who was already choir

director) began playing piano for the praise team.

One of my strengths as identified by StrengthsFinder is INPUT. This serves me well in my weekly meetings with Pastor Kevin. I suggest songs for the service, sometimes matching them with the sermon topic/scripture. When I don't know the sermon topic, I start with one song and then find others that compliment it. I have MANY alphabetized lists including one in which I identified various topics

INPUT: People strong in the Input theme have a craving to know more. Often they like to collect and archive all kinds of

mentioned in each praise song. Then I can go to the "Topical Index of Hymns" in the hymnal and find hymns that coordinate with the praise song. During our meetings, Pastor Kevin and I discuss the songs and sometimes replace my choices with other ones. INPUT also demands that I keep track of when we sing a song so that none get over-used.

Praising God during worship is a privilege. I love to hear people singing their love for God, along with the song leaders and the praise team. It helps me focus on God's love for us...so much that He sent His Son, Jesus, to be our Savior and gave us the Holy Spirit to give us guidance and power in our daily lives. A few verses from Psalm 33:

Sing joyfully to the Lord, you righteous; it is fitting for the upright to praise him.

Sing to him a new song; play skillfully, and shout for joy. For the word of the Lord is right and true; he is faithful in all he does.





Resilient Church: The Ability to Withstand or Recover Quickly from Difficult Conditions

No English translations of the Bible contain the word "resilience" in the text. Nowhere does Scripture specifically mention the ability to withstand or recover quickly from difficult conditions. Yet, while the term is not in the Bible, the concept of resilience is all over Scripture! Just consider what the passages on this page say about resilience.

"Though the righteous fall seven times, they rise again."
Proverbs 24:16

When the Israelite people crossed the Jordan River on dry ground, they used 12 large stones from the riverbed to build a memorial in the Promised Land. These stones where to be a "memorial to the people of Israel forever" of how God had delivered them out of Egypt and into the Promised Land (Joshua 4). By reminding the Israelites that He was at work, God developed their resilience for the challenges facing them in the future.

Seeing God at work among us in the past develops our resilience for the future.

That is why we celebrate the numerous ways that we see God at work in FBC Salina today. During our Unity

Sunday celebration, we highlighted God at work in 2025 through ...

- Professions of faith, baptisms, and child dedications
- Young and old stepping up in service
- Youth and adults sharing the light of Christ with friends
- Testimonies of God intervening during difficult times
- 17 new families regularly attending worship in the last two years

These reminders are like the memorial stones for Israel. They are visible reminders that God is at work in FBC Salina. And like Israel, seeing God at work among us in the past develops our resilience for the future.

As we approach the end of 2025, we know that we will face adversity in the future - adversity as individuals and adversity as a church family. That is the nature of life. - The sun


