Scripture Reading Isaiah 11:1-10 - A ruler brings justice and peace

- 11:1 A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots.
- 11:2 The spirit of the LORD shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD.
- 11:3 His delight shall be in the fear of the LORD. He shall not judge by what his eyes see or decide by what his ears hear,
- 11:4 but with righteousness he shall judge for the poor and decide with equity for the oppressed of the earth; he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked.
- 11:5 Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist and faithfulness the belt around his loins.
- 11:6 The wolf shall live with the lamb; the leopard shall lie down with the kid; the calf and the lion will feed together, and a little child shall lead them.
- 11:7 The cow and the bear shall graze; their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox.
- 11:8 The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den.
- 11:9 They will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain, for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the LORD as the waters cover the sea.
- 11:10 On that day the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples; the nations shall inquire of him, and his dwelling shall be glorious.

Advent 2 Devotional — The Peace We Dare to Imagine

Isaiah 11:1-10

Isaiah's vision begins with something almost imperceptible: "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse." God's peace does not arrive with spectacle but with a tender sign of

newness emerging from what looks lifeless. Advent invites us to train our eyes on that small shoot—to look for God's future growing in the cracks of the present.

The prophet imagines a world reordered by the Spirit—a world where wolf and lamb dwell together, where predators lose their bite, and where knowledge of the Lord saturates creation like water covers the sea. This is not naïve poetry. It is a holy imagination that contradicts the world as it is for the sake of the world as God intends it to be.

Old Testament scholar Walter Brueggemann famously wrote: "Hope is the refusal to accept the reading of reality which is the majority opinion." Advent hope—and Advent peace—begin in that refusal. We do not deny the brokenness around us, but we refuse to believe that brokenness gets the last word. Isaiah invites us to live from God's alternative future even while we inhabit a conflicted present.

The peace of Isaiah 11 is not a fragile ceasefire. It is a Spirit-shaped shalom that heals creation, reconciles enemies, and gathers all peoples to the banner of the Root of Jesse. This peace is the fruit of God's reign, breaking in through the One upon whom the Spirit rests—Jesus, the promised shoot and the coming King.

This week, let us watch for the small signs of that peace, practice the refusal of despair, and dare to imagine—and embody—the world Isaiah saw. For the shoot is growing. The future of peace is already on the way.

The Season of Advent

Advent marks the beginning of the Christian year and invites us into a time of watchfulness, hope, and preparation as we journey toward the celebration of Christ's birth. Its roots reach back to the 4th and 5th centuries, when early Christians set aside weeks of prayer, fasting, and reflection before the great feast of Christmas. Over time, the Church shaped this period into the

four Sundays before Christmas, each highlighting a central theme of the coming Messiah—hope, peace, joy, and love. During Advent we look back with gratitude to Christ's first coming in the manger, and forward with expectation to his promised return.

Observing Advent at Home

Simple practices can help us slow down and become attentive to God's presence:

Advent Wreath – Light one candle each week, adding prayers or Scripture readings as a family or individually.

Advent Calendar – Use a daily calendar with short verses, reflections, or small acts of kindness to mark each day of the season.

Daily Scripture Readings – Follow an Advent reading plan focusing on prophecy, preparation, and the nativity story.

Family or Personal Prayer Time – Set aside a quiet moment each day to pray, reflect, or give thanks.

Nativity Scene – Place the manger scene in a visible part of your home, adding figures gradually as a reminder of the journey toward Bethlehem.
