tsaiah begins this week's readings with: "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots." For many of us, not having not grown up with a "Jesse Tree" tradition, the reading would usually zip through our ears with no particular impact until we look deeper into this hint of family history.



There's been a serious uptick in the field of genealogy over the last couple of decades or so with online access to family records and even DNA kits that allow one to explore geographical heritage. Discovering the branches of one's family tree is fascinating, even addicting, and can also be frustrating when one limb is missing or the records stop short of fully revealing the information sought. Yet even the smallest detail can add depth and connectedness to the relationship with those who have gone before us. And so it is with the family tree of Jesus. Jesse was the grandson of Ruth

(of "whither thou goest, I will go" fame) and her husband, Boaz. We first hear of Jesse in the Book of Ruth (Ruth 4:13-18) as the son of their son, Obed. Jesse grows to be a farmer with eight sons (1 Samuel 16), the youngest of which is David who becomes King of the Israelites. It is through Jesse's family tree that this root, this Branch, flowers into Jesus.

The secular spectacle of christmas (intentional lower "c") has, for so many, replaced the spiritual celebration and worship in Christ's Mass with the frenzy of over-shopping, garish outdoor decorating with clashing colors of lights, and inflated cartoon characters on lawns that go flat in the morning, as a sort of metaphorical anti-climax.

Yet even in this environment Isaiah tells us that this ...root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples... Paul wants us to abound in hope, and the Gospel of Matthew brings us the very direct and not shy voice of John the Baptist. Jesus is indeed the reason for the season; the reason for our *Christ*-mas - our act of worship of the One we call Messiah, the Anointed Son of God.

New Testament scholar, theologian, and author Marcus Borg tells us that Advent...is a season of anticipation, yearning and longing for a different kind of life and a different kind of world. In this second week of Advent, one way to prepare the way of the Lord is by contemplating: What kind of life, what kind of world am I longing for? Where is Jesus, in my family tree? Am I too far out on a limb or can I decorate my branch with hope, peace, and joyful anticipation?

"The wolf will live with the lamb, the leopard will lie down with the goat, the calf

† Transforming Saints of God

John of Damascus

Priest and Theologian, c. 760

ohn of Damascus was the son of a Christian government official for the Muslim Caliph of Damascus. At an early age, he succeeded his father in this office, but in about 715, he entered the monastery of St. Sabas near Jerusalem. There he devoted himself to an ascetic life and to the study of theology.

In the same year that John was ordained as a priest, 726, the Byzantine Emperor Leo the Isaurian published his first edict against the Holy Images, which signaled the formal outbreak of the iconoclastic controversy. The edict forbade the veneration of sacred images, or icons, and ordered their destruction. In 729-730, John wrote three "Apologies (or Treatises) against the Iconoclasts and in Defense of the Holy Images." He argued that such images were not idols, for they represented neither false gods nor even the true God in his divine nature; but only saints, or our Lord as a man. He further distinguished between the respect, or veneration (proskynesis), that is properly paid to created beings, and the worship (*latreia*), that is properly given only to God.

The Seventh Ecumenical Council, in 787, decreed that crosses, icons, the book of the gospels, and other sacred objects were to receive reverence or veneration, expressed by salutations, incense, and lights, because the honor paid to them passed on to that which they represented. True worship (latreia), however, was due to God

John also wrote a great synthesis of theology, *The Fount of* Knowledge, of which the last part, "On the Orthodox Faith," is best known. To Anglicans, John is perhaps best known as the author of the Easter hymns "Thou hallowed chosen morn of praise" (The Hymnal 1982, #198), "Come, ye faithful, raise the strain" (#199; #200), and "The day of resurrection" (#210).

Last week we read part of the Servant Songs from Isaiah. These describe a mysterious person who serves God through his pain. Sunday's selection adds the concept that the Servant's mission is not just to the Jewish people, but for all nations. As much as God loves his Chosen People, this love is only complete when it reaches all people.

