Every Member is a Minister

In the Parable of the Talents, Jesus related the story of a master going on a long journey and leaving his servants to look after his domain in his absence. To one servant he entrusted five bags of gold. To another, he entrusted two bags of gold. And to yet another, he entrusted a single bag. When the master returned, he discovered that the servant he entrusted with five bags had put the money to work and turned it into five more bags. The master richly rewarded him for his faithfulness.

When the master called in the servant he entrusted with two bags, the story was the same. The servant also doubled the master's money, increasing it by two more bags. He too was richly rewarded. But when the master called in the servant he entrusted with a single bag, he discovered no increase whatsoever. The man had simply held on to the gold, failing to do anything at all with the money. The master immediately took the single bag from him, gave it to the one who had ten bags, and threw the worthless servant out into the darkness.

We need to take the words of Jesus seriously. Picture yourself standing before the throne of God at the end of this age and God asking, "What did you do with the abilities and resources I entrusted to you?" Imagine the joy of being able to answer, "I put them to work, Lord. Look and see the increase in your Kingdom. I made a difference!"

Sadly, many people who claim to have a vibrant relationship with Jesus will be forced to respond, "I showed up. I occupied a seat in my church. I consumed what was being offered to me." Jesus never intended Christianity to be a spectator sport. He wants us out of the stands and onto the playing field. He longs for us to reflect his heart and be ministers to a lost and dying world. Above all, there's a single phrase Jesus wants to speak over you when this world comes to an end — "Well done good and faithful servant!"

Don't wash your underwear!

In Jeremiah 13:1, God spoke to the prophet Jeremiah saying, "Go and buy a linen belt and put it around your waist, but do not let it touch water." The ancient Hebrew word that our modern versions of the Bible translate as "belt" is *Ezor*. It's the same word used through the Bible to describe the underwear worn by Jewish men. The word is also found in texts outside of scripture.

So why would God not want Jeremiah to wash his underwear? The imagery is actually a bit gross. Throughout the Bible, God often called prophets to physically act out a message he wanted to communicate to people. God was using Jeremiah's underwear to represent the nation of Israel. By not washing the garment, God was asking Jeremiah to perform a symbolic demonstration where the linen "ezor," initially clean and pristine, eventually became foul, smelly and ruined.

The spoiled garment served as a vivid illustration of the people's corruption and the coming destruction and ruin that would befall Judah and Jerusalem due to their persistent disobedience and refusal to listen to God's word.

Symbolic demonstrations were powerful, visual metaphors that served as a form of prophetic communication. They made God's declarations concrete and tangible, ensuring the prophet's message was both seen and remembered.

By engaging in such unusual and public behaviors, prophets could communicate complex divine truths and warnings in a way that would capture the attention and hearts of their audience.

A Streaker in the Bible?



Yup. He's right there in Mark 14:51-52.

On the night Jesus was arrested, one of the onlookers was a young man wearing some kind of linen garment or perhaps even a bedsheet.

Mark wrote, "A young man, wearing nothing but a linen garment, was following Jesus. When they seized him, he fled naked, leaving his garment behind."

The comment is such an unusual digression from the main theme of the narrative that many scholars think that this young man may have been Mark himself.

What appears to the reader to be a strange tangent in the narrative may actually be the personal testimony of one of two Gospel authors who weren't among the twelve original disciples of Christ.

Did the Archangel Michael really dispute with Satan over the body of Moses?

It's possible. In truth, we're not really sure. Jude, verse 9 reads, "But even the archangel Michael, when he was disputing with the devil about the body of Moses, did not himself dare to condemn him for slander but said, "The Lord rebuke you!"

Jude was quoting from the Jewish book, *Testament of Moses*, a text that is not considered divinely inspired in either the Jewish or the Christian faiths. Why then would Jude, under the inspiration of God, quote a book that was not held to be factual? The delicate nature of this phenomenon has challenged Biblical scholars for centuries.

The truth is, Jude also quoted from the *Book of Enoch*, as did both Peter and John. The *Book of Enoch*



is another text that was not viewed as divinely inspired. Jesus likely quoted from a further uninspired text, the *Book of Jubilees*—"Put your sword back in its place," Jesus said to him, "for all who draw the sword will die by the sword (Matthew 26:52). Paul quoted the poet Aratus: "for in him we live and move and have our being (Acts 17:28)," as well as the philosopher Epimenides: "One of their own prophets said 'Cretans are always liars, evil beasts, lazy gluttons (Titus1:12)," and the playwright Menander: "do not be misled: Bad company corrupts good character (1 Corinthians 15:33)."

