# Welcome Haley Feuerbacher: Minister of Young Generations



Dr. Haley Feuerbacher (she/her) is a community organizer, writer, minister, and theologian who brings queer, ecofeminist, survivor-centered, and engaged approaches to faith and justice. She is excited to join the staff of Morgan Hill United Methodist Church to create brave, joyful spaces for kids and youth to explore faith, identity, and belonging through curiosity, compassion, creativity, and connection.

Her ministry is rooted in mental and holistic wellbeing, post-traumatic thriving, embodied spirituality, and the wisdom of wildness—where joy is a prophetic witness, transformation is sacred, and justice and liberation are the heartbeat of faith. At the heart of her work is the calling to be about the brave and messy art of coming alive together.

Haley holds a Ph.D. in Religion and Culture and a graduate certificate in Women's and Gender Studies, with over 20 years of experience as a minister, educator, and spiritual activist. She is the founder of The Rewilding Ministry, an ecojustice nonprofit that creates survivor-centered sacred spaces that transform religious, spiritual, and other forms of trauma into radical joy, sustainable justice, and wild spirituality for people and planet. She also co-leads The NliveN Movement, a trauma-informed running and walking community that integrates movement, mindfulness, and meaning-making to help people reconnect with their bodies, stories, and each other.

Haley is passionate about creating mindful adventures and making memories doing sweaty and sacred things that scare her a little bit in the outdoors: running, surfing, kayaking, rock climbing, writing, creating rituals and art, and storytelling. She lives and plays on a mountaintop in Boulder Creek with her partner SB, her son Christian, and their wild pack of pets.

## Pastor's Prose: Choose What is Right

I sometimes hear something or read something that I think that is something to remember. So, I will write down that thought. Sometimes it is a thought to journal about later. Sometimes it is just a phrase that is memorable. Most of the time I have a notebook

handy. When I don't have a notebook, I grab whatever I can. A few days ago, I came across a piece of paper with a saying I had written down a few weeks ago.

The thought was, "the coming times will be rough and we will each have a decision to make whether to do the right thing or do the easy thing." Lately, I have been thinking a lot about what it means to be a disciple of Jesus. I know it means loving those who are tough to love and being compassionate in our everyday life. Being a disciple also means knowing when to say "no" and when to speak truth to power.

Being a disciple means knowing who we are and not changing who we are when pressured to do something that is against our nature. A story came to mind that I read a few years ago. The story is from the book "The Signature of Jesus: The Call to a Life marked by a Holy Passion and Relentless Faith" by Brennan Manning. (PRH Christian Publishing; Reprinted edition (July 6, 2004).)

There is a story of an old man who used to meditate early every morning under a big tree on the bank of the Ganges River. One morning, after he had finished his meditation, the old man opened his eyes and saw a scorpion floating helplessly in the water. As the scorpion was washed closer to the tree, the old man quickly stretched himself out on one of the long roots that branched out into the river and reach out to rescue the drowning creature. As soon as he touched it, the scorpion stung him. Instinctively the man withdrew his hand. A minute later, after he had regained his balance,

he stretched himself out again on the roots to save the scorpion. This time the scorpion stung him so badly with its poisonous tail that his hand became swollen and bloody and his face contorted with pain.

At that moment, a passerby saw the old man stretched out on the roots struggling with the scorpion and shouted,

"Hey, stupid old man, what's wrong with you? Only a fool would risk his life for the sake of an ugly evil creature. Don't you know you could kill yourself trying to save that ungrateful scorpion?"

The old man turned his head. Looking into the stranger's eyes he said calmly, "My friend, just because it is the scorpion's nature to sting, that does not change my nature to save."



This old man knew he had a choice to do the easy thing to let the scorpion continue to float down the river. The right choice was to do what was his nature; to save. Even an evil, ugly creature in this old man's eyes deserved to be saved. He knew who he was. His nature was to save.

