

Why Christmas Matters

Christmas celebrates the birth of Jesus to Mary, a young woman living in first century Palestine.

The story of Jesus' birth underscores a central Christian claim: that God becomes fully present in human life in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. It is not simply that God appears *like* a human or temporarily inhabits a body, but that the eternal Word of God takes on real human flesh, history, vulnerability, and limitation. The word we use for this is *incarnation*.

At its heart, the incarnation says that God chooses nearness rather than distance. God meets humanity not by lifting us out of the world, but by entering it—into ordinary time, a particular place, a human body, and a life shaped by joy, suffering, relationship, and death. As the Gospel of John puts it, "the Word became flesh and lived among us."

Theologically, this means that matter matters. Human bodies, relationships, work, pain, and hope are not obstacles to God but the very place where God is revealed. The incarnation grounds Christian faith in the conviction that divine love is not abstract or theoretical, but embodied, relational, and committed to the real conditions of human life.

All: It is right to give our thanks and praise.


Presider: Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of heaven and earth;

May your Word take flesh in us. Awaken your people.


Fill us with your light. Bring the gift of peace on earth.
