to live with you there.

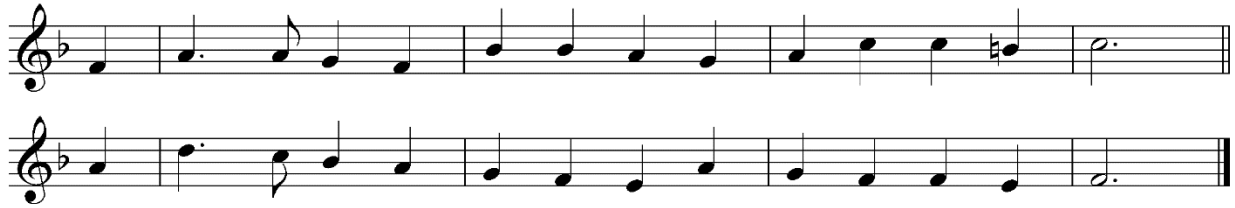
