About the Festival of Nine Lessons & Carols

The original idea for the Festival of Nine Lessons & Carols was drawn up by Edward White Benson, Bishop of Truro in Cornwall (later Archbishop of Canterbury), for use on Christmas Eve in 1880. It was based on an idea from the future Bishop of Edinburgh, George Walpole, who was the succentor of the cathedral at the time: tradition says that he organized a 10:00 p.m. service on Christmas Eve using a temporary wooden shed for his Cathedral and that a key purpose of the service was to keep people out of pubs on Christmas Eve.

The original liturgy has since been adapted and used by churches all over the world. Traditionally an Anglican service, it has been adopted as part of the Christmas celebrations of many different denominations. The best-known version is broadcast annually from King's College, Cambridge on Christmas Eve, where it was first celebrated in 1918 (other than King's College, Groton School, Massachusetts in the US has performed the festival longer than any institution, holding its first Lessons & Carols in 1928). The King's College version was conceived by its Dean, Eric Milner-White, whose experience as an army chaplain had led him to believe that more imaginative worship was needed by the Church of England. The music at the first service at King's was directed by Arthur Henry Mann, working with a choir which had only trebles, as specified in statutes laid down by Henry VI. Later on, the men's voices were provided by choral scholars and lay clerks, while today, undergraduates from the College Choir sing the men's parts.

The service was first broadcast nationally by the BBC in 1919 and, except for 1930, has been broadcast every year since. During this time, the BBC also began broadcasting the service on its overseas programmes. Even throughout World War II, despite the stained glass having been removed from the Chapel and the lack of heating, the broadcasts continued. For security reasons, the name of King's College was not mentioned during wartime broadcasts. Since World War II it has been estimated that each year there are millions of listeners worldwide who tune in to the service live on the BBC World Service.

Our Cathedral was founded on December 23, 1888 — 137 years ago — just eight years after the first Service of Nine Lessons & Carols. This Carol service has become part of our Christmas worship for many years and it has built up a loyal congregation delighted by the beautiful music and the recitation of the greatest story ever told.

We are delighted that you have chosen to be part of this wonderful tradition and wish you a blessed and grace-filled Advent and Christmas!

Once in Royal David's City




Give them signs of your healing presence and of your eternal purpose of salvation. We ask this in the name of Jesus Christ the Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the




