Brothers and Sisters,

May God's grace give us the necessary joy, peace, and patience to love our neighbors.



Welcome to part 3 of the 4-part series, "The 4 Ways to be Church". In part one (October), we looked at the church as a hospital for sinners. Last month (November), we looked at the church as a loving family. This month (December), we look at the church as a non-violent army. We'll end the series in January 2026 by looking at the church as a worshipping community. To effectively obey the great commandment (Matthew 22:37-40, Mark 12:28-34 & Luke 10:25-28), fulfill the great commission (Matthew 28:18-20), and meet the great expectation (Micah 6:6-8, Isaiah 1:17), the local congregation must look upon itself as a hospital for

sinners, loving family, non-violent army, and worshipping community.

So, the church is a non-violent army. An army is an organized group of people fighting against an enemy. Yes, as followers of Christ, we have an enemy. Before we describe our enemy, we must recognize that we should never consider other people to be our enemy. Jesus commands us to love all people, to include people we think of as our enemies. (Matthew 5:43-48, Romans 12:20 & Proverbs 25:21-22) Thus, we should not consider people to be our enemies.

So, if people are not our enemy, then what is our enemy? Ephesians 6:12 provides the answer, "For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms." This verse starts off by reemphasizing that people are not our enemy. Then it provides two types of enemies. The first type consists of the 'rulers, authorities, and powers of this dark world'. The second type consists of the 'spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms'.

The 'rulers, authorities, and powers of this dark world' refer to the oppressive systems of injustice. Jesus came, not only to free us from the guilt & power of sin, but to also establish justice. In Matthew 12:15-21, we learn that Jesus fulfilled a prophecy from Isaiah. This prophecy states, "Here is my servant whom I have chosen, the one I love, in whom I delight; I will put my Spirit on him, and **he will proclaim justice to the nations**. He will not quarrel or cry out; no one will hear his voice in the streets. A bruised reed he will not break, and a smoldering wick he will not snuff out, **until he has brought justice through to victory.** In his name the nations will put their hope." (Isaiah 42:1-4)

It makes sense that God is a God of justice. God loves every person on this planet. It breaks God's heart to see one group of people oppress another group of people. Justice is the action taken to prevent oppression. God, therefore, pursues justice.

The 'spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms' refer to the hateful influence Satan and his demons have on this world. The Apostle Peter describes Satan as a "...roaring lion looking for someone to devour." (1 Peter 5:8) Satan & his demons use deceit to influence people to violently establish systems of oppression.

Our strategy is to peacefully resist hatred & injustice with truth & love. We engage with truth as we fulfill the great commission (Matthew 28:19). We engage with love as we obey the great commandment (Matthew 22:37-38) and live up to the great expectation (Micah 6:8).

Our tactics vary. Many congregations use the tactic of mitigating the negative effects of sin & inequality. They do so by establishing food pantries, clothes closets, tutoring programs, mentoring programs or other ministries that address the needs of the surrounding community. Other congregations may lobby the government to pass laws to protect vulnerable members of society or safeguard the environment. Some congregations may participate in non-violent protests.

For us to be an uncommon church for common people, offering a love of neighbor without boundaries, we must be a loving family, a hospital for sinners, a non-violent army, and a worshipping community. I will write about that last one in the January 2026 Beacon Article.

Coral Isles Church Blue Christmas


Blue? Yes, blue as in the blues. As in "I am feeling blue." Not everyone is up and cheery for the Christmas holidays. Coral Isles Church is having a *Blue Christmas Service on Wednesday, December 17 at 6:00 pm at 90001 Overseas Hwy, Tavernier*. This worship service is designed to help those who are depressed during the holidays.

A Meditation on Philippians 2:5-11

Philippians 2:5-7: "Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God,

did not consider equality with God a thing to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness."

Meditation on 2:5-7: Jesus was equal with God. The only way to be equal with God is to be God. Jesus, however, decided not to grasp or hold on to equality with God. Instead, He entered humanity through childbirth and became 'God in the flesh'. As such, He showed us how to be a perfect human. To do that, Jesus had to 'empty himself' or 'make himself



nothing'. In other words, He willingly let go of some of His Godly characteristics so he could become a genuine human completely dependent on God the Father for support, guidance and power. He maintained this love relationship with His Father through total cooperation with the Holy Spirit. The relationship Jesus had with His Father is the type of relationship we should strive to have with God. Jesus is our perfect example. This is what Christmas is all about.

Philippians 2:8: "And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to deatheven death on a cross!"

Meditation on 2:8: Not only did Jesus enter our world as a human, He also lived a life of obedience to the Father. God became human and allowed Himself to be falsely arrested, unfairly tried, beaten, whipped, spat upon, ridiculed, tortured and finally, murdered on a cross. He did this to become the one and only sacrifice necessary to pay the penalty for our sins. In this way we can freely accept God's forgiveness and enjoy an eternal love relationship with God. This is what Christmas is all about.

Philippians 2:9-11: "Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰ that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹ and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

Meditation on 2:9-11: The evil that sought to destroy Jesus on the cross didn't have the last word. On the third day Jesus rose from the dead and proved himself to be The Son of God who came to save the world from sin. At that moment, the decisive battle was won. Sin, death and evil began to fight a losing war. Jesus was glorified and declared to be Lord by God the Father. This is what Christmas is all about.

Why would God do this? Why would God become human? The answer is simple, He loves us and we matter to Him. As sinful humans who live in a fallen world, we yearn for answers concerning our predicaments, trials and suffering. It often seems like evil is triumphant and goodness is weak. When tragedy hits, we wonder, "Where is God?" and, like Psalm 10:1, we cry out, "Why, O LORD, do you stand far off? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble?" God answered these pleas over 2,000 years ago in a town called Bethlehem. God entered our world as a human named Jesus and experienced the same anguish and pain we experience. God knows our pain. We matter to God. This is what Christmas is all about.

If we matter to God, then God cares about how we live. God is like the perfect Father who is concerned about His child's behavior. How we act matters to God. Do we love each other? Are we taking care of the poor and marginalized? Do we stand up for the weak and oppressed? Are we willing to sacrifice for others? What are we doing to join God in God's work to usher in the Kingdom of God?

This is what Christmas is all about.
