





We look forward to welcoming kids from our congregation, neighborhood, and other church communities who wish to learn and grow with God in an inclusive, affirming, and encouraging environment.


We look forward to welcoming kids in grade 1-6, and ages 5 and under with adult supervision.

MAY THIS CHURCH BE LIKE A TREE

Workshop by Katja Brittain - October 25, 2025 - Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd - Red Deer

First things first, what a wonderful time we had together, driving to Red Deer and back! Thank you to ELCOC and especially a member of the congregation for sponsoring our participation in this event. It was a full day, listening to Katja and conversing with other ELCIC churches from Okotoks to Edmonton area. We are not alone in our struggles; some have sold, some are thinking of selling and some are revitalizing. Many churches had stories of dwindling attendance, in some cases down to only a dozen or so per Sunday. We are blessed to have the attendance and the space that we do and are blessed to currently be hosting new families and visitors to our space. We also need to keep in mind our weekly activities and the visitors that they bring in - volunteers, choir members and families and should be thinking about how we are welcoming them and also encouraging them to contribute to our space. Here are some of the take aways we heard:

Hybrid Worship - Sasha

LCOC seems to be one of the congregations that uses of livestreaming and YouTube channel in an advanced way: Multiple cameras/angles, intentional interaction with those online in the service (sharing of the peace and communion). Our positive outlook with use of online worship of being a safe place to all to check us out and using this option for home-bound people. Other's perception is for online to translate into people coming in-person. The concern of most is the "disconnect" between those who worship online vs in person. How do we bridge that, if possible? Planned Zoom connect sessions would help to fill this gap

Amalgamating / Changing Space - Kathy

We were given a list of activities that churches undertake when they need or want/need to make changes in their buildings. These activities were interesting to help communities figure out the value that members place on different parts of the church. It seems that doing these activities intentionally would help honour the past experiences of members while moving forward. Conversation in this group was guided by the activities but one of the most interesting ideas was - what kind of church would we build if we had to start over today.

Building partnerships for rentals - Hanna

Church buildings are both gifts and responsibilities and ultimately belong to God. They can strengthen mission, drain energy, or open doors to new community impact. We should view them as partners for new ministry. Rentals should align with your church's mission and values and be purposeful. It is ok to decline rentals that are not aligned in order to open doors to other missions. Renters should pay for the space they use at competitive rates. Regular meetings with tenants and perhaps even multi-tenant meetings are important. Day to day rentals within policy can be handled by office but larger partnerships should be handled through property committee with recommendation to council. We received multiple handouts and a toolkit for assisting congregations to make decisions in this space, starting with a space usage analysis.

Dear siblings in Christ,

You know Advent is a season of waiting — but it's not a passive or idle kind of waiting! We are preparing for something world-changing! As candles are lit and prayers rise, we remember that Christ's coming is not only a story from long ago but a promise that continues to unfold right here and now — in our communities, our homes, and our hearts.

In these Advent days, I find myself thinking about all those for whom waiting is not a choice but a reality — those who wait for justice, for safety, for shelter, for dignity, for healing. The poor, the oppressed, the displaced, and

the forgotten are close to God's heart. The winter's dark is challenging at times for mental health. The cold bites those without shelter. Weather can isolate us and intensify loneliness. Jesus' birth among the poor was not an accident of history, but the deliberate sign of a God who demonstrated how important it is to be present in our care for one another.

Here in our Synod, we know something about the challenges of waiting through the long nights of cold winter. Right here in our Synod many congregations are anxiously waiting for a minister! We also know the deep warmth that comes when people care for one another — when neighbours share, when communities open their doors, when churches reach out in support and the walls that divide us crumble. This is Advent hope in action.

Advent reminds us of the essential nature of our active response. Every turning year, we are reminded that following Jesus means not only believing but living as he calls us: to lift the lowly, to speak for the voiceless, to serve with compassion, and to love our neighbour as ourselves. We prepare the way of the God each time we act with justice, mercy, and generosity.

This Advent, I invite you to take hope and turn it into movement. Let your prayers become courage. Let your worship become witness. Let your faith become the kind of love that makes a difference — for all people in need and for all creation.

No more waiting idly by, rise up, Advent calls!

ELCIC UPDATES



Lutheran Orthodox Commission members meet at Strasbourg's Institute for Ecumenical Research

Members of the International Lutheran Orthodox Commission on Theological Dialogue met at the Strasbourg Institute for Ecumenical Research last week to continue their reflections on the topics of 'Synodality and Primacy', examining the way that authority and decision making has been exercised in the church over the centuries. The second preparatory meeting of the 19th Session of the Commission took place from 16 to 18 November, chaired by Bishop Johann Schneider of the Evangelical Church in Central Germany and by Metropolitan Kyrillos of Krini from the Ecumenical Patriarchate. It follows on from a plenary meeting hosted by the Orthodox Church in Cyprus in May this year.

The Commission members heard presentations on the sacramental foundation of synodality and primacy. The Orthodox presented perspectives on Baptism and Synodality and the Lutherans on Eucharist and Synodality. Other presentations explored questions of decision-making and methods of decision-taking in their churches at local, regional, and universal levels, as well as the necessary relationship between synodality and primacy.

