

Luke 2:8-20

Big Idea: Jesus wasn't born in a manger by accident—He was wrapped like a sacrificial lamb. The shepherds who cared for temple sacrifices were the first to see Him. Why? Because the Lamb of God came to take away the sin of the world. Worthy is the Lamb!

# Day 1: The Unexpected Announcement

Reading: Luke 2:8-14

God chose shepherds—young, humble caretakers of sacrificial lambs—to receive the first announcement of Jesus' birth. This was no coincidence. These shepherds understood the significance of spotless lambs prepared for temple sacrifice. When angels appeared declaring the birth of a Savior, these men were uniquely positioned to recognize the sign: a baby wrapped and laid in a manger, just as they wrapped newborn lambs destined for sacrifice.

God often reveals His greatest truths to the humble and overlooked. The shepherds weren't religious leaders or wealthy citizens; they were ordinary people doing their job. Yet God entrusted them with the most extraordinary news in human history. Are you willing to receive God's message with childlike wonder, regardless of your status or circumstances?

Reflection: Who in your life might Notes:	God be calling you to share the good news with—someone humble or overlooked?		



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#### Day 2: Good News for All People

Reading:

Isaiah 49:1-6;

Luke 2:29-32

The angel proclaimed "good news of great joy that will be for all people"—not just the Jews, but every tribe, language, and nation. From the beginning, God's plan included you. Jesus came as a light to the Gentiles, breaking through ethnic and cultural boundaries to offer salvation to the entire world.

This universal invitation should fill us with gratitude and urgency. If Christ died for all people, then all people deserve to hear this message. Simeon recognized baby Jesus as the fulfillment of God's promise—a light that would illuminate the darkness for all nations. The same light that shone in Bethlehem continues to shine today, piercing through the darkness of sin, despair, and death.

Reflection: Thank God today that His salvation extends to you, regardless of your background.

How does knowing this truth change your perspective?

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# Day 3: The Blood of the Lamb

Reading:

1 Peter 1:18-21;

Leviticus 17:11

Jesus was born to die. This sobering truth reminds us that Christmas and Easter are inseparably linked. The baby wrapped in cloths would one day be wrapped in burial linens. The blood that flowed through His infant veins was the same precious blood that would be poured out on Calvary's cross.

Scripture is clear: without the shedding of blood, there is no forgiveness of sin. The sacrificial system pointed forward to the ultimate sacrifice—Jesus Christ, the spotless Lamb of God. His blood was expensive beyond measure, purchasing our redemption from sin and death. When we see our own ugliness and failure, we can find comfort knowing that Christ's blood is sufficient to cleanse us completely.

Reflection: Spend time today Notes:	acknowledging your need for Jesus' sacrifice. Thank Him specifically for the blood He shed for your sins.		



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# Day 4: Treasuring and Pondering

Reading: Luke 2:15-19; Psalm 119:9-16

Mary "treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart." She didn't fully understand God's plan, but she stored these experiences away, reflecting on them repeatedly. Mary walked by faith through extraordinary circumstances, trusting God even when His ways were mysterious. We need to recapture this practice of treasuring God's Word and works. In our fast-paced world, we often consume information without truly digesting it. Mary's example calls us to slow down, to meditate on Scripture, to wonder at God's goodness. When we ponder God's faithfulness—both in Scripture and in our own lives—we build a storehouse of faith that sustains us through difficult seasons. These treasured truths become anchors for our souls.

Reflection: What truth about Jesus do you need to treasure and ponder more deeply this Christmas season?

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# Day 5: Worthy Is the Lamb

Reading: Revelation 5:8-14; John 1:29-34

The story that began in a Bethlehem stable culminates in heavenly worship. Every creature in heaven and earth will one day declare: "Worthy is the Lamb who was slain!" The baby born among animals will be recognized as King of kings. The suffering servant will receive eternal honor and glory.

This future reality should transform our present worship. Even now, angels and saints in heaven cry out, "Worthy is the Lamb!" Will you join that chorus today? Jesus deserves our wholehearted devotion—not just at Christmas, but every day. He is worthy of our praise, our obedience, our lives. As John the Baptist proclaimed, "Look, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!"

This Christmas, fall down in worship before the Lamb.