† A New Day, a New Way

e live like the orphan who has been given the promise of adoption but must wait until the legalities are completed. The adoptive parents have promised to return for us when the adoption is finished. Then we will be taken home and know the reality of being in a family. We may still be at the orphanage now, but it is a new day and life is lived in a new way. Our life has become one of preparation, not just

continuing along in the way it has always been.

The word we use for the time between the event that makes a new way possible and that which makes it a present reality is Advent. We live knowing that we have been adopted, but we have not yet been taken home.

The Prophet Isaiah has awakened us to the promise. God's kingdom will be reestablished. Another King David, not just another Davidic King, will come and sit on the throne of the kingdom. This One will be the death-conquering seed that rescues the human family, as promised by God in Genesis 3:15. And he is not just a Savior born, but a monarch reigning. Through his word, reconciliation between God and man, and even among the animals of the earth, will be established. He will be the king of all the world and the nations will submit to him. As a result of all the nations being united under one ruler, war will end.

The promise given through the patriarchs and prophets became the clear articulation of our intense hunger for God. And this hope has been renewed by the first coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Through his birth, life, death, resurrection, and ascension he has made our reconciliation with God and ultimate peace possible. We are adopted as his children and are considered members of God's family, even today.

But the full consummation of our adoption will not be a reality until Jesus returns for us in glory on the

last day. Meanwhile, we live in Advent. Life is different for us, even though we still live in this world and are subject to the powers and principalities that exist. But it is a new day and we are to live in a new way. The hope of the promise is renewed. We are to live in expectation of the satisfaction of our hunger and of becoming children of God, no longer his enemies.

When we prepare for an event that involves action, we do more than just wait. In our preparation we rehearse the way we should act when the time comes. In the military, troops not only train through simulated wartime scenarios, but they also rehearse for the ceremonies welcoming dignitaries and for troop reviews. Football teams scrimmage offense against defense using the formations and plays of the future opponent. In each case, the people involved live in the moment as they anticipate having to live in the future. God in his word has revealed to us his expectations and the manner in which we are called to live in his presence.

Advent is the time for us to begin to train ourselves to live God's way as his children, so that when Jesus returns to bring us home, we will know how to act in God's house as part of the family.


† Art in the Christian Tradition

John the Baptist,

by Alexandre Cabanel (1823-1889), oil on canvas, painted in 1849 Oil on canvas © Musée Fabre, Montpellier, France

this striking painting of Saint John the Baptist comes from the hand of Alexandre Cabanel, one of the most celebrated French painters of the nineteenth century. Cabanel created this canvas after a trip to Rome, and we can sense the classical influence across the whole work with the idealized figures and the almost sculptural clarity of form. John the Baptist appears as a vigorous, fiery preacher, caught mid-proclamation. John's expression is fierce, almost unsettling. It is very unusual, as he is more often shown as a gentle, serene figure quietly directing us toward Christ. On either side, young and old listeners lean in attentively, as though the very air is alive with his message.

To the left stands his cross-shaped staff with the banner "Agnus Dei" (the Lamb of God) the heart of John's mission. He is the forerunner, the one who points beyond himself to



Christ, the Lamb who takes away the sins of the world. Cabanel's John has his mouth slightly open, as though we can almost hear his cry echoing across the desert. Clothed in camel-hair with a leather belt around his waist, he matches perfectly the Gospel's description. His gestures are bold, even dramatic: one arm lifted towards heaven from where the Messiah descends, the other pointing towards the earth He now entered. When Cabanel unveiled this painting in 1849, it was warmly received in Paris, though many viewers were struck by how unusually intense his portrayal of John the Baptist was.

Advent is a season of waiting, longing, and preparing our hearts, and no figure embodies that mission more powerfully than John. Matthew presents him standing in the wilderness,

calling Israel to repentance, to conversion, and to a renewed openness to God. His message is urgent: "Prepare the way of the Lord." By placing John before us now on this Second Sunday of Advent, the Church invites us to do what he urged his listeners to do: to clear away whatever blocks Christ's path into our hearts.