We challenged each other to explore the theological foundations of [our] beliefs through the lens of [our] dialogue partner LWF's Assistant General Secretary for Ecumenical Relations, ELCIC Member, and Prof. Dr Dirk Lange noted how both sides "challenged each other to explore the theological foundations of their beliefs through the lens of their dialogue partner, for the Orthodox through Baptism and for the Lutherans through the Eucharist." He said: "The papers were insightful and thought-provoking, and the ensuing discussion was exciting, outlining topics for further exploration. "Shared prayer was another important dimension of the meeting, as participants began each day with common prayer. They also enjoyed a visit to St Thomas' Church in Strasbourg, known as the "Protestant Cathedral", where the Reformer Martin Bucer served as pastor and later the theologian, medical doctor and organist Albert Schweitzer worked.

At the conclusion of their meeting, Commission members established the agenda for the next plenary gathering to be held from 10 to 16 May next year in Sète, in south-eastern France. That session will continue focusing on the main topics of the 19th Session, 'Synodality and Primacy', with specific attention to the history and reception of the church's Ecumenical Councils, dimensions of ecclesial communion, and other ecclesial decisions, both past and present, as well as the important role of the Holy Spirit in all questions of synodality and primacy.

Brazil: a passion for protecting the rights of people and the planet

A medical student and an active member of the Evangelical Church of the Lutheran Confession in Brazil (IECLB), Jorge Fernando Cunha was part of the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) delegation to the UN climate conference, COP30, that took place in Belém, Brazil, earlier this month. It was a groundbreaking experience for the 25-year-old, who also participated in an LWF Peace Messengers training held in Guatemala in May this year. His experience at COP marked a high point for him, the culmination of a journey which began way back in primary school, where he and some school friends embarked on an environmental awareness campaign to "teach" adults about the damage being done to planet Earth.

Tell us a bit about yourself and where you come from? Yes, I'm a fourth-year medical student and I live in São Luís, the capital of the state of Maranhão in north-eastern Brazil. I was born and grew up here, but my grandparents on both sides came from rural areas and worked in the fishing industry. We don't live in the very poorest part of town, but it's not the wealthy side of the city either. I do research into the health and education of children and teenagers, and I am a part of the International Federation of Medical Students Associations.

You didn't grow up in the church, did you? No, my family was Catholic and then later, we moved to a Pentecostal church but that didn't speak to me on a theological level. During the pandemic, I joined an online session of the Lutheran church and realized that this was the place where I could live out my faith. I usually say that I was a Lutheran all my life, but I just didn't discover the church until then. The church is actually in my neighborhood, but our community is only 20 years old, so we don't have many people who have grown up with the church. It is a small community with less than 50 registered members, but we have visitors and other people who come to worship with us every Sunday.

Where does your passion for climate justice come from? When I was only about seven or eight years old, my mother gave me one of those school notebooks that had information written on the sides of the pages about garbage disposal, water pollution, or climate change. As a child, I thought that obviously, other people don't know about this, because if they did, they would have done something to stop it by now. With my friends, I started a neighborhood group of children who met in my home and shared some snacks while we discussed how we could let other people know what was happening to our planet. We got some folders with the information that we wrote out by hand and put them into the mailboxes of our neighbors' houses. That's how it started for me, but later at our state school my professors were concerned about attacks that were happening against indigenous people. We had discussions about land rights and about the importance of preserving indigenous culture to help preserve the planet. Before studying medicine, I also went to law school for four years where I learned about environmental law. Here in Latin America, nature is increasingly seen as a subject of rights and that was life-changing for me as I started to see things in a different way.

You talk about hope, but many people at COP were disappointed with the outcomes?

Yes, I was also disappointed to see how some people try to go back on decisions or proposals made a few years ago. But at the same time, for me it was a place of hope because I could see how many people there are working for change, taking the ideas of climate justice forward. So even now that COP30 has ended, I can still feel the strength of those people who continue to work for these ideals.

What are the next steps that you'll be taking to continue this work?

As part of our church's youth program here in Brazil, we coordinated a project called 'COP of the Evangelical Youth' supporting the presence of 14 young people at the conference in Belém. We organized devotional and spirituality sessions, as well as workshops to prepare them to go back to their communities, their churches, and ensure that climate justice is integrated into all our lives and beliefs as Christians. We discussed ways of supporting them to create their own projects to have an environmental impact, how to transform their ideas into actions, how to find funding and so on. Some of them want to work on solar panels, or collect rainwater for use in church, or design community gardens. Others plan to talk to local companies about how to protect the planet while saving money at the same time. I'm hoping to support some of them with the next steps for these different projects. At the same time, I realize how people don't always understand how environmental justice relates to their personal, their family or their community life. So now I am planning to do some informative posts on our Instagram to show how climate justice relates to every single area of life.

Beyond politics and economics, how do you think that voices of faith can make a difference in this work for environmental justice?

In the COP negotiations themselves, it's hard to see the faith groups being represented, and I'm not sure if that is the right place for them to be. But I think that spirituality affects all aspects of our lives, whether people believe in God or not. Spirituality is something that we all bring with us and it gives us strength to keep fighting and working for what is right. As Christians, I believe we should be the ones who keep on hoping, who don't give up. We might be tired, we might need to rest a bit, but we don't give up. As people of faith, we must look into the souls of all those who are struggling and tell them that we are here for you. We will help you to continue this journey for more justice in the world.

What is the most important lesson that you are taking away from these experiences as part of the LWF family?

The heartwarming lesson that I learned from both experiences is that I am not alone. For our generation, we are always surrounded by information and ideas, but I think we feel increasingly isolated and alone. So, this was the most powerful lesson for me to know that I am not alone, but that I am part of this beautiful communion of people of faith.
