Isaiah 11: 1-10

The Peaceful Kingdom

- 11 A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots.
- ²The spirit of the Lord shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord.
- ³ His delight shall be in the fear of the Lord.
- He shall not judge by what his eyes see or decide by what his ears hear,
- ⁴ but with righteousness he shall judge for the poor and decide with equity for the oppressed of the earth; he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked.
- ⁵ Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist and faithfulness the belt around his loins.

The wolf shall live with the lamb; the leopard shall lie down with the kid; the calf and the lion will feed together, and a little child shall lead them.

Gospel Reading

New Revised Standard Version

Matthew 3: 1-12

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, ² "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." ³ This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord; make his paths straight.' "

⁴ Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey.
⁵ Then Jerusalem and all Judea and all the region around the Jordan were going out to him, ⁶ and they were baptized by him in the River Jordan, confessing their sins.

But when he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming for his baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath?

8 Therefore, bear fruit worthy of repentance, 9 and do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our

ancestor,' for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. ¹⁰ Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; therefore every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire.

"I "I baptize you with water for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is more powerful than I, and I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. 12 His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and will gather his wheat into the granary, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."



Jan's Journal



This Sunday is the second Sunday of Advent, the focus of which is "Peace."

Thank you to everyone who contributed to making "Casseroles and Carols" such a lovely evening event!
Thank you also to those who have volunteered to light the Advent candles at upcoming worship services. There is still a

vacancy on Christmas Eve. If you plan to attend the Christmas Eve service, perhaps you would consider lighting the final candle, the Christ candle?

I am very disappointed to tell you that the response to my appeal for volunteers to play a role in the Christmas Eve skit has been very poor. We had a lot of fun preparing and presenting The Muddled Christmas Star in 2023 and Michael Mouse in 2024! Unfortunately, it is clear that I will need a different approach this year.

The process of de-cluttering the church in preparation for increasing the community's use of the church's space has begun. This will be a careful process, but it needs to move forward fairly quickly. Change can be difficult. Letting go of things can be difficult. However, it is necessary to let go of the past in order to make room for something new to take place.

Andy and I have recently gone through this process as we packed to move. We had three bins—Garbage, Recycle/Repurpose/Donate, Keep. As we went through our possessions, some items moved from one bin to another and back again! We also had the challenge of different opinions! Some things I felt ready to let go, Andy did not, and vice-versa!

We found that our emotional/sentimental connection to items made it difficult to let them go. A friend made a suggestion: if you haven't used it in the past year, you should let it go. If the emotional connection makes that difficult, create a "Book of Treasures." Take a photograph of the item and place it in a special album. You can look at the album and remember the item and all the treasured memories associated with it, which then makes giving away the physical item a lot easier. Perhaps that is an idea we

might consider as we make our way through this process at the church?

Quite a few years ago, I read a book titled "If You Always Do What You've Always Done, You'll Always Have What You've Always Had." We can relate that thought to the church. Statistics show that The United Church of Canada grew steadily between 1925 and 1968. The denomination reached peak membership in 1968. Church membership has been steadily decreasing since then. The only way that that trend can be halted, or perhaps reversed, is to do some things differently. Think of all the ways in which Canadian Society has changed since 1968! The church is called to meet the needs of the community in this time and in this place. How do we do that? That is what The Community Hub Ad Hoc Team (which has recently renamed itself the Community Connections Team) is working to discern. A good place to begin is to take a fresh look at our space. Try to see each room from the perspective of someone who has never been here before. How might they perceive the space? Does the space say: "I'm old and tired and out of date?" Or does our space say: "I belong to this time?"

Please get involved in the evaluation process!

On a similar vein, please plan to stay following worship this Sunday, to participate in the third and final discussion of the reflections you have received titled "The Theology of Place." We will be discussing questions pertaining to Reflections 7, 8, and 9.

Jan's Chocolate Pie

Ingredients:

Crust: 1 ½ cups graham cracker crumbs

½ cup butter (melted)

Pinch of sugar

Filling: 2 oz. unsweetened dark chocolate

1 tbsp. instant coffee

1 tbsp. brandy (or brandy flavouring)

1 cup butter

2/3 cup sugar

2 eggs

3/4 cup ground almonds

Method:

- Mix graham cracker crumbs, sugar and melted butter thoroughly. Press into a 9-inch pie plate. Fill the bottom and partway up the sides. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Cool completely. Chill.
- Blend softened butter, eggs and sugar (use a food processor for best results)
- Melt the chocolate in a double boiler. Add the instant coffee and brandy and blend. Remove from heat.
- Pour the chocolate mixture into the egg mixture and blend thoroughly
- Add the ground almonds and mix thoroughly
- Pour the filling into the chilled pie crust. Spread evenly.
- Keep refrigerated until time to serve
- Garnish with sliced or slivered almonds.