None of the New Testament writers or speakers quoted non-Christian authors for the purpose of supporting their philosophies. Instead, they quoted them to connect their own message to well known phrases of the day. It would be similar to quoting Albus Dumbledore from the Harry Potter novels where he says, "Soon we must all face the choice between what is right and what is easy." It's a great quote. You don't have to believe in wizards and witches for it to have meaning. Truth lies in the words, not in the worldview of the one who uttered them.

When Jude quoted *The Testament of Moses*, he was challenging ungodly people to avoid being derisive toward celestial beings. Peter gave the same warning in 2 Peter 2:10-11. It's doubtful that Jude intended to put his stamp of approval on the accuracy of the popular Jewish tale of Michael and Satan arguing over the body of Moses.

What remains true is that we would be wise to exercise caution when it comes to building theology around quotes that come from uninspired sources, even though we find them in the Bible.

Sunday Prayer Teams

Mid-Week Prayer

Each week we join together as a church community asking the Lord to meet our personal requests, those of others in our church family, needs in our city and so much more. No scheduled commitment is required. Drop in as you are available. Will you join us every Wednesday at 6:15 pm as we seek God's will?

Restoration Prayer

The Restoration Prayer process leads you through systematic confession and repentance, claiming your authority in Jesus Christ, breaking lies and replacing them with truth. The enemy's influence in your life is discerned by the prayer team and confronted on your behalf. When we submit to the leading of the Holy Spirit and to the body of Christ, it is a powerful encounter with the Living God. The Holy Spirit will then have greater influence in and through you. The fruit of that Spirit will grow more abundantly and you will learn to hear the voice of God more clearly. If you know that the enemy has influence in your life, we'd love to help. We are always in need of team members who are gifted in prayer and discernment.

Healing Prayer

On the last Sunday of every month, immediately following the second service, our Elders will offer individual prayer for physical, emotional and spiritual wholeness for all who come. Jesus provides healing to his church through his atoning work on the cross and in his name, we will pray for that healing for you.

The Day the Sun Stood Still

Joshua chapter 10 tells the story of a battle fought by Joshua against the Amorites. Mid-battle, Joshua asked God to pause the sun in the sky so the nation of Israel would have more time to defeat their enemies. In verses 13 and 14, we read, "The sun stopped in the middle of the sky and delayed going down about a full day. There has never been a day like it before or since, a day when the Lord listened to a human being. Surely the Lord was fighting for Israel!"



Of course, for the sun to stop in the sky, the earth needs to stop rotating. The problem with this idea is the utter chaos it would create on earth. But according to astrophysicists, if the earth were to pass through a cloud of dark matter roughly the mass of our planet, the gravitational gain would accelerate the earth in its solar orbit so that a year's transit would be completed in a single day. The normal rotation of the earth would cause the same side of our planet to face the sun for a 24 hour period. There would be no chaotic effects on earth, nor would the event leave a cosmological fingerprint for later detection. Weird but theoretically possible.

What is this mysterious substance we call dark matter? We don't know. We don't know where it comes from or where it goes. We don't know how to detect it. All we know is that it exerts a force on normal matter. We only know it exists because we see it at work. It's a bit like God. We can't touch him. We can't measure him. We can't put him in a test tube and examine him. But we know he exists because we see him at work.

Every Place to Grow leader has been screened through our Safety & Risk Management Policy and has attended our mandatory Children and Youth Volunteer Training program. Each worker has also completed an RCMP Police Information Check.

Place to Grow - Sunday Morning

Although studies vary, the Barna Research Group, an organization that specializes in demographics, has shown that 94% of people who make a commitment to Jesus Christ do so before reaching the age of 18. That means that only 6% of Christians made their decision to follow God as adults. Our ministries to children and youth occur in a critical "window" prior to succumbing to the negative messages the secular world has to offer. All helpers in our Nursery and Pre-school ministries must be a minimum of 12 years old, and workers need to go through a screening process (see the sidebar at left.) We are always looking for people to be part of a regular rotation as nursery attendants, teachers and classroom assistants. Commitment is once per month during the 9:00 am service with additional opportunities to serve at the 11:00 am service.

Parent Room (0-12 Months)

Church is tough for parents of children in this age group. You want to be with your child. You don't want them to disrupt the service. But you also want to be part of the worship experience and hear the message. That's what the Parent Room is for. You can sit with your child, nurse them, cuddle them, whatever — all the while connecting with the service that we livestream into the Parent Room.

