# Andrew & Tanja Rokeby

Dear Bethany Baptist,

We pray that this letter finds you walking off all the turkey and stuffing from Thanksgiving. We did not find a turkey this year, but Tanja made authentic pumpkin pies using canned pumpkin brought by visitors from Canada. We delivered slices of pie to our neighbours who were intrigued that we were celebrating Thanksgiving in October and not November.

Ten years ago this fall, we moved to Japan for five months to seek the Lord's leading for our

future in missions. We served with church planters at what was then known as Denen Grace Chapel. We were blessed by our host church's kindness, patience, and hospitality. When we returned to Japan for long term service, we extended an offer of assistance to that same church. In April, we started a half-year process of discernment to see if Mizonokuchi Chapel would want to partner again. This month, the leadership team let us know that the church is not yet ready to receive a long-term missionary family. At first, we were disappointed, but we understand that the church is in transition as they search for a Japanese pastor. Please continue to pray for the future of Mizonokuchi Chapel as they shine the light of the gospel in Kawasaki.

the many hours each week we dedicate to language study, we found ourselves travelling on the weekends. Many of you prayed for our planned visit to Otawara. The congregation and church planters there greeted us warmly and we got to practice our Japanese while learning about life and ministry in rural Japan. Outside of large cities like Tokyo or Osaka, Japan can be a different place with an aging population and more traditional ways of thinking and living. Many have told us that the soil is even rockier and more resistant to the gospel. Nevertheless, the church planting pastor we visited has spent his life steadfastly proclaiming the gospel and has been used by the Lord to plant four churches to date. Please continue to pray for us as we consider this partnership.

November was a busy month for our family with several appointments and meetings. On top of

## GOT QUESTIONS ARTICLE: What does the Bible say about peace?

Peace is something everyone wants, yet few seem to find. What is peace? It can be defined as "tranquility, harmony, or security." Depending on the situation, it could mean "prosperity" or "well-being." Various forms of the word peace are found 429 times in the King James Version of the Bible. There are different types of peace, including false peace, inner peace, peace with God, and peace with man.

In the Old Testament, the primary Hebrew word for "peace" is shalom, and it refers to relationships between people (<u>Genesis 34:21</u>), nations (<u>1 Kings 5:12</u>), and God with men (<u>Psalm 85:8</u>). Peace is a desired status in each of these arenas, and shalom is often tied to a covenant or a promise kept. A familiar friend (literally, "friend of my peace" in <u>Psalm 41:9</u>) is one with whom you would be at ease, a trusted companion. "Peace" was the standard greeting (<u>1 Samuel 25:6</u>), still used in many cultures today.

Peace is directly related to the actions and attitudes of individuals; but it is ultimately a

gift from God (<u>Isaiah 45:7</u>; <u>Leviticus 26:6</u>; <u>John 14:27</u>). The presence of peace indicates God's blessing on man's obedience (<u>Isaiah 32:17</u>; <u>Malachi 2:5</u>) and faith (<u>Isaiah 26:3</u>). There

is no peace for the wicked (Isaiah 48:22).

reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5:18).

As valuable as peace is, it is not surprising to find that it is sometimes counterfeited. Empty promises of peace can be used to manipulate others. Deceitful men speak words of peace while secretly planning evil (Obadiah 1:7). The Antichrist will confirm a treaty, producing a temporary peace which he will then abruptly shatter as he reveals his true colors (Daniel 9:27). False teachers proclaim peace when God is actually proclaiming judgment (Ezekiel 13:10-16). In Jeremiah's day, the religious leaders dealt only with the symptoms of the national problems, without addressing the sinful root of the crisis. These false prophets declared everything was well between God and Israel: "Peace, peace," they said, when there was no real peace (Jeremiah 6:14).

In the New Testament, the primary Greek word for "peace" is eirene, and it refers to rest and tranquility. A key focus of peace in the New Testament is the advent of Jesus Christ, as announced by the angels in <a href="Luke 2:14">Luke 2:14</a> ("Peace on earth . . ."). Isaiah had predicted the Messiah would be the Prince of Peace (<a href="Isaiah 9:6">Isaiah 9:6</a>), and He is called the Lord of peace in <a href="2">2</a> Thessalonians 3:16. It is through Christ's work of justification that we can have peace with God (<a href="Romans 5:1">Romans 5:1</a>), and that peace will keep our hearts and minds secure (<a href="Philippians 4:7">Philippians 4:7</a>).

to do what leads to peace" (<u>Romans 14:19</u>). Of course, there will be some people who do not desire peace, but we are still to do our utmost to be at peace with them (<u>Romans 12:18</u>).

God commands us to seek peace (Psalm 34:14; Matthew 5:9). We should "make every effort

Believers have an obligation to "let the peace of God rule" in their hearts (<u>Colossians 3:15</u>). This means we have the choice either to trust God's promises (letting His peace rule) or to rely on ourselves and reject the peace He offers. Jesus gave His disciples peace based on the truth that He has overcome the world (<u>John 14:27</u>; <u>16:33</u>). Peace is a fruit of the Spirit, so, if we are allowing the Spirit of God to rule in our lives, we will experience His peace (<u>Galatians 5:22-23</u>). To be spiritually minded brings life and peace, according to <u>Romans</u>

The world will continue to have wars and interpersonal conflicts until Jesus comes to establish true, lasting peace (see <u>Isaiah 11:1-10</u>), but God will give His peace to those who trust Him. Jesus took the chastisement of our peace (<u>Isaiah 53:5</u>) and has made it possible for us to have peace with God. Once His peace rules in our hearts, we are able to share that peace with others; we become publishers of peace (Isaiah 52:7) and ministers of
