Discussion Points

- 1. *"But to as many as did receive and welcome Him, He gave the authority (power, privilege, right) to become the children of God, that is, to those who believe in (adhere to, trust in, and rely on) His name—13 Who owe their birth neither to bloods nor to the will of the flesh [that of physical impulse] nor to the will of man [that of a natural father], but to God."* John 1:12-13 (AMP)**

When we are born again into God's Kingdom, we enter a Father-child relationship with Him. How does having a secure sense of our identity as God's sons and daughters strengthen and stabilize our walk with Him? Share your thoughts with one another.

2. *Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written: 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.'"* 32 *Jesus said to them, "Very truly I tell you, it is not Moses who has given you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. 33 For the bread of God is the bread that comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." 34 "Sir," they said, "always give us this bread." 35 Then Jesus declared, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty. John 6:31-35 niv*

Share how our understanding and perspective of "Daily Bread" and "the Bread of life" encourages us on our Father's provision for us when we asked. Read **Psalm 2:6-8** and evaluate our level of asking from our Father in Heaven.

3. *"bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive." Colossians 3:13 esv.*

In Kingdom relationship, **giving** the "Bread of Forgiveness" to others is as vital as "**receiving** the Bread of Forgiveness" from our perfect Father. Why is forgiveness such an important part in our walk as Christians? In what ways has forgiveness been a meaningful part of your journey with God and with the people around you?