Toddler Room (1-3 Years)

When the disciples tried to shoo away children who were crowding around Jesus, he gave a revealing response. He said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." Are you ready to stand in for Jesus and take part in a ministry of caring for the toddlers of our church so their parents can attend the service? Few words. No curriculum. Just love and acceptance in abundance!

Preschool (3-5 Years)

This is a critical age for children. It's so much more than merely babysitting. We want our preschoolers to come away each Sunday with a positive view of God's Kingdom. We're looking for teachers and helpers who can reflect the love of Christ to some of the youngest members of our church family.

Grades K-3

This is the age at which children take their first steps in truly understanding the Bible. They become acquainted with the stories, teachings, and principles found within scripture. This foundational knowledge lays the groundwork for a strong Christian faith. They learn about love, compassion, forgiveness, and the importance of treating others with kindness. These values help shape their character and guide them throughout life.

Grades 4-6

Both Mother Theresa and Billy Graham attributed their spiritual foundations to volunteer leaders who guided them during this stage in life. Secular schools no longer lead their students in prayer. They no longer engage their students in moral discussions. This is where it all comes into focus. This is where lives are changed.

Place to Grow Ministries also needs a regular rotation of hallway supervisors to help children with everyday issues (such as bathroom patrol.)

Place to Grow - Midweek

Other than Peter, there's evidence in scripture that the disciples of Jesus were not much older than teens, yet together they changed the world. Even in Paul's ministry, Timothy was likely of a similar young age when he took over leadership of the church in Ephesus. The youth of Lakewood Alliance are not the church of tomorrow. They're the church of today!

Rooted Youth Ministry (Grades 7-12) - meeting Wednesdays 7:30-8:30 pm

Young people in today's world need the church, but the church also needs young people. Secular schools no longer engage in public prayer. They no longer challenge students with spiritual discussions. They teach information but not values. Social media has taken over that role, and the results are really quite shocking. Get Your Robes Dry Cleaned - Your Turn on the Bench is Coming Soon

1 Corinthians 6:1-3 reads, "If any of you has a dispute with another, do you dare to take it before the ungodly for judgment instead of before the Lord's people? Or do you not know that the Lord's people will judge the world? And if you are to judge the world, are you not competent to judge trivial cases? Do you not know that we will judge angels?"

If you've ever been about to start a new job and you feel unqualified, just ponder the implications of this verse for a moment. According to the apostle Paul, someday we're going to judge both the world and angels. Now that's a strange verse. In fact, this one may top the list. What in the world is this all about?

Unfortunately, Paul didn't leave us a lot of details. This is likely a reference to some prior teaching he shared with the Corinthians. There may be a partial clue to understanding this verse in Revelation 2:26, where Christ declared to those who are victorious and do his will to the end, he "will give authority over the nations—"

As for judging the angels, it seems unlikely that there would be a need to judge righteous angels who live in obedience to God. It makes more sense that we would be called to judge those angelic beings who rose up in rebellion against the Lord. (Jude 1:6, 2 Peter 2:4, Rev. 12:7-9)

Whatever our turn behind the bench will look like, Paul's main point here was that the Corinthian Christians were living as though this was not their destiny. They were acting as if they were incompetent to bring even the smallest issues of conflict to resolution.

Disagreements are part of life. Jesus never asked for us to achieve agreement. But he did ask us to achieve unity.

I'm Utterly Speechless!

In 1 Corinthians 14:34 Paul wrote: "Women should remain silent in the churches. They are not allowed to speak, but must be in submission, as the law says."



But nowhere in Jewish law are women prohibited from

speaking in the public assembly. In the occupied realms of the Roman Empire, however, it was against the law for women to engage in public discourse. The law Paul was referring to was Roman Law.

He wasn't stating his disdain for women who spoke in the church. He was protecting them from prosecution. Largely due to oppressive Roman misogynism, the Jews had developed a pattern where everyone received teaching in the synagogue but husbands and wives only discussed it in the privacy of the home. The wife was then given the responsibility of teaching the children. Paul accepted the reality of this situation and advised congregations to comply with the law of the land.

In those places where we are not being asked to act in direct violation of the gospel, sometimes we need to concede our entitlements in order for the message of Jesus Christ to best be heard. discussion and a delicious weekly dinner. How Old is Old?

Genesis 5:27 tells us that Methuselah lived a total of 969 years and then died. Is this even possible? If human beings once had this kind of longevity, we've obviously lost it. But there are creatures on this earth that provide evidence for extremely long life spans.