† Happy St. Nicholas Day

ach year in Advent with the focus on Christmas, St. Nicholas Day, December 6th, somehow seems to sneak by us. Very little is known about the life of Nicholas, except that he suffered torture and imprisonment during the persecution under the Emperor Diocletian. It is possible that he was one of the bishops attending the First Ecumenical Council of Nicaea in 325. He was honored as a saint in Constantinople in the sixth century by the Emperor Justinian. His veneration became immensely popular in the West after the supposed removal of his body to Bari, Italy, in the late eleventh century. In England almost 400 churches were dedicated to him.

Nicholas is famed as the traditional patron of seafarers and sailors, and, more especially, of children. As a bearer of gifts to children, his name was brought to America by the Dutch colonists in New York, from whom he is popularly known.

† Ancient Christian Writers

A reading from a commentary on Isaiah by Eusebius, Bishop of Caesarea (c. 340).

The voice of one crying in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight the paths of our God [Isaiah 40:3]. The prophecy makes clear that it is to be fulfilled, not in Jerusalem but in the wilderness. It is there that the glory of the Lord is to appear, and God's salvation is to be made known to all mankind.

It was in the wilderness that God's saving presence was proclaimed by John the Baptist, and there that God's salvation was seen. The words of this prophecy were fulfilled when Christ and his glory were made manifest to all. After his baptism, the heavens opened and the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove rested on him. Then the Father's voice was heard, bearing witness to the Son: This is my beloved Son, listen to him.

The prophecy meant that God was to come to a deserted place, inaccessible from the beginning. None of the pagans had any knowledge of God, since his holy servants and prophets were kept from approaching them. The voice commands that a way be prepared for the Word of God. The rough and trackless ground is to be made level, so that our God may find a highway when he comes. Prepare the way of the Lord: the way is the preaching of the Gospel, the new message of consolation, ready to bring to all mankind the knowledge of God's saving power.

Climb on a high mountain, bearer of good news to Zion. Lift up your voice in strength, bearer of good news to Jerusalem [Isaiah 40:9]. These words harmonize very well with the meaning of what has gone before. They refer opportunely to the evangelists and proclaim the coming of God to men, after speaking of the voice crying in the wilderness. Mention of the evangelists suitably follows the prophecy on John the Baptist.

What does Zion mean if not the city previously called Jerusalem? This is the mountain referred to in that passage from Scripture: Here is mount Zion, where you dwelt. The Apostle says: You have come to mount Zion. Does not this refer to the company of the apostles, chosen from the former people of the circumcision?

This is the Zion, the Jerusalem, that received God's salvation. It stands aloft on the mountain of God, that is, it is raised high on the only-begotten Word of God. It is commanded to climb the high mountain and announce the word of salvation. Who is the bearer of the good news but the company of the evangelists? What does it mean to bear the good news but to preach to all nations, but first of all to the cities of Judah, the coming of Christ on earth?

support a family while finishing school was challenging. My drinking wasn't too bad yet, but as I got older,

married, and busy with life, I drifted away from the church, attending only twice a year. I never asked God for help because I didn't believe I was worthy of praying to Him.

I never wanted to become like my father, but I could see myself heading down that same path. Things got so bad that my wife asked me to leave. We remained married but lived separately - for twelve years.

Eventually, I started attending AA. From the very first meeting, the warmth and welcome of the group overwhelmed me in the best way. I wanted to go back the next day. AA worked for me, and it truly is a wonderful program.

Through AA, I learned that healing begins by finding a Higher Power. My spiritual life began to grow quickly, though I admit I was skipping some steps along the way. I started going back to church. One day, I met a young priest who reminded me of Fr. Joe. I eventually made a full confession for the first time in my life, and afterward I felt like my feet weren't even touching the ground.

I was moved to write a letter to my two daughters. The last line I wrote was, "God forgave me, and I hope you can forgive me also." One of my daughters did forgive me, and today we have a good relationship. My

other daughter is still estranged, but I'm working to rebuild that relationship. My wife and I were never able to reconcile, and we eventually divorced.

