Painting the Outside of the Sanctuary

We love our historic buildings. Whether we have been here for 20 years or just a couple of months, we are taking care of these beautiful buildings. Our sanctuary was built in 1894 and it has been used continuously for worship with the exception of the recent pandemic. Our cottage and carriage house were the original parsonage and carriage house for the horse and cart.

It is our turn to take care of the physical state of our buildings. Two years ago, we obtained a grant and a loan to put a new roof on the building. This year we are taking care of the painting on the outside of the sanctuary.

The project will start the week of July 20 with putting up scaffolding on the front of the building and around the side. The next step involves taking care of the spots where the paint has peeled. Because the paint contains lead, extra care needs to be taken in some ways. (Lead paint is safe to the touch. If you try to scrape off lead paint, it releases small particles into the air which cause other problems.)

We can't power wash the building because of the lead paint. The force of the power washing would displace some of the paint. The alternative to power washing is to hand brush the entire building. And this needs to be done by professionals who know how to deal with lead paint.

Then our painters will come in a put a primer on followed by two coats of paint. (And if anyone asks, we are not changing the color.) Finally, the scaffolding comes down the week of August 17th.

We are funding this project through a grant and loan from the District Union, money from the parsonage account, and a capital campaign.

The building will look amazing and we will rededicate the sanctuary when it is complete.




Wesley

Pastor's Prose: Come In. You Are Welcome Here.

This summer feels so different for me from other summers. I usually think of writing about recharging my soul on the beach or enjoying the "lazy days of summer." This year feels so much more intense. What is

happening in this country has touched me deeply since January, and not in a good way.

As I was preparing something for a retreat I am attending in July, I came across this statement

by Martin Luther King, Jr., from his book, Where Do We Go from Here: Chaos or Community.

"Some years ago, a famous novelist died. Among his

papers was found a list of suggested plots for future stories, the most prominently underscored being this one: "A widely separated family inherited a house in which they have to live together." This is the great new problem of [hu]mankind. We have inherited a large house, a great "world house" in which we have to live together – black and white, Easterner and Westerner, Gentile and Jew, Catholic and Protestant, Muslim and Hindu – a family unduly separated in ideas, culture and interest, who, because we can never again live apart, must learn to live with each other in peace."

This was written more than a half century ago, and yet, it is the same problem we are struggling with today. Morgan Hill United Methodist Church is a place where we live together in this home we have. This is a place that stands out as very different from many parts of the world where conflict is real and violence is increasing. Here, at Morgan Hill United Methodist Church, we welcome everyone who comes in the door.

We accept everyone for who they are. Belonging in this place is a given.

What I see happening in the world beyond the church bothers me because it is not about having peace, or even trying to find peace with people. When I have watched pictures of people being chased through fields or people going to an immigration hearing to have their case dismissed and then being arrested or people standing in front of a Home Depot and being taken away, it breaks my heart.

The promise of arresting and deporting criminals (which everyone agrees with) has become a story of fiction unless every person who looks different than a white person is considered a criminal. It seems that this administration wants to make this country something it never was; a white male dominated culture.

From the beginning this land had natives here long before white Europeans showed up.

The country and the world need people like us who know how to say "Come in. You are welcome here."

Soon after the first Europeans showed up people from Africa were imported to be slaves. So, now is not the first time we have to consider how to live with people in peace, and not the first time we need to ask what kind of country we are and aspire to be.

This year I am using a book by Sister Joan Chittister for my devotions. Earlier in June the entry said, "When we stop seeking services for immigrants, we have stopped searching for God. Without that commitment, we only look as if we are searching for God. To find God we must welcome everything."

Morgan Hill United Methodist Church lives up to Joan's words and to the commands Jesus gives us to welcome everyone and help them be part of our community. Let us reaffirm our discipleship and have courage to help everyone be welcome not only at this church, but in this country. The country and the world need people like us who know how to say "Come in. You are welcome here."



Over the years many families from Morgan Hill have worshipped at the church, and the church has participated with the community in many events. The building holds a prestigious place in the community with its location on Monterey St.

Two years ago, a new roof was put on the sanctuary. This summer the church is painting the outside of the sanctuary. This is a large project since the building hasn't been painted in a number of years so the paint contains lead. To keep the people working on this project and the community safe a lead abatement company has been hired to remove the paint. Morgan Hill United Methodist Church is joining in the renewal of Morgan Hill with this painting project. We invite you to assist with this project so that this historic building will be part of the pride of Morgan Hill.



Finance Update

As of March 31, 2025 our finances are doing well. Our pledged income & non-pledged income is \$10,000 above budget, and our expenses are about \$5,900 below-budget.

In the **General Fund** (main checking account), the balance was about \$40,779.20, plus \$20,000 in a CD.

In the **Designated/Pass Through** fund, the account balance was \$10.426.11.

Our **Building Fund** account balance was \$4,038.20.

The Parsonage Rental Checking account balance was \$9,634.

The Parsonage Rental Money Market account balance was \$37,810.41.

The **MHUMC Endowment** continues to receive contributions and earn interest and dividends. The finance team will be reconciling the 3/31/25 statement in the coming month. The last statement received in December 2024 showed a balance of \$27,453.

Kathryn, aka Kathy, was born and raised in New York and Greencastle, Indiana is a graduate of Depauw University, where she earned a Bachelor of Arts degree. Shortly thereafter, while taking flying lessons, she met the love of her life, Lynn Carl Liebschutz, whom she married on June 18, 1966 in upstate New York. Together they celebrated over 58 wonderful years together.

While living in California, she worked as an elementary school librarian before embarking on a 30-year career as a Chaplain at San Jose Airport.

She traveled extensively abroad and within the United States with her husband and her children. She loved spending time with her family, whether it was vacationing, sharing a meal, or just a small boat ride. She enjoyed cruises, with her favorite being the family cruise to Alaska. She also enjoyed her trips to the British Isles, the Mediterranean, and Europe. She loved learning different cultures and traditions, meeting new people wherever she went. She grew bountiful gardens, in which she cooked delicious meals using her fresh produce. She was a skilled baker even to the extent of briefly running a catering business and enjoyed making homemade breads. She was also a talented seamstress and knitter. She made many beautiful quilts and prayer shawls. She was active within her church and community outreach. In St. Mary's she volunteered with the Soup Kitchen and at Three Oaks, serving on the Board of Directors, and heading the Transitions Foundation. She was kind-hearted, forgiving, and good natured. She could always find the good in others and believed everyone deserved a second chance.