Greenland Sharks can live to be over 400 years old. A single Quahog Clam specimen was verified to be 507 years old. And one of the biggest surprises is the simple deep sea sponge. Some have been determined to be over 11,000 years old. That's old!

But the ultimate record holder has that beat by a mile. The Turritopsis Dohrnii Jellyfish doesn't die. It reverts its life cycle from the adult stage back to the polyp stage and begins life all over again. Scientists have dubbed it the Immortal Jellyfish.

Using a process known as transdifferentiation, the *Immortal Jellyfish* can be killed, but it cannot die of old age. Even Methuselah would be in awe of that kind of longevity.

Jesus Cursed Trees?

Matthew 21 verses 18 to 22 tells of Jesus walking from Bethany to Jerusalem early one morning. Because he was hungry, Jesus stopped at a fig tree on the roadside, but the tree was barren. It was devoid of fruit.



Jesus said to it, "May you never bear fruit again." Immediately the fig tree withered. The event seems completely out of character for Jesus. After fasting for forty days in the wilderness at the beginning of his ministry, he was clearly no stranger to hunger.

What is going on here? A closer look at the day prior to this event sheds some light. Matthew 21:12-13 tells us that after Jesus entered Jerusalem he overturned the tables in the temple. Why? Because the people were not doing right by God and each other. They were not bearing the fruit of righteousness at a time when they should have been celebrating God's redemptive work! Like the fig tree, the time had come to bear fruit and there wasn't any.

In the act of cursing the fig tree, Jesus made a visible demonstration of his disappointment with people who bore the outward appearance of life, yet failed to bear any fruit.

Why Was God Going to Kill Moses?



In Exodus 4:24 and 25 we read the following strange verse: At a lodging place on the way, the Lord met Moses and was about to kill him. But Zipporah took a flint knife, cut off her son's foreskin and touched Moses' feet with it. Simple question: What in the world is going on here?

Apparently, Moses had broken his covenant with God. In Genesis 17:10-14, God commanded Abraham to circumcise every male in his household as a sign of his everlasting covenant. This act served as an admission into the Jewish faith and a physical mark of God's covenant with Abraham's future offspring.

Moses failed to circumcise his son and therefore was a covenant breaker. When God makes a way for us to enjoy a restored relationship with him, he takes that very seriously. For Moses to reject circumcision for his son would be like us rejecting baptism and the Lord's Supper as signs of our restored relationship with God.

Ravens are among the most intelligent animals in the world, engaging in complex behaviors such as tool making, bartering and even holding funerals for deceased associates.

1 Kings 17:6 tells us that Elijah the Tishbite, was directed by God to hide from the wicked King Ahab in the Kerith Ravine east of the Jordan River. While he was there, "The ravens brought him bread and meat in the morning and bread and meat in the evening, and he drank from the brook."

This behavior is well within the intellectual capabilities of the raven, but far outside their natural inclinations. Ravens do not normally feed people. This is yet another very strange Bible verse.

Stranger yet is the fact that ravens were listed as unclean animals in the Old Testament. God could have used any creature to bring nourishment to Elijah, but he chose ravens. Then again, he also chose to send Elijah to Zaraphath in Lebanon where he stayed in the home of an "unclean" Gentile woman.

In God's economy, clean and unclean are arbitrary terms. Jesus touched lepers and dead people. Doing so did not make him unclean. Instead his touch made others clean.

Coffee and Communion Prep Ministry

Almost everyone loves a great cup of coffee. And we try to provide the best cup possible. But did you ever wonder how that coffee gets there? Faithful servants of God come in early, start the coffee maker, set up the table and dishes and carry that pot upstairs. You want 100 WHAT!?

Yup. That's what it says. 100 Philistine foreskins. That was the bride-price King Saul was asking for his daughter's hand in marriage. Saul of Israel perceived David as a rival to his throne, so when David fell in love with his daughter and asked to marry her, Saul set the bride-price at 100 Philistine foreskins.

The concept of bride-price doesn't exist in our culture, but in the ancient world, a bride-price was a symbolic recognition of the importance of a daughter's place in the family. It was a statement of her value.



By asking for 100 Philistine foreskins, Saul was setting up David to fail. First, there was no way David could cheat by collecting foreskins from peaceable Israelite citizens. Israelites had all been circumcised. Second, Saul knew that no Philistine was going to willingly surrender such a delicate part of their anatomy without a fight.

