Why a 40-Day Advent?

This year OSLC will observe a 40-day Advent season, echoing early Christian traditions in which Advent, like Lent, was kept as a season of spiritual preparation and renewal. Long before Advent became primarily a festive countdown to Christmas, it was a time of prayer, repentance, intentional waiting, and hope—a season inviting believers to prepare not only for Christ's birth, but also for His coming again in glory.

Shaped by Lutheran faith and practice, this extended 40-day observance grounds us in Word and Sacrament, calling us to turn again to God's promises, examine our lives, and renew our trust in God's redeeming work. Just as Lent prepares us for Easter, this deeper Advent journey prepares us for the mystery of the Incarnation, opening our hearts to receive Christ with faith, humility, and expectation.

### Help needed to...

- Shop for clothes at MCEAP
- Sort the clothes to remove strings, etc.
- Deliver clothes to Radford hospital

Goal: to organize an ongoing clothing drive to supplement clothing supply to St. Albans.

<u>Why?</u> Clothes that patients are wearing when they are admitted may sometimes be marked with signs of addiction, suicide attempts, or other aspects of mental illness, and seeing this can be distressing to the patients later in their stay.

#### List of items needed

<u>What?</u> Gently used (no holes or stains) clothing for male and female patients. Sizes Small to 4XL. Shoes are also needed. Slip on shoes are best. Laces will be removed and then sent with the patient upon discharge.

### **Shirts Hoodies Jackets Pants Jeans Shoes**

#### **Restrictions:**

- No strings (or ability to cut/remove strings)
- No hard metal on clothing (zippers are allowed)
- No explicit language, drug/alcohol references, offensive topics
- No short shorts
- No skirts, dresses or nightgowns
- No see-through, severely low-cut or tank tops
- No underwires or adjustable-strap bras sports bras are best
- No used undergarments

When? Comfort clothes collection - once/season.

- Winter collection delivery for the end of January, 2026
- Spring collection delivery for mid-April
- Summer collection delivery for mid-July

### **OSLC Food Ministry:**

### Scope of OSLC's Food Ministry Program – Update

OSLC Food Ministry Program, in its current form/scope began with the COVID outbreak in 2020 and the construction of the Little Free Pantry on the church grounds. Currently, the program total congregation's donations equal \$114,000+ since 2020 and the total weight of food items provided is over 44 tons. Currently, in 2025 the program is providing food items to over 185 special need students in enCircle (formerly known at Lutheran Family Services) schools in Roanoke, Lynchburg, Wytheville, Bristol and Big Stone Gap (Wise County) and 20 special need adults in seven group homes in Salem/Roanoke and Bedford areas. This is in addition to those

supported by the Little Free Pantry at the westerly edge of the Church parking lot. I have renamed it "The Little House on the Prairie."

**The Thrive network** is working to foster connection and collaboration to amplify support to food insecure in the NRV. This is a service of the Community Foundation of the New River Valley.
