

## What Are We Trusting God For?

As we dove into this semester my hopes and prayers were to see students receive the wonderful gift of life with God through Jesus; to also see a growing community of Christians enjoying life with God, rejoicing in their salvation and offering that gift to others. Our plan was to welcome international students broadly, show them the love of Jesus actively and invite them into ways to explore knowing Him. We did this by offering meals and opportunities to get winter clothing or things they needed to get settled, offering English conversation and ways to meet local families. We also met students individually to give Bibles, have conversation and invited them into Bible Study.

Although I was the only full time staff here, due to help from part-time staff and volunteers we were able to continue to offer meals to international students from 40-100 people in a week. One church cooked and hosted our Thanksgiving and Christmas Party meals which was a huge help. I was also able to connect about 60 students to Christian families for both Thanksgiving and this upcoming Christmas. Please pray that they will have hearts softened and opened to Jesus through these connections and experiences.

God also drew three students to serve on our student executive as well: Easton, Jan and Theresa. Please continue to pray for them as they represent Christ on campus.

However, the missional community of students has been rather uncommitted, or at least inconsistent. We have many grad students involved and they do a lot of work towards Masters and PhD programs. They often love coming to Bible Study, eating and praying together, but very few have been able to come weekly. There are about 20 students who have come, but only 3 regularly. so please pray that we would find the right times and commitment to help the students come together, minister to others and shine their light on campus while they can.
