#### PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

In April 2024, I had the privilege to attend the Institute of Liturgical Studies at Valparaiso University. One of the plenary sessions stands out to me, resonating both as a critique of our present era and as a beacon of hope for what lies ahead. Dr. Mark Roosien, an Orthodox priest and scholar, delivered a thought-provoking talk centered on the concept of time, particularly contrasting liturgical time with market time.

It is no surprise that market time prevails in our daily lives. Whenever we engage with social media, we participate in market time, as advertisers vie for our attention and dollars. Watching streaming services or television equally immerses us in market time, where viewership is correlated with dollars. Our virtual existence is often characterized by a state known as "Blursday," a day where everything is in flux, yet nothing of true consequence transpires. Blursday is defined by the endless scrolling on our phones, heated exchanges on social media over the latest controversies, and mass emails that generate heat but little light. In this perpetual state, everything is accessible at any hour, tailored to individual demand. Living in perpetual Blursday disconnects us from our families and communities, making us more vulnerable to propagandists, marketers, and scammers who benefit from our division and dissatisfaction.

Liturgical time offers a compelling alternative to market time. It centers on how we collectively mark time, united around the story of Jesus the Messiah—crucified and risen for the life of the world. Since this narrative is rooted in the Triune God's love and grace for a fallen world, there is no sales pitch, no adversary to demonize. Instead, we share in the story of Jesus, which unfolds in our lives through faith communities such as Shalom.

With this perspective in mind, I have committed to writing a series over the next year that explores the lesser-known or lesser-attended feasts of the church year. To begin this series for 2026, I offer a brief reflection on the feast of Epiphany.

Epiphany is celebrated on January 6, immediately following the twelve days of Christmas. While "epiphany" is sometimes used in everyday language to describe an "aha" or "eureka" moment, this feast holds a deeper significance. It highlights a fundamental tenet of our faith: Jesus is the revealed God, not for just one group, but for all people—across every tribe, nation, and language.

Consider Matthew's account: Herod the Great, the Jewish client king, is startled when several foreign visitors arrive unannounced, seeking the newborn King of the Jews.

"We believe God is calling us to invite people into a deeper relationship with Christ, that they may discover true peace and be prepared to follow Him in compassionate service."

Herod himself had not recently fathered a child and was notorious for his cruelty toward his own offspring—so much so that a saying circulated, "I would rather be Herod's sow than Herod's son." According to Matthew's Gospel, these visitors were magi, likely Zoroastrian priests and scholars from Persia (modern Iran). They did not worship the God of Israel but consulted the stars. Nevertheless, they undertook a long journey to honor the newborn King.

This story underscores that God in Christ reveals Himself to whomever He chooses. He is Emmanuel—God with us—not only for a select few, but for everyone. His mission encompasses all of humanity. Even Jesus expands His own understanding of this mission, notably after being challenged by a Gentile woman (Matthew 15:21-28).

This message is especially vital in an era marked by rising nativism, where it is claimed that one group is more deserving than others based on race or heritage. Even if we believe ourselves immune to such attitudes, it is worth reflecting on moments when we may look down on others. The story of Epiphany reminds us that no one is beneath God's attention. No one is unworthy of love or life. God in Christ, through the Spirit, offers love and eternal life to all—not because we deserve it, but precisely because we do not. Jesus is for us. Jesus is for all. Jesus is for you.

#### **Summary:**

This Shalom reporting is through November with a combined General and Building Funds deficit of \$29,960. The deficit is primarily due to Jan-Nov offerings under-budget by \$65,996. The General/Bldg Funds balance is about \$105,000, down from \$139,000 at the end of December/24. Based on reported receipts and supply expenses at the end of September, the July BBQ grossed \$16,077 with net proceeds of \$9,707. Council approved transferring the BBQ net proceed 50% to Building Fund and 50% to General fund.

Third, the good news: we can share God's Word in inspiring ways. Come to our gatherings on Thursday mornings from 10-11:00 am.