I know now that if I hadn't gotten right with

God, I wouldn't have been able to handle anything in my life. Today, with God's will guiding me, I can handle whatever comes my way.

When the young priest eventually left the parish I had been attending, I began looking for a new church home. I was dating Helen, and she encouraged me to visit St. Paul's Church. I went, met Fr. Joe and the wonderful people there, and I came to truly love this church.

Approval of October Vestry Minutes: The October Vestry meeting minutes were approved as written.

Treasurer's Report: Chuck reported that October's Current Month (C/M) performance shows a surplus of \$6,480. This brings the YTD October with a deficit of \$39,535. Based on the YTD October deficit, Chuck believes the year objective of breakeven is at risk. The Franklin Funds had another solid month. YTD gain is \$188,300 or a 10.3% increase. We are at 90% of payments for 2025 Mission Budget.

Greetings!

This week finds us at the second Sunday of Advent with our preparations well underway. In the Gospel reading from Luke, we hear these words of the prophet Isaiah:

The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.'

And we will sing several great Advent hymns that reflect this very message,

two of which are highlighted below: "Prepare the way, O Zion," and "There's a Voice in the Wilderness Crying."

Our opening hymn, "Prepare the Way, O Zion" is a really popular Advent hymn...particularly in Sweden, where it is better known as "Bereden väg för Herran." Frans Mikael Franzén wrote the lyrics in the early 19th century, and over the years, its

wrote the lyrics in the early 19th century, and over the years, its many verses have been translated by numerous writers. One common translation begins "Prepare the Royal Highway." The tune that it is frequently set to is a Swedish folk melody, or at least a Swedish variant of a German folk melody...it's hard to pinpoint exactly where these melodies come from!...that showed up in the 1697 publication of the Svenska Psalmboken (Swedish Psalm book), so it was around a good 100+ years before the

Prepare the way, O Zion, your Christ is drawing near! Let every hill and valley a level way appear. Greet One who comes in glory, foretold in sacred story. Oh, blest is Christ that came in God's most holy name.

He brings God's rule, O Zion; he comes from heaven above. His rule is peace and freedom, and justice, truth, and love. Lift high your praise resounding, for grace and joy abounding. Oh, blest is Christ that came in God's most holy name.

Fling wide your gates, O Zion; your Savior's rule embrace. His tidings of salvation proclaim in every place. All lands will bow before him, their voices will adore him. Oh, blest is Christ that came in God's most holy name.

"There's a Voice in the Wilderness Crying" was written by James Lewis Milligan (1876-1961), an English journalist who emigrated to Ontario, Canada, serving briefly as a Methodist pastor. He wrote the words for the founding of the United Church of Canada in 1925. The tune ASCENSION was composed by another English emigre to Canada, Henry Hugh Bancroft (1904-1988).

There's a voice in the wilderness crying, a call from the ways untrod: Prepare in the desert a highway, a highway for our God! The valleys shall be exalted, the lofty hills brought low; make straight all the crooked places where the Lord our God may go!

O Zion, that bringest good tidings, get thee up to the heights and sing! Proclaim to a desolate people the coming of their King. Like the flower of the field they perish, like grass our works decay, the power and pomp of nations shal<mark>l pass like a dream away</mark>


strong; he stands in the midst of nations, and he will right the wrong. He shall feed his flock like a shepherd, the lambs he'll gently hold; to

and intentionally called out the gifts that God had provided to them that year. What a beautiful example for me.

Psalm 50:9, 14 says "But I do not need the bulls from your barns or the goats from your pens... Make thankfulness your sacrifice to God."

† Suffragan

/ **suhf**-ruh-guhn /

Suffragan - A suffragan bishop is an assisting bishop who does not automatically succeed a diocesan bishop. A suffragan bishop may be elected bishop or bishop coadjutor. In 1814 James Kemp was consecrated Suffragan Bishop of Maryland, even though the office was not authorized by the Episcopal Church's Constitution. From 1829 until 1910, different General Conventions discussed proposals for electing and consecrating suffragan bishops. The 1910 General Convention enacted "Of Suffragan Bishops." A diocese may elect a suffragan bishop, but no diocese may have more than two suffragan bishops except with the special consent of a General Convention.