I believe we will all face choices in the next months and we will have to decide to do the right thing or to do the easy thing. The better we know who we are, the decision we make will be closer to our nature. So, reflect on what it means for you to be a disciple and then when the decision comes along you will be ready. ## Finance Update: Doing Well

As of March 31, 2025 our finances are doing well. Our pledged income & non-pledged income is \$10,000 above budget, and our expenses are about \$5,900 below-budget.

In the **General Fund** (main checking account), the balance was about \$40,779.20, plus \$20,000 in a CD.

In the **Designated/Pass Through** fund, the account balance was \$10,426.11.

Our **Building Fund** account balance was \$4,038.20.

The Parsonage Rental Checking account balance was \$9,634.

The Parsonage Rental Money Market account balance was \$37,810.41.

The **MHUMC Endowment** continues to receive contributions and earn interest and dividends. The finance team will be reconciling the 3/31/25 statement in the coming month. The last statement received in December 2024 showed a balance of \$27,453.

## Trustees: Planning for 2025

#### **Recent Accomplishments**

- 1. The addition of 4 solar powered cameras that cover the entire facility. Camera feeds tie in to a phone of the trustees.
- 2. There is currently a sub-group that is committed to create adequate funding for the repair and painting of the church. The group is moving forward with lead repair work. Several vendors are being contacted to bid on the actual painting of the sanctuary.
- 3. Blue curbs have been painted after the hanging of a new handicap sign on the north side of the church.
- 4. Sanctuary lights have been replaced with the appropriate sized lights, bringing much more light to the facility.

#### Projects Being Planned for 2025 Include (not in priority order)

- 1. Paint the church (asbestos/lead testing done now; project targeted for spring 2025)
- 2. Replace steeple (to be done when scaffolding is up for repainting)
- 3. Sanctuary ceiling fan replacement
- 4. Replace the remaining old flooring in the Fellowship Hall
- 5. Memorial garden
- 6. Stained glass windows shore up

We immediately felt welcomed, and we are so grateful to be a part of our beautiful congregation!

## District Union: Help with Grant/Loan

The District Union is an organization of the El Camino Real District. They have funds to give grants and loans to churches to begin ministries, reach out to new communities, and to assist in making repairs on church facilities. Morgan Hill UMC has gone to the District Union three times. In 2021, we obtained a loan to repair the parsonage so we could rent it out. In 2023, we received a \$40,000 grant and a \$40,000 loan to get a new roof on our sanctuary. And now we applied for a \$10,000 grant and a \$10,000 loan to help with the funding of the outside painting of the sanctuary. We will be planning and starting this project in a few months. Listen for updates.



# In Memory of Ken Kawakami—March 20, 1943 - April 3, 2025




Kenneth Nobuo Kawakami, passed away suddenly and unexpectedly at home on April 3, 2025. He was born in Honolulu, HI. to Noboru Kawakami and Chiyoko (Clara) Kawakami on March 20, 1943. He got involved with HAM radio in middle school which sparked his interest in electronics. Graduated from Honolulu's McKinley High School in 1961, attended Purdue University School of Electrical Engineering for BSEE (65) and MSEE (67), was recruited by Hughes Aircraft in the Los Angeles area upon graduation. Moved north in 1970 to work at Litton Industries in San Carlos as a Research Scientist in Microwave Engineering. He designed microwave components and subsystems for military and commercial markets and later helped grow Microwave Technology (MWT) from a startup. Ken's knowledge of systems and subsystems was extensive and he is acknowledged as one of the premier experts in the Microwave Field. He was never too busy to help young engineers and excelled at

teaching. Legally blind in 1998, he continued to work until he retired from Teledyne Microwave Solutions in 2017 doing complex equations in his head. He had a deep interest in Quantum Mechanics. He was a past member of IEEE and Association of Old Crows.

Ken was a great listener and a gentle soul. He was a quiet, somewhat shy man who used his guitar as an entree in social settings. He was accomplished in classical guitar, folk songs and on the electric guitar for '50's-'60's rock and roll music. Our camping group sang many a song accompanied by his guitar around the campfire through the years.