Let's face it. It's a strange verse. Stranger yet is how David responded. 1 Samuel 18:27 reads: David took his men with him and went out and killed 200 Philistines and brought back their foreskins. They counted out the full number to the king so that David might become the king's son-in-law. Then Saul gave him his daughter Michal in marriage.

The Bible tells us that David was "a man after God's own heart." He had maximum faith. He never asked, "How little do I need to do and still say I got it done?" He always asked, "How much can I do?" David was a professed sinner. He murdered. He committed adultery. But because of his maximum faith, God loved him to pieces.

Does God Care How We Cook Goats?

In Exodus 23:19, the Jewish people were commanded "Do not cook a young goat in its mother's milk" — yet another strange verse. While several possible explanations have been put forward, it may all come down to context. This verse may be an ancient idiom.

Idioms only make sense in context. Take the phrase "flash in the pan." It refers to a flintlock musket going off without discharging a musket ball. Without context, the idiom makes little sense.

The young goat verse appears three times in scripture, twice in the context of making an offering to God. It's possible that the verse is an ancient idiom meaning to refrain from presenting an offering that mixes old produce (the mother's milk) with the firstfruits (the young goat) that were God's entitlement.

Next, read 2 Kings chapter 2, especially verses 23 and 24: "From there Elisha went up to Bethel. As he was walking along the road, some boys came out of the town and jeered at him. "Get out of here, baldy!" they said. "Get out of here, baldy!" He turned around, looked at them and called down a curse on them in the name of the Lord. Then two bears came out of the woods and mauled forty-two of the boys."

Follow the script closely and just before your near fatal encounter, snap a couple of quick pictures. Voila! Then wait by your phone during your lengthy recovery for a call from Canadian Geographic Magazine. They like bear photos.

Seriously, though, what a strange passage. It would seem that we can draw a few simple conclusions from this text. One being that prophets may not all be kindly old gentlemen wandering the desert eating things most of us wouldn't dare put in our mouths.

Another would be that prophets appear to have a degree of influence with God. At any rate, if you happen to run into one who seems to be lacking in the follicle department — and bear with me now — try your best to be polite.

When we step into these spaces, it is instinctual that we become more cautious about our behaviour, what we say or how loudly we say it. It Doesn't Get Much Stranger!

It's right there in the Bible. Genesis 5:24 reads, "Enoch walked faithfully with God; then he was no more, because God took him away."

Now you might argue that this says nothing about Enoch dodging the final curtain call, but if we skip over to Hebrews 11:5 in the New Testament, it says, "By faith Enoch was taken from this life, so that he did not experience death..." — so let's face it. That's a strange verse.



But Enoch wasn't the only one. In 2 Kings 2:11, we read that the prophets Elijah and Elisha "were walking along and talking together, suddenly a chariot of fire and horses of fire appeared and separated the two of them, and Elijah went up to heaven in a whirlwind."

What was it Dorothy said in Wizard of Oz? Oh yeah. "Toto, I have a feeling we're not in Kansas anymore." The quote "life is a fatal disease" has been attributed to everyone from Pocahontas to Earnest Hemmingway. Nobody really knows who originally said it. But one thing is for certain. In at least a couple of cases, they were wrong. Some people never make it to their own funeral.

The questions these verses raise are countless. How do you hitch a ride in a fiery chariot without getting singed? Are these two guys still in their original bodies? Did they somehow get transmogrified into angelic-like beings along the way?

We're going to have to wait until we catch up with them to ask. I'm sure they'll have quite a story to tell. But one thing is for certain. With the exorbitant cost of funerals in virtually every period of history, Enoch and Elijah saved themselves a bundle.

What Is It About Water?

Joshua 3:14-17 describes Israel entering Canaan after the Lord miraculously parted the Jordan River. But it wasn't the only time God would perform this miracle. 2 Kings 2:13-14 reads: "Elisha then picked up Elijah's cloak that had fallen from him and went back and stood on the bank of the Jordan. He took the cloak that had fallen from Elijah and struck the water with it. "Where now is the Lord, the God of Elijah?" he asked. When he struck the water, it divided to the right and to the left, and he crossed over."



God repeating a miracle is unusual enough, but stranger yet is the fact that most people in the Bible who performed a miracle, their debut act involved water. Noah gathered animals to survive a flood. Moses turned the water of the Nile into blood. Elijah banished dew and rain from the land. Even the first miracle of Jesus was to change water into wine. There are some exceptions — such as Daniel in the lion's den and the healing miracles performed by the disciples of Christ. But water remains the primary element in the majority of first miracles performed in the Bible.