Country: Indonesia | Population: 5,919,000 | Language: Bugis | Main Religion: Islam | Evangelical: 0.06%

he Bugis are a highly mobile people who are considered the dominant group of South Sulawesi, the third largest island in Indonesia. Most Bugis in the mountains work as farmers growing wet rice and raising livestock, while those along the coast are fishermen or work in port cities. The majority of Bugis fervently adhere to Sunni Islam beliefs and practices, yet many retain some of their traditional beliefs. Bugis believe the first Wednesday and last Thursday of each month are special days that bring good fortune, while Saturdays are bad days that are more likely to bring misfortune. The Bugis place a very high value on both personal honor and communal honor. They work hard to build, maintain, and defend their honor and whenever it is offended, they will consider serious forms of revenge. Pray for God to reveal to them the grace and forgiveness that He offers through Jesus. Ask God to send believers to live and work among the Bugis, and pray that He would open doors for them to share the hope and freedom they've found in Jesus.



No Points for TryingMatthew 3:1-12

It would appear that the Pharisees and Sadducees should at least get points for trying. Instead John verbally attacks them for being all repentance



and no fruit. But to what end? Granted, the Pharisees and Sadducees, teachers of the law and keepers of the temple, come out together overcoming their natural animosity towards each other and they give up their respective positions of power to be subject to the poor people's prophet, but it's just a weekend excursion for them. The diet of locusts and honey and camel's hair clothes with leather belt identify John as one who has forsaken the world for the wilderness, which is always the place of preparation for Israel. So when the city slickers come slumming he calls them on it. Who warned you to flee? Confession by itself is not worth the words used to say "I'm sorry" unless accompanied by a change of heart and hand. That is John's point. You can't come out to do a wilderness weekend of wailing and then go back to the city of business as usual. To bear fruit worthy of repentance is to live into the

conclusion of confession - the amendment of the sinful life. The One who is coming after will do something more than John and though he will burn the same Pharisees and Sadducees with words like blind guides and brood of vipers and white washed tombs he will gather them in with "Father, forgive them..." And so it is for us. Our confession needs a word of judgment

before absolution so that we will not be satisfied with an "I'm sorry" that does not in some measure lead to "I can do better." Amen. Come, Lord Jesus.

The Kingdom Is Near

Isaiah 11:1-10

n our lesson from the Hebrew Bible the prophet foresees a time when God will bring I forth a righteous judge and a new spirit of peace in the world. The wise and faithful judge will come from the stump of Jesse - that is, from the line of the great King David, whose father was Jesse. The Spirit of the Lord will be his as he defends the humble and slays the wicked. The new age of peace will extend even to the animal kingdom.

Psalm 72:1-7, 18-19

The psalm asks that God endow the king with compassionate justice and righteousness, and that his reign may extend over all nations and throughout all generations.

Romans 15:4-13

In this reading Paul points to several passages from the Hebrew scriptures to show how God's promise that the Gentile peoples should come to praise God was being fulfilled. The new Roman converts, whom Paul hopes soon to visit, are urged to live in harmony and to recognize the manner in which Christ's ministry has brought these prophecies to fruition. He is the root of Jesse, that is, the promised son of David, on whom their hope is to be set.

Matthew 3:1-12

Our gospel lesson tells of the ministry of John the Baptist, his message of repentance and his prophecy of the mighty one to come. John himself is the messenger of preparation foretold by Isaiah. He baptizes with water those who confess their sins and wish to change their ways, but he chastises those who do not show the fruits of repentance. Soon come the one who will baptize with the Holy Spirit and with refining fire.

Matthew 3:1-12

This text continues the Advent theme of preparing for the arrival of Jesus. And uses the preaching of John the Baptist to press home that preparation requires internal cleansing and not just straightening up around the house.
